Gentlemen,

I beg to bring under your notice the misconduct of some of the Medical Students when passing through the Workhouse to visit the Hospital Wards.

On Thursday morning last about a dozen of them came in a batch to the entrance gate. One of the party named Gannon flung the heavy iron gate back with a bang against the stone pier, and then brought the gate forward again and banged it a second time. About half the number followed the bad example thus set them. When leaving the Workhouse they acted in a similar manner though the gate stood wide open. I raised one of the Board Room windows and threatened to bring their misconduct under the notice of the President of the College but the announcement was only received with a jeering shout.

Some of them appear to fancy it a grand thing to shout and make as much noise as possible while on the Workhouse premises.

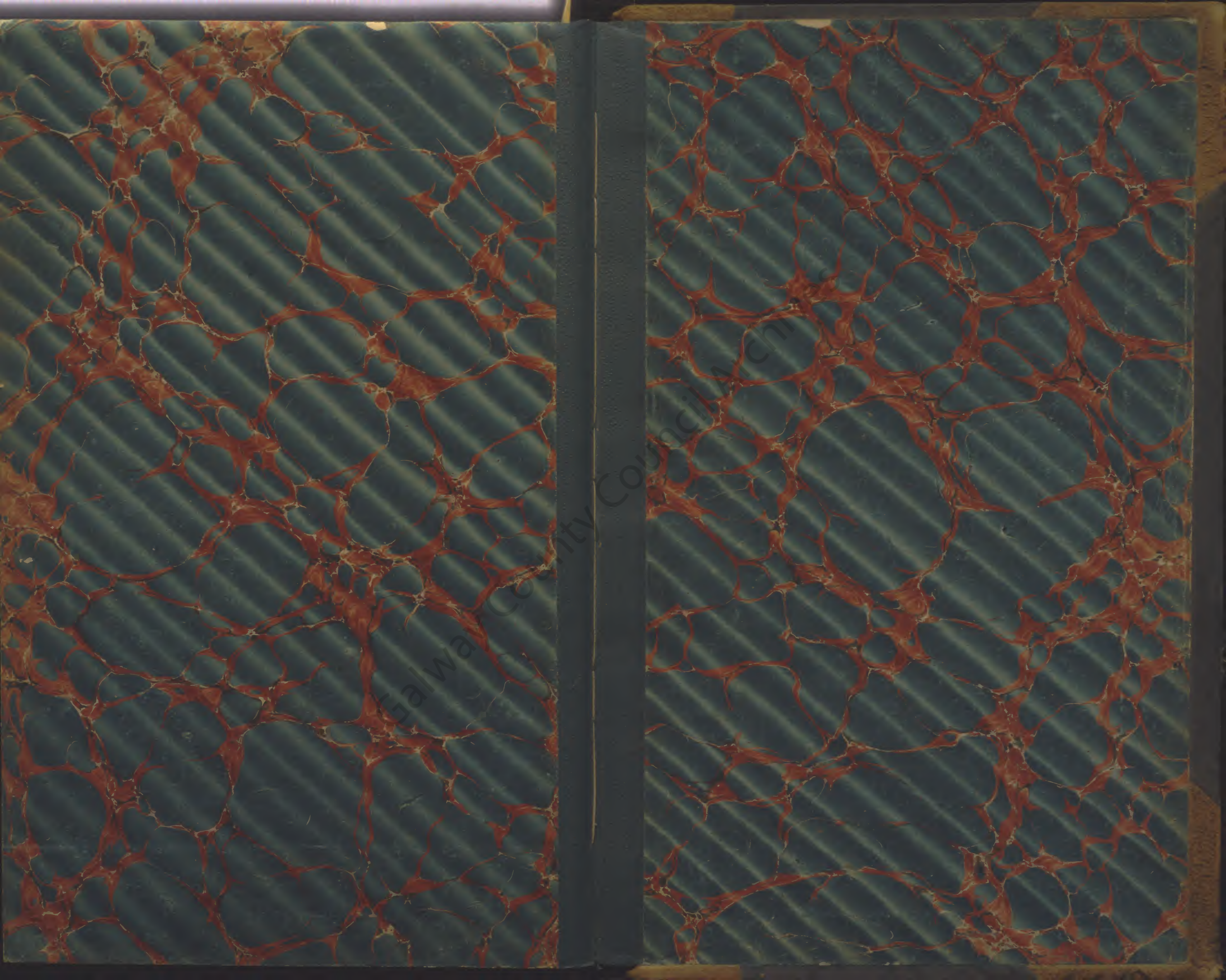
