The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect: or Orders made on them respectively as follows:—

Poor Law Commissioners 5 July 1856 No 18578 requiring to be furnished with a Return in pursuance of an order of the House of Commons, of the No of Sick in the Workhouse Hospital of Salisbury from on the 1st July 1856, and the nature of the Disease &c.

Ordered, that the Clerk and Medical Officer do prepare said Return and have it forwarded as required.

Poor Law Commissioners Circular 7 July 1856 transmitting Copies of their tenth Annual Report.

Read Letter from the Commissioners of valuation regarding a Clerical error which has been committed in the case of Mrs Doherty's House at Gornmouth that it being valued at £40 instead of £30, and requesting the Clerk to correct same.

Poor Law Commissioners Letter to the Presiding Chairman dated 10th July No 18730 relative to the resolution of the Board of Guardians of the 4th Inst transmitting a Copy of the Rev^d Mr Daley's letter to the Clerk of the Union in reply to a letter of the Clerk having reference to matters which formed the subject of the late enquiry.

The Commissioners informed the Board that they have addressed the Rev^d Mr Daley on the subject stating to him that the Commissioners have been informed that the Clerk was not authorised to address him on the subject of the Enquiry and that he would therefore see that he had been led through misapprehensions into the use of most improper language towards the Board of Guardians of the Union, without any grounds for offence or vexation having been afforded by them. The Commissioners also in their communication to the Rev^d Mr Daley, expressed a hope that he will withdraw the offensive expressions used towards the Board of Guardians in his letter.

The Commissioners are informed that the Clerk had the directions of the Board to summon all officers to attend the late enquiry (not excepting the Rev^d Mr Daley.)

Poor Law Commissioners Letter to the Presiding Chairman 10 July 1856 No 18712 transmitting minutes of the evidence taken by Dr Brodie in the late enquiry. The Commissioners after recapitulating the evidence stated they would issue an order for the removal of the Clerk from office, and recommended the Board to call on Collector Croft, Cousine, and O'Harely, and Relieving Officers Guffin & Kerrins to send in their resignation, and as regards the Porter that he should either give up his Watch repairing or resign the situation.

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After a good deal of discussion the Clerk handed
in his resignation which was accepted by the
Board.

Altho' doing so he said he would complete
the preparation of the Rate Book and all
the other business of his office until his successor
would be prepared to take office.

The following resolution was proposed by Mr.
George Marus and seconded by Mr. B. Mahony
and agreed to,

That the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners
should be considered by a full Board summoned
specially as it requests the Board to call for the
resignation of 5 Officers and as regards the
sealed Order about being issued for the dismissal
of the Clerk, the Board request as a favour that
the Commissioners (to whom the Board desire to
express their thanks for the prompt attention which
they have paid to the interests of the Union in this

