That since elected Guardians do not fully and sufficiently represent the Ratepayers or Rateable Property of the Three Wards of the Electoral Division of Galway that the proportion of these Wards as well as their Rateable Value as compared with the Gross Population and Valuations of the Union at large entitles the Three Galway Wards to at least one additional Guardian for each Ward

N^o 8252/57 From the Poor Law Commissioners dated 2^d April 1857 desiring to call the attention of the Guardians to the state of the collection of Rates in the District of the Collector of the North and South Wards of the Galway Electoral Division.

The Commissioners learn from the Report that they have lately received from Dr Brodie Poor Law Inspector that more than Fifteen hundred pounds remains outstanding in this Collector District although the period allowed for the completion of the collection has already expired.

The Commissioners think it is desirable that the Guardians should take steps to compel the Collector to proceed with diligence in the collection of the large sum still outstanding in his District.

The Commissioners desire also to recommend to the Board of Guardians the expediency of closing the collection of the Old Union Rates in Galway Union as it is advisable that the final

The following Statement was made
by Mr Blakeney

Gentlemen

I have to report for your information the result of the proceedings instituted by your directions against the sureties of Mr O'Grady your late Clerk. By reason of the absence from the Country of Mr O'Grady the proceedings against his sureties became necessarily separate and I am happy to inform you that although defence was taken to both actions the full amount of the Security Bond has since been lodged in Court and can now be shown out on your Receipt. The sureties are liable to pay the Costs of the proceedings prosecuted against them

In the case of the Appeals lodged by Mr O Mahony against the rates made on the Irishmore Electoral Division of the Union with the object of quashing the rates I have to inform you that the Appeal having been late in its lodgment it was withdrawn and the Guardians Costs of defending it have been paid.

The Case at your suit against Mr John O Mahony late Rate Collector was brought down for trial at the last Assizes but the Judge directed that the taking of the account should be referred to one of the Jurors with instructions not to allow credit to Mr O Mahony for a sum of £29- alleged to have been paid by him to Mr O Grady on account of rates. Mr John Connolly of Barnacilla was the Juror to whom the Judge referred the account and that gentleman has been ever since the day of trial confined to his bed by severe illness and is unable to get into the account. He has however appointed the 22nd Inst to investigate the matter referred to him.

The following statement was made by the Master Callins being ill in Hospital and unable to be visited on the minutes.

Was sent by the Board to ask John Callins a Patient in Hospital as to what he had to say as to his being refused admission to the Aughtlands Workhouse, he being at the time in a dangerous state of Health.

He said that he was for some time a School Master at Rushmore that he was suffering from pains in his head and chest with a continued lisp in the head, that he was on his way from Rushmore to Salway for the purpose of trying to get into some Infirmary or Hospital. That on his coming to Aughtlands he went to the Workhouse to seek a night's Lodging. The Master was at the gate of the Workhouse asked him for a night's Lodging he replied I do not know how to go about your business, I left the Workhouse intending to seek the Relieving officer but on enquiring I was told that he lived 4 miles off. I was hardly able to walk not having knowing where to go to, I was overtaken by a gentleman who seeing my condition and gave me six

Early got a few miles when I became so exhausted that I lay down and fell a sleep during my sleep it rained very hard and when I awoke I was hardly able to move with Pains all over my body. It still continued to rain at intervals I turned from the main road up a copse road where there were some trees to shelter myself from the rain. I became so exhausted that I turned into a field and lay down where I was found by some of the Country People. The Priest Father Henry came and gave me the Rites of the Church. He then sent for the Relieving officer and the Doctor. They both came but the Doctor said I was not in a fit state to go on foot. The Relieving Officer, offered a man of to have bring me into Salway he refused under 4/- I believe the Relieving Officer gave 4/-. I was got some Bread from the Relieving Officer. I was brought on a cart to the Salway Workhouse and was at once admitted into Hospital.

I beg to report that the Master on yesterday Evening wantonly and cruelly beat and kicked two School Boys for no other reason but because they said they were going to bring some Soup to my Room. When I accused him of thus beating these Boys so unmercifully he said I was an infernal Ruffian for making such a statement that he only gave them a slap. He also made several attempts to strike me and called me the most Heathenish names. I have further to state that there are other Complaints which I mean to prefer against the Master, namely that he was procured and decreed by Oliver the Bread Contractor that the Mill Contractor states he owes him £50.0.0 the Balance of a greater sum. That the irregularities visible in the farm is owing to the Masters absence during the Spring. That he entered the Workhouse in a state of intoxication on the night of the first of April last and on many other previous occasions and that the observations made opposite his name on the 1st April has been erased, and making use of the most improper and wounding expressions in the presence of the Pauper. The female Pauper in Mr. O'Shaughnessys service are so remarkably dressed from the other Pauper that it strikes a person how it is that they could acquire these costly clothing or be allowed to wear them in the Establishment. There was some property also abstracted from the Workhouse which he has not reported some leaden Pipe and some portions of lead.

