Respecting the new gate required for the mens yard, I beg to lay before you a Tender which I have received for an iron framed gate, and another tender for a wooden gate,

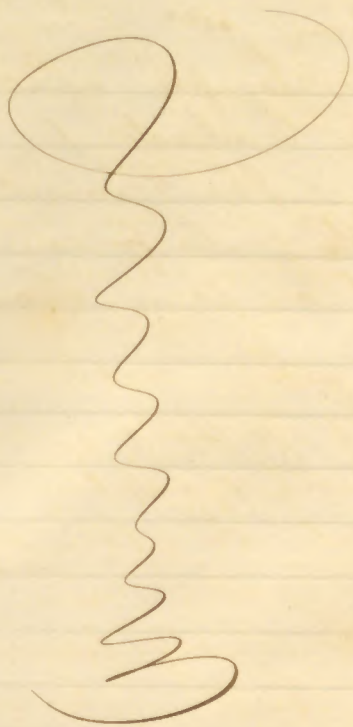
The gas has been erected and lighted in the Hospital, and is working satisfactorily

Resolved

That inasmuch as at least ninety five per Cent of the Paupers in the Irish Workhouses are Roman Catholics, we are of opinion that at least one of the Poor Law Commissioners for Ireland ought to be of the same religious persuasion as the enormous majority of the Paupers and Ratepayers,

and the adoption of it was moved by Thos. Commis Esq. seconded by Anthy Dowdall Esq. and carried unanimously -

The following resolution was proposed by Thos. Commis Esq. seconded by Joseph Leahy Esq.

Resolved

That considering the unchristian and neglected condition in which the Catholic inmates of this House amounting to several hundreds have been left during the past year without any religious aid, and the Poor Law Commissioners having failed to provide such aid as the law directs, We respectfully apply to the Parish Priest Rev Peter Daly who so efficiently discharged the duties of Chaplain in this Union for nearly 20 years, to request he would kindly provide Mass for the inmates of this House, who are his parishioners until such time as the arrangements may be made to have a Chaplain appointed thereto,

The following Amendment to the foregoing resolution was proposed by J. W. Curran Esq. seconded by Bernard O'Hallerty Esq.

That the Bishop of Galway be respectfully asked to recommend to the Commissioners a person to be appointed as Chaplain for this House,

Clergy are strictly bound to administer irrespective of the sacred nature of pecuniary compensation, that could never be my motive for resisting the tyranny which has left the unfortunate inmates of the Workhouse squalid without mass, as I received the last part of the salary attached to it, but I contended for a principle in which the discipline of the Catholic Church was involved, and which if Priest or Bishop yielded he would no longer be worthy of his position as a Minister of that Church, please to present my respects to the Guardians of the Union at their next meeting

Sir I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter enclosing the resolution unanimously adopted at the last meeting of the parlay guardians conveying to me the thanks of the Board for the exercise of my authority in the appointment of a Chaplain to the Workhouse. While I cannot but deeply appreciate the courtesy and urbanity of so respectable a body of gentlemen, I must in justice disclaim any title to special merit for an act which under the circumstances became for me a duty of imperative necessity.

Gentlemen

I beg to report to you that on Sunday last Divine Service was celebrated here for the protestant inmates by the Rev. Mr. Caldwell and for the Catholic inmates by the Rev. Mr. Goode -

The Milk supplied by the Contractor is often of an inferior quality. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday he failed in supplying the due quantity, on two of which days I gave Cocoa, and on one day Tea, as a substitute and on Tuesday morning I gave a double quantity of milk for Breakfast.

The Tailor repaired during the week 15 pairs of Boys' trousers and 5 waistcoats

On Thursday at Mr. Reid's desire I sent all the weights and measures belonging to the Workhouse in, to the Courthouse to be examined

On Thursday I was called upon by the Matron to assist her in getting a refractory girl named Mary Walsh into the Lock Up. I did so, and in a few minutes, after breaking 9 panes of glass of the windows of that ward, she succeeded in breaking the staple of the door and getting out, where she got some stones and broke 3 panes of glass of one of the windows of the Dining Hall. I went immediately and lodged information against her; she was taken to the Police Barracks to stand her trial on Monday. The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon, as follows:

With regard to the management and manner of laying out the Workhouse grounds, I would beg respectfully to suggest the following method as the most judicious and economical under existing circumstances — There are upwards of 3 acres of land attached to the House and as the few able bodied men who remain here during the winter, leave at the approach of spring, therefore the hoeing of the crops, must chiefly devolve upon paid labour, which from the high rate of wages of the spring season and the large extent of ground to be cropped involves a large expenditure. Another feature is that there can be no more manure made in the Establishment than will manure half the land leaving the other half dependent on artificial manure. Under these circumstances I would suggest that the south and west quarters of the ground (comprising about 2 acres and the worst for cultivation), be now sown with oats, and properly laid down with Hay seeds and clover, to form permanent meadow, which eventually will be found to be more remunerative than tillage, in as much as that these two quarters should be cultivated and manured artificially at a heavy expense. I would then propose that the North quarter of the land containing about 1/4 acre (and which is the very best portion of the land)

be kept under tillage - it will supply the House every year with plenty of vegetables viz. Cabbages, in succession Parsnips & Carrots. Onions & Leeks, Parsley and other small herbs &c. &c. together with a small plot of Turnips & Potatoes there will be only enough of manure annually for this plot and I consider that if these suggestions be carried out I would afterwards by great exertions contrive to cultivate this piece of ground independent of paid Labour

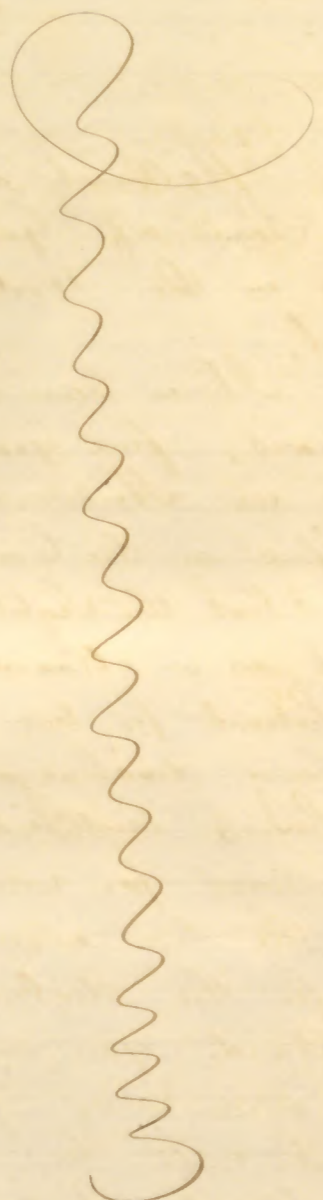

Michael Holland aged 48 years having applied to the Board of Guardians of the above Union for relief in the Workhouse made the following Statement,

I have been residing in England for upwards of 14 years, five years of which I have been residing in Huddersfield and upwards of 9 years at Halifax in the County of York. In January 1858, I lost the sight of both eyes being then employed as a seasons Labourer, I was admitted as a Patient for two months to the Halifax Infirmary, after being discharged from the Infirmary, I applied to the Parish Authorities for relief, they granted me two shillings per week for two months, at the end of the two months Mr. May the relieving Officer for the district called upon me, and said "Holland you are an Irishman & cannot get any more relief from the Parish and a Warrant will be immediately issued to send you and family to Ireland, your little furniture shall be sold to defray the expense of your removal, my wife hearing this she pawned her clothes, my sister in Law who is also employed as a servant advanced her wages to enable my wife to pay my expenses to Ireland fearing the Relieving Officer would put his threats into execution, I arrived in Oranmore in June 1858 and having completely lost the sight of both eyes, I am unable to do any work, some relatives and the neighbours who knew me before I went to England, in the Townland of Dalmacounty, charitably gave me some support, they now refuse to give me any further assistance, owing to my infirm condition I am compelled to seek any asylum in the Workhouse, of this Union, my poor wife & three children are still residing at Halifax in Yorkshire,

That as regards the alleged want of Cooperation, the Schoolmaster, Schoolmistress, & Station Concer^r in denying that the late Master made any Complaint on the Subject and although Mr. Stullin adhered to his original ~~resolution~~ statement on this point & referred especially to the Station he failed to bring forward any proof of his assertion or to give any instance of neglect of duty imputed to the other Workhouse Officers. The Comm^{rs} at the same

time deem it right to state that the terms of the evidence given by Mr. Stullin as well as the report of the Inspector in regard to the Circumstances attending his resignation & the charge which he has put forward reflect very unfavorably on him. The Comm^{rs} therefore recommend the Board of Guardians to Call the Station, Schoolmaster & Schoolmistress before them & to caution them that the good management of the house cannot be permitted to be interfered with by any private or personal differences between paid officers of the Union, & that any well founded Complaint of that nature bearing an injurious effect upon the management of the house, must lead to the dismissal of the parties concerned.