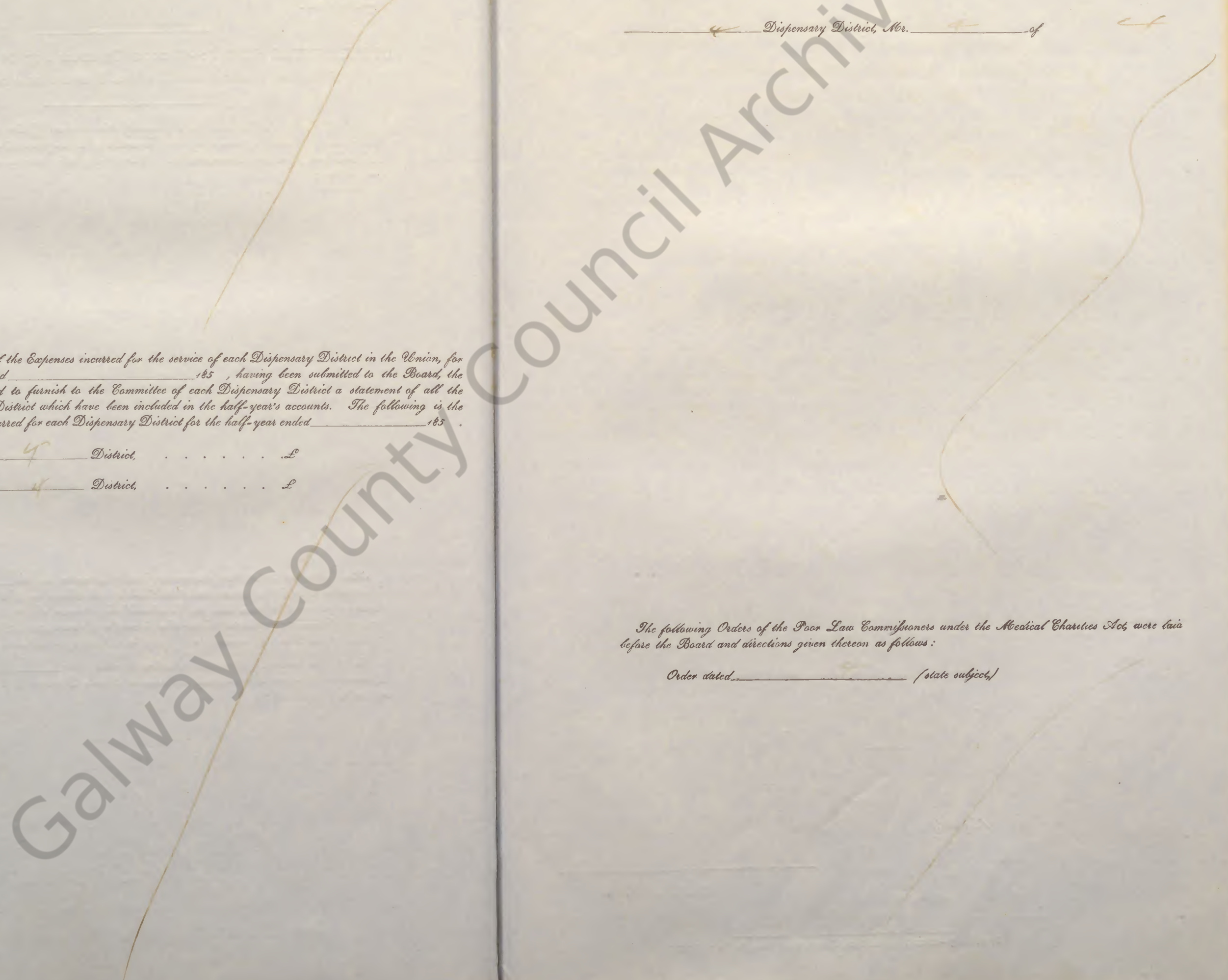

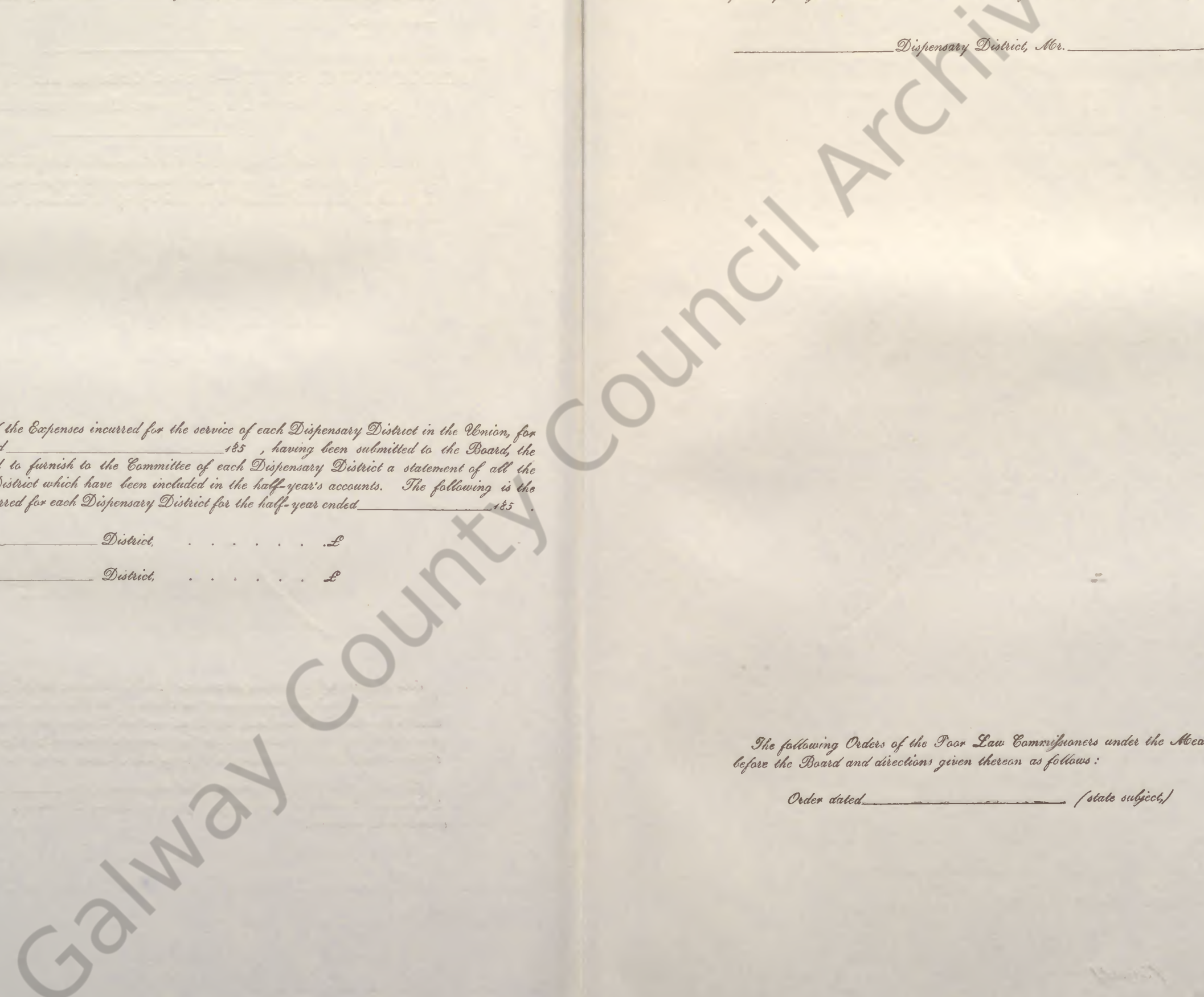

We therefore ~~hope~~ request the Commissioners will reconsider the matter with a view to withdrawing the sealed order issued for his removal and in the mean time that the Rev Mr Daley be requested as a matter of favour to the Guardians of this Union to allow his Curates to continue to afford spiritual comfort and consolation to the inmates of this Workhouse

Mr Kinnam moved the following amendment which was seconded by Mr Blake.

The Guardians on mature consideration express their opinion that the Board of Guardians were not justified in including the attendance of either the Protestant or Roman Catholic Chaplains in accordance with their resolution of the 13th June 1856. Having made this admission the Board respectfully request the Rev Mr Daley will withdraw the strong expressions contained in his letter to the Guardians and to his letter to the Commissioners for administering the Laws for the Relief of the Poor. 

