The Commissioners stated that they have received a report from their Medical Inspector Doctor Geary from which it appears that the locality referred to is in a most unsatisfactory condition in a sanitary point of view.

Dr Geary remarks that throughout the district known as the Claddagh, nuisance of the most offensive description meet the eye every where that empty roofless houses (in number about 20) are used as common privies and that a large open drain to the North East of the Houses is the depository of matters most prejudicial to health.

He further remarked that the town of Galway generally is in a most prejudicial and uncleanly state.

The Commissioners trust that the Guardians will take effective measures for having the locality above referred to placed in as satisfactory a state as possible without delay in order to prevent the evil consequences which might ensue from its present condition and that the Guardians will continue their exertions in having the Provisions of the Nuisance Removal and Diseases Prevention Acts effectually carried out in the other parts of the Town.

Poor Law Commissioners Letter 2 June 1855, No. 817
Acknowledging the receipt of the Clerks Letter of the 29 Ultimo, relating to the Claim made by the Relieving Officer for the Town of Galway for the Cost of the repairs of Windows broken in his House by boys who conceived that he was the cause of their being refused admission to the Workhouse. The Commissioners stated that they were unable to express any other opinion on the subject than that contained in their letter of the 6 April 1854.

The consideration of this letter was deferred till Sunday next.

Poor Law Commissioners Letter 5 June 1855, No. 177.
Referring to a minute which they received from the Ballinasloe Board of Guardians relative to a poor woman named Catherine Lally and child who applied for admission and stated she resided for the last nine months in Galway where she had been at service, and became destitute through sickness. That she made

application for admission to the Galway Board but was refused with directions to proceed to Ballinasloe from where she came. She stated the Galway Board gave as their grounds for not admitting her that it was the custom of the Ballinasloe Board in cases of application for admission being made by Galway paupers that they were invariably refused and sent to pick Tompots and feed on Grass.

The Commissioners are informed, that the woman referred to applied for and obtained admission to the Galway Workhouse on the 12 April last in a sickly state, that she left the Workhouse on the 7 May to go to service to a Mr. Connor near Galway, that when she applied again for admission to the Galway Workhouse. The Board in refusing her admission were influenced both by the fact of her being able to get employment and her being able to proceed to Ballinasloe to which place she was chargeable and this Board entirely repudiate the assertion made by this woman that they stated when Galway paupers apply for admission to the Ballinasloe Workhouse they were invariably refused and sent to pick Tompots and feed on grass. This Board never made use of such an observation.

Poor Law Commissioners Circular 4 June 1855, No. 230 Respecting the Rates made and any new rates agreed upon.

Read letter from Mr. Blakely Solicitor stating that he had caused judgements to be entered on the Bonds of Collector, Considine, Young, O'Flaherty, Kernis and Cormins and now awaits the instruction of the Board as to the proceedings to enforce payment of the

Summs reported against them respectively on foot of their Bonds. He further stated that in his opinion that the appointing of a Receiver over the leasehold property of Mrs Townsend will be a proceeding from which no beneficial result can be expected. The net income of the Leasehold would pay little more for years to come than the cost of appointing a Receiver and passing the Receiver's accounts the Leasehold should be sold.

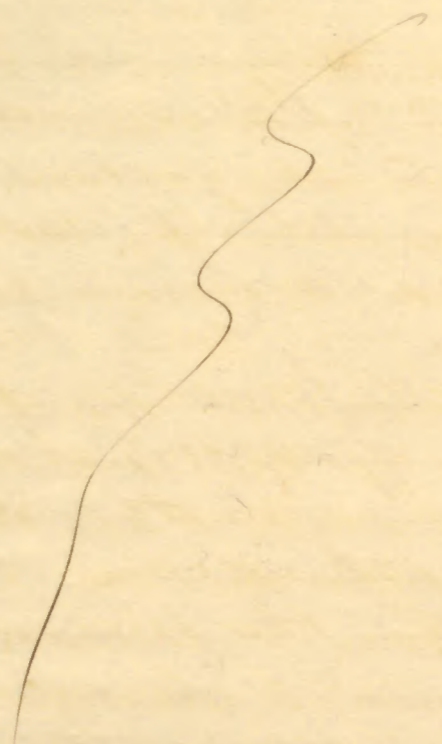

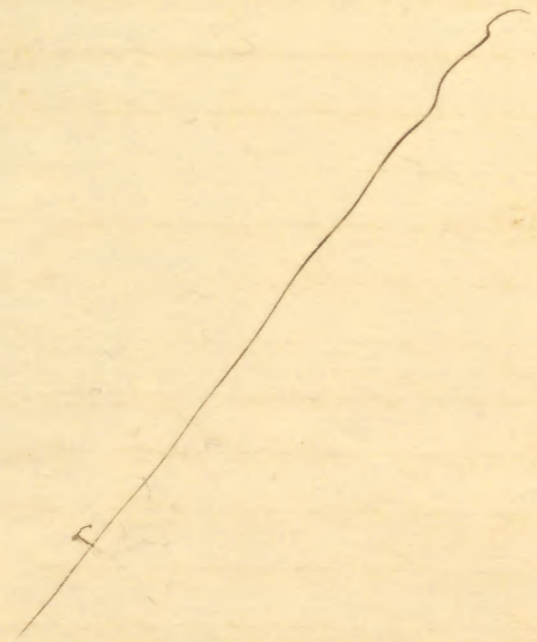

The Mother's application for leave of absence for 12 days or a fortnight in consequence of her illness and death of her child is recommended to the Board that 15 young boys desire their discharge and clothes, old clothes recommended to such of them whose clothes are unfit for their condition on their friends coming for them & giving security

for their clothes they got.

Having made enquiry into the neglect of the Workhouse farm and the injury being done the crops by the boys. The Committee are of opinion there is gross neglect of duty and the required attention on the part of the Wardenmaster and Assistant Schoolmaster and that both of these Officers should be called upon to resign and that the Board would advertise for an intelligent person to attend to the farm and other duties of Wardenmaster most of the House duties of which Officer the Master undertakes and as the Schoolmaster undertakes to discharge the duties of the School and the Master will have the other duties of the Assistant Schoolmaster done. They Committee think the services of the Assistant Schoolmaster can be dispensed with. The Committee having enquired of the Schoolmistress whether she is able to conduct the duties of the School with the Assistant given her states she will undertake to discharge the business of the School the Master on the part of the Matron promising other incidental assistance as she may require.

After a good deal of discussion the adoption of the Report was proposed and seconded. An Amendment was proposed & seconded that the report be adopted with the exception of that part of it having reference to the Assistant Schoolmaster, on a division the Amendment was carried by a majority of 6 to 4. Subsequently the Board pardoned the Wardenmaster but called both officers before the Board and severely reprimanded them and censured the Master for allowing the grounds to get into such bad order and for not reporting the Above Officers.