Gentlemen,

I beg to state that having proceeded on Tuesday 9th Inst. to collect the areas of the Killarney and Aughtead Divisions (Old Union) and as there was a considerable sum due on the lands of Birchall the property of Robert Martin Esq. I proceeded there and found a large quantity of stock on the lands. I proceeded towards the stock when a number of persons came up as I was approaching them. They asked me, what was my object in coming there when I exclaimed that I came to collect the areas of Poor Rates and that it was my intention to remove some of the Cattle. The answer was that I had better remove myself as quickly as possible or else they would be obliged to compel me to remove at once, seeing that to persist in moving them and being without a sufficient force of Bailiff to effect a capture I was ~~secretly~~ reluctantly obliged to withdraw. I then went to the house of Kelly and Barth Walsh and stated the object of my visit. They mentioned that they were quite prepared to pay if Mr. Martin would give them allowance in their Rent but added that they had taken this land free of all taxes up to the time they came into possession, and under these circumstances did not consider they were liable. I saw Walsh next morning at Meenon near Aughtead and in presence of Mr. O'Flaherty he stated that he had seen Mr. Martin who instructed him that the payment I would receive would be to assault and beat me if I attempted to seize on the stock. I at once came back to Galway and lodged information with Mr. Scully B.M. who has promised to afford me the necessary protection in the collection of the areas of Rate due. I have made considerable progress for a portion of one day under his protection and will be able in the course of next week to have from £40, or £50. lodged to the credit of the Board.