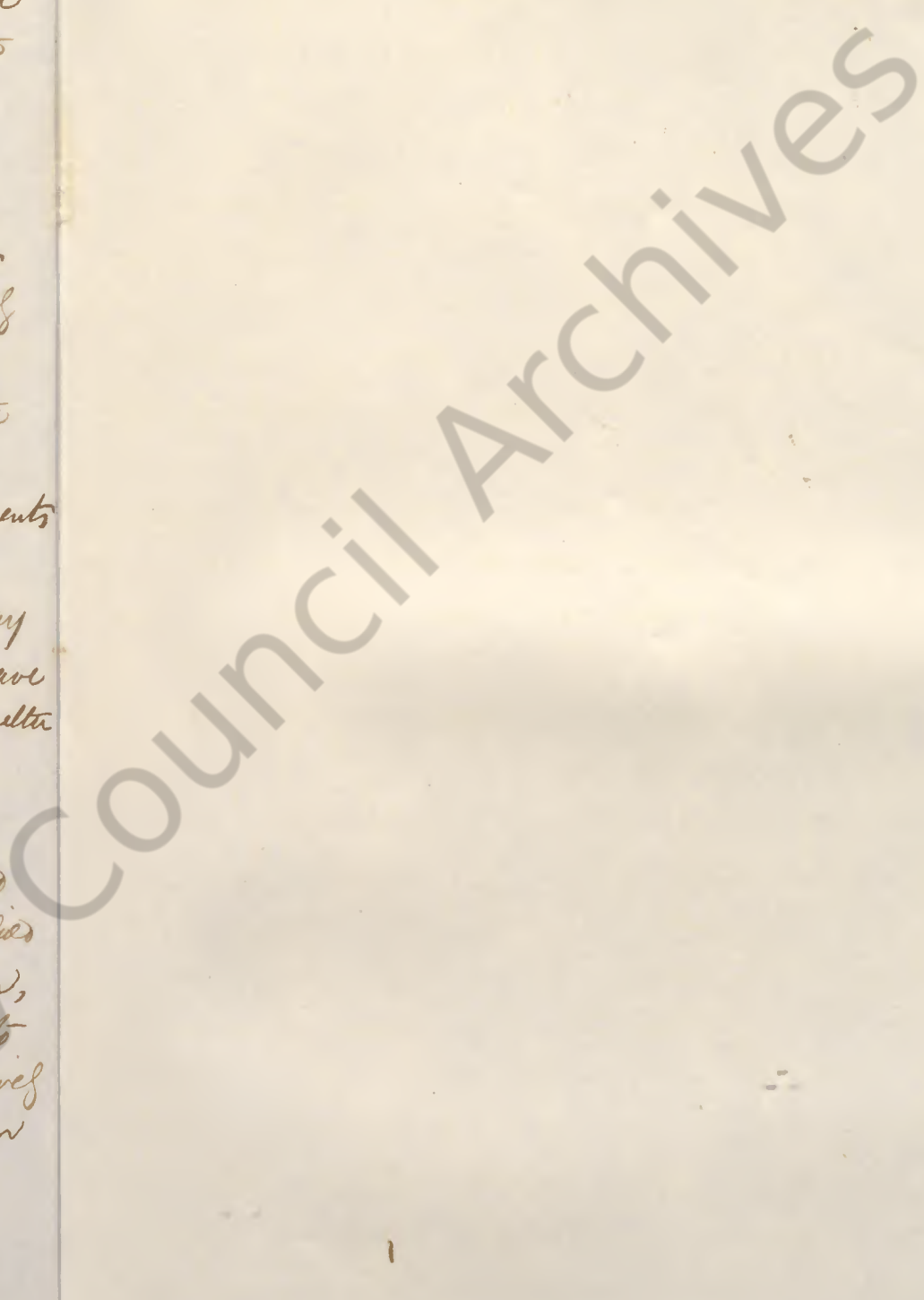

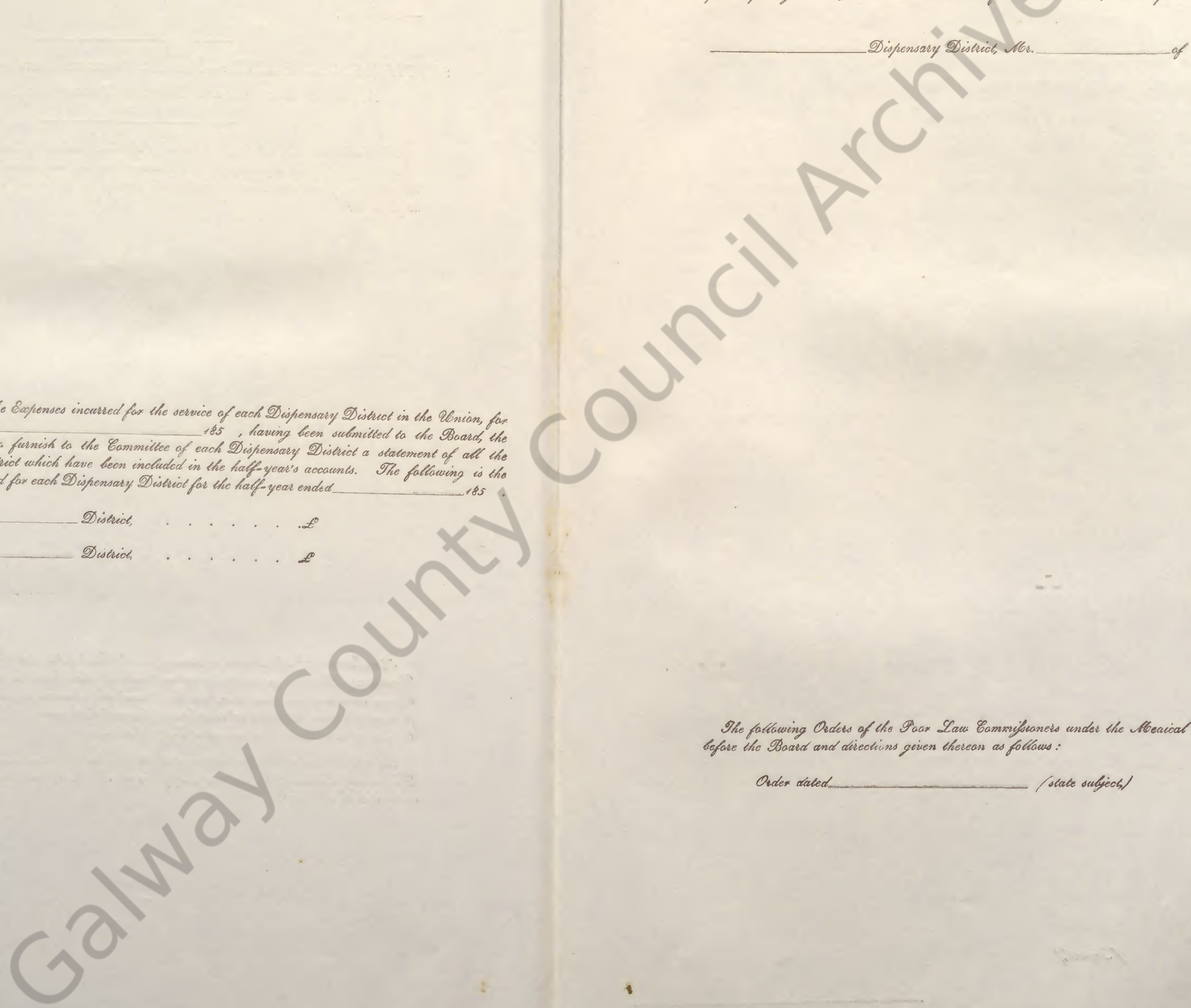

Report of acting Clerk -

Gentlemen,

I have the honor to report that in pursuance of the Resolution passed by the Board of Guardians on last day of meeting. I summoned the Collectors to attend for the purpose of closing their accounts. Messrs Carter Curran Hernan and Cummins attended. Mr Curran handed me his collecting Book for the Electoral Division of Spiddal which I closed and he reported to me at the same time that he gave up his warrant for the Fumbough Electoral Division some time since, but the Clerk's office being sealed up I was unable to obtain it. Subsequently the Committee appointed to take charge of the Clerk's office met, and the office was opened but Mr Curran had then left and I was unable to close the collecting book for the Spiddal Electoral Division, - Mr Hernan handed me his warrant for the Electoral Division of Quismac having collected and lodged the full amount of the last Rate on that Division, his abstract however could not be found and I could not therefore formally close his accounts. Mr Cummins appeared with his books but having stated to me that there were some arrears which he hoped to be able to lodge by this day I thought it better to postpone the closing of his accounts. Mr Carter attended with his books on Wednesday at the hour of 12 o'clock. - He assisted me in making out a list of Rates. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read and Orders made thereon as follows:

Remaining uncollected on the Barra Electoral Division and handed me his Warrant for that Division, - we then proceeded to make out a list of outstanding Rates on the west ward of the Galway Electoral Division, when it was found that a list of arrears and irrecoverable Rate struck off by the Rate Committee some time since was not available. - I should here observe that I know nothing of that document until Mr Carter informed me of its existence. - The Committee having charge of the Clerk's office had left the House when I was so informed and I was unable to obtain it, - I would thought it better under the circumstances to have a complete List of outstanding Rates on the west ward made out, which Mr Carter undertook to do, and I am now ready to submit it to the Board, or to prepare from it an amended statement when I shall have obtained the List of arrears struck off by the Rate Committee, - I feel bound to make mention of the exertions with which Mr Carter attended on Wednesday, Thursday and this morning, and of the assistance afforded by him in closing his accounts.

