7th Dec^r '87. Mess^{rs} Somerville and Coghlan Engineers further reported that the site selected for a cemetery at Rahoon is eminently suited for the purpose. A depth of eight feet from the surface may easily be obtained at any point within the proposed boundary. Trial holes were sunk and borings made over the ground, and in no place could be found the existence of rock.

The formation of the subsoil is strong gravelly clay sufficiently adhesive to enable a cutting of eight feet to be made, leaving the sides of the cutting perpendicular, a most valuable property for the subsoil of a cemetery to possess as it enables graves to be made in close proximity to each other, without danger of the sides of the cutting falling in.

Mr. H. Davoren moved -

"That we state in reply to Local Government Board letter No 48169, dated 26th ultimo, that we have selected the only suitable site for the cemetery at Rahoon to be had in the locality, and refer the Board to the very satisfactory report of the Engineers on the freedom from rock, and the nature of the subsoil, of the ground selected. That should Mr. H. O'Brien persist in his objection, we shall have it so arranged that the cemetery shall not be within 100 yards of Rahoon Gate Lodge.