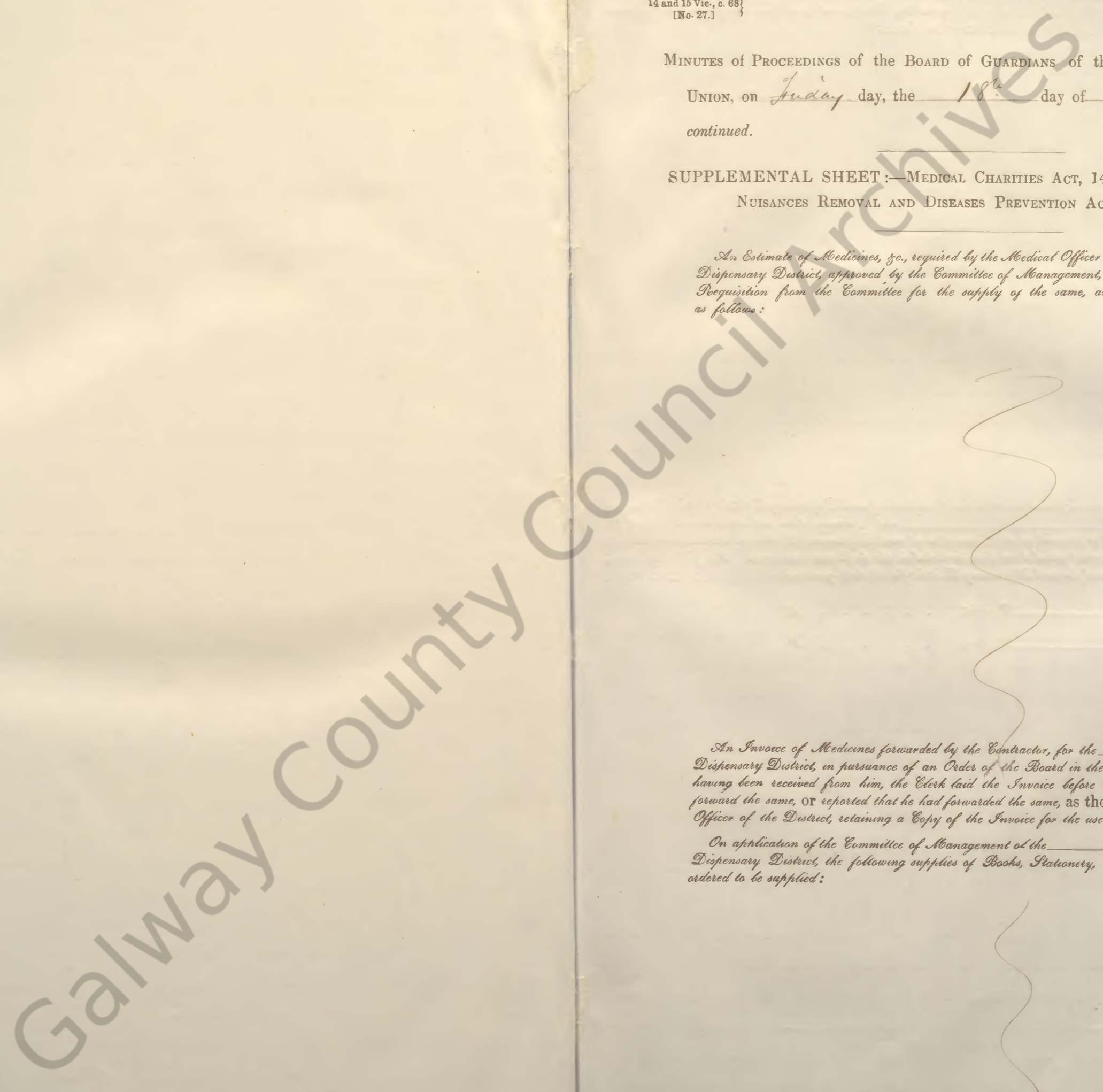

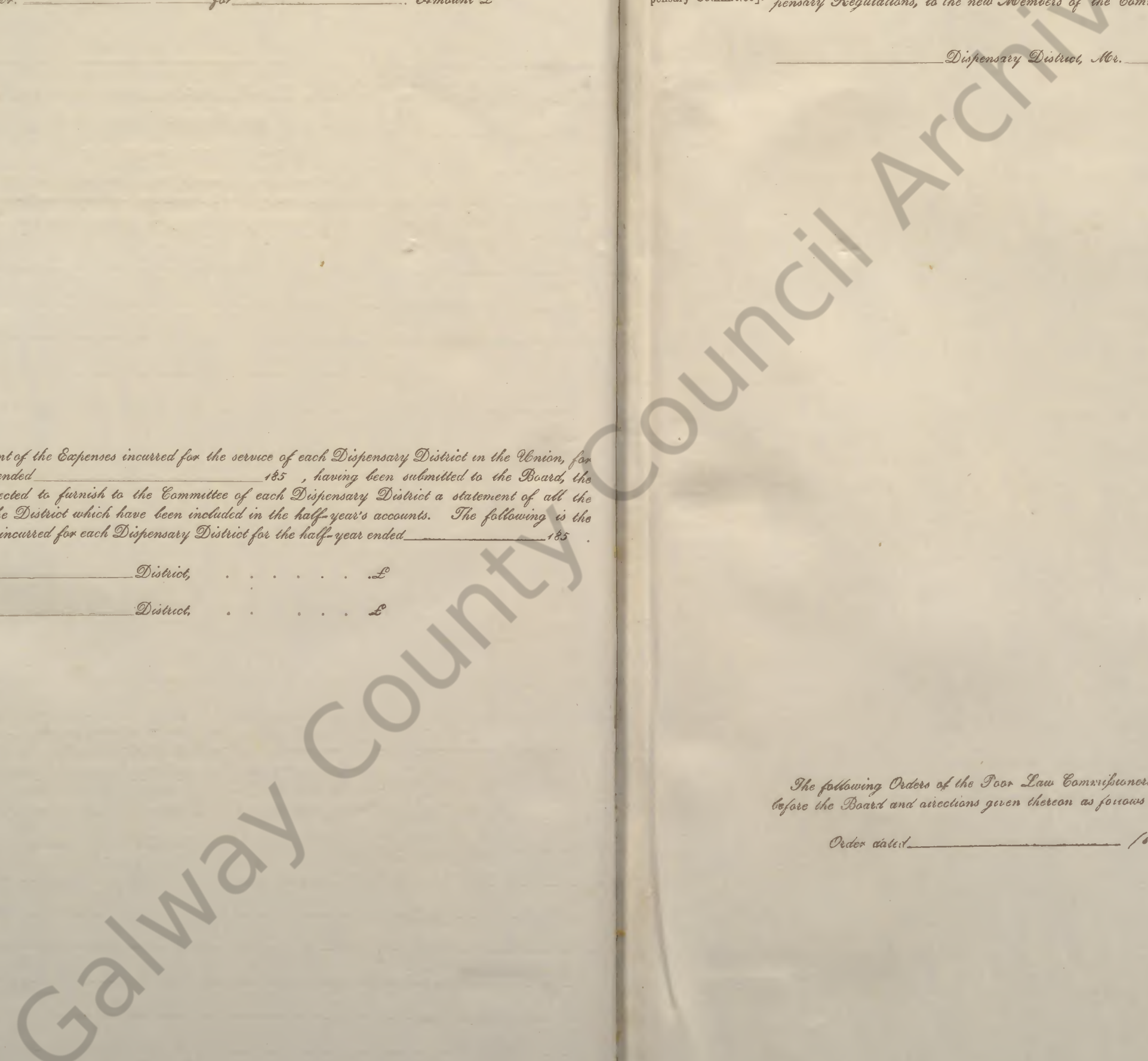
