May 1860, Calling the attention of the Guardian to the large amount of Poor Rate still uncollected, the period allowed for the Collection having expired requesting the Board to Call upon the Collectors to Complete their Collection without further delay. - Ordered - That the Clerk do write to the several Collectors to that effect -

N^o 11.548. 1860. Letter from the Poor Law Comm^{rs} dated 24th May 1860 on the Subject of the investigation held by D. Brodie into the unsatisfactory state of the Workhouse & the alleged want of Cooperation amongst the Workhouse Officers, & of assistance to the late Master. The Comm^{rs} state it appears from the evidence that there were good grounds for dissatisfaction as to the Condition of the Workhouse Establishment & a necessity for renewed Care & attention on the part of the Workhouse Officers is plainly shown. That as regards the alleged want of Cooperation, the Schoolmaster, Schoolmistress, & Station Concer^r in denying that the late Master made any Complaint on the Subject and although Mr. Stullin adhered to his original ~~resolution~~ statement on this point & referred especially to the Station he failed to bring forward any proof of his assertion or to give any instance of neglect of duty imputed to the other Workhouse Officers. The Comm^{rs} at the same

time deem it right to state that the terms of the evidence given by Mr. Stullin as well as the report of the Inspector in regard to the Circumstances attending his resignation & the charge which he has put forward reflect very unfavorably on him. The Comm^{rs} therefore recommend the Board of Guardians to Call the Station, Schoolmaster & Schoolmistress before them & to caution them that the good management of the house cannot be permitted to be interfered with by any private or personal differences between paid officers of the Union, & that any well founded Complaint of that nature bearing an injurious effect upon the management of the house, must lead to the dismissal of the parties concerned.

The Officers referred to being brought before the Board & the portion of the Evidence having particular reference to them was read by the Chairman, who hoped that no Complaint would be rendered necessary to be brought before the Board for the future -

That We request of the Poor Law
Comrs to direct Dr Jearry to call on
the Lord Bishop of Tuam on the subject
of the Trust fund in his Lordships hands
for the Salway Dispy purposes, as Dr Jearry
is about coming to the neighbourhood of Tuam
on official business, it would be a good opportunity
to have a personal interview with his Lordship
to explain the Law of the Case to him.