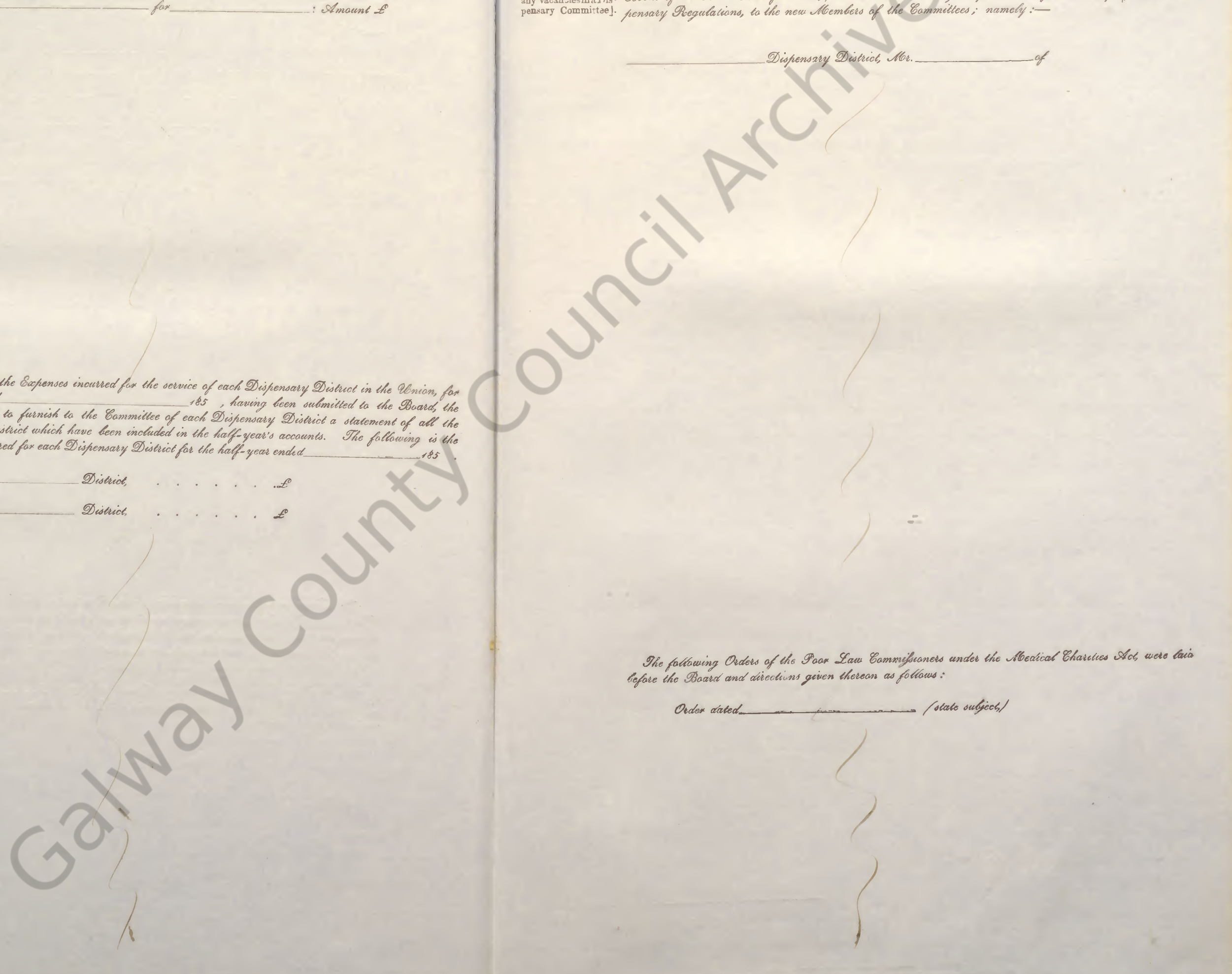
