In furtherance of a desire very generally expressed, and of the recommendation of a Committee of the House of Commons to have a portion of each Union Workhouse exclusively set apart for religious worship, the Visiting Committee have devoted some time to the inspection & measurement of the Dining hall, and consideration of a sketch, for the proposed object, furnished by the Poorlaw Commissioners.

In making these calculations, and comparing the space allotted for the Chapel, in the plan of the Commissioners, with the extent of accommodation requisite in the dining hall for the inmates (the present number being 240 with a certainty of increase) the Committee are of opinion that more than a due proportion has been marked off for the Chapel.

Possibly, it has occurred to the Commissioners, that the numbers, whatever they may be, who frequent the dining hall, being as they are almost exclusively Catholic, would require equal room in the Chapel. But it should be considered, and the Committee have taken it into account, that at least one fifth of the Hall is occupied with tables, hence they recommended that the proposed area of the Chapel should be curtailed to that extent, as indicated by a red line on the sketch. With this exception, and altering the position of the door leading to the Mens' Ward—to save the necessity of opening a second, the Committee approve of the course pointed out by the Commissioners, as being best under existing circumstances.

The Committee in going through the house have tested the quality of the Milk, bread, Indian and Oaten Meal supplied by the Contractors, and found each unexceptionable. They recommend the issue of 50 Mens' and 50 boys' Caps, those in use being completely worn out.

In reference to the Ward in which the women with illegitimate children are placed, requiring as it does general repair and enlargement, the Committee recommend the works to be executed by Contract. ~~It is however questionable whether it would not, as suggested by Mr. R. A. King, be a more economical, as it certainly would be a more permanent arrangement, to convert a portion of the unoccupied dormitories as day and sleeping rooms for this class, than continue, year after year, patching up those timber sheds which are fast going to decay.~~

A visit has been paid to the Boys' School, the Committee felt gratified at the laudable assiduity shown by the Master in the discharge of his duties, and at the proficiency exhibited by the pupils—considering their youth, in elementary education.

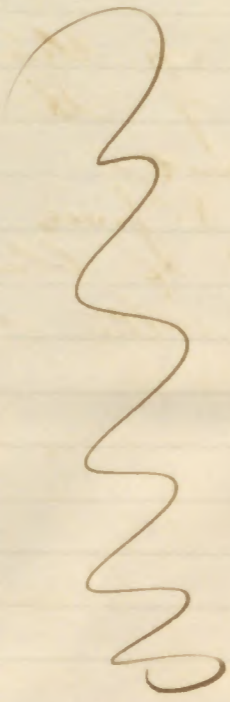

The Farmers state to me the Wheat Crop is deficient in Quantity and quality and no more than half the Average of last years yield, Barley appear scanty and in poor condition Oats is stated to be a good Crop a great deal of which is still in the fields uncut some few fields I have remarked will not be fit for the sickle before Christmas, Green Crops are backward in growth with few exceptions and do not appear to be cultivated to the extent of last season. The Turf is still lying in heaps on the Tops of Caunbrowne & Namore wet and unfit for Fuel. With reference to the Potatoe Crop I am informed that the Crop including sound and diseased ones are no more than half the average Crop of last season. Potatoe planted early in the Spring in dry sandy soils Peat Bogs & moorland are only slightly diseased, whereas Potatoe planted in deep heavy Retentive Soils are diseased to a considerable extent. Gentlemen
I most respectfully beg to report that divine service was celebrated here on last Sunday by the two chaplains for their respective congregations in compliance with the orders of the Board of Guardians at a meeting held on the 25th ultimo I caused the Nurses to bring their children to the dining hall and had them fed in the presence of myself and the Matron. In our opinion the complement of Bread and milk now served out to this class is sufficient for all children under one year. The children above one year and under two years eat their food for the day in two meals leaving nothing for the third meal or supper. It may be necessary for me to state that a few of the Nurses told the Matron they had no breast milk for the children. I reported this case to the Medical Officer and had them examined by him. He states they have no breast milk. In such cases as these I respectfully suggest that a little extra milk be given to these children for a drink during the day. An order required for two tons of straw for refilling beds. An order also required for three short iron coal or fire boxes. The mens and boys clothing in wear and in store require to be repaired. I respectfully beg to recommend that a Tailor be employed for a few weeks for the purpose of putting the clothing alluded to in proper order. The stock of clogs and shoes now in store are all unfit for wear with the exception of 10 pair. The Board will please consider this matter and order a supply of leather for shoes or clogs whichever they consider best for the winter

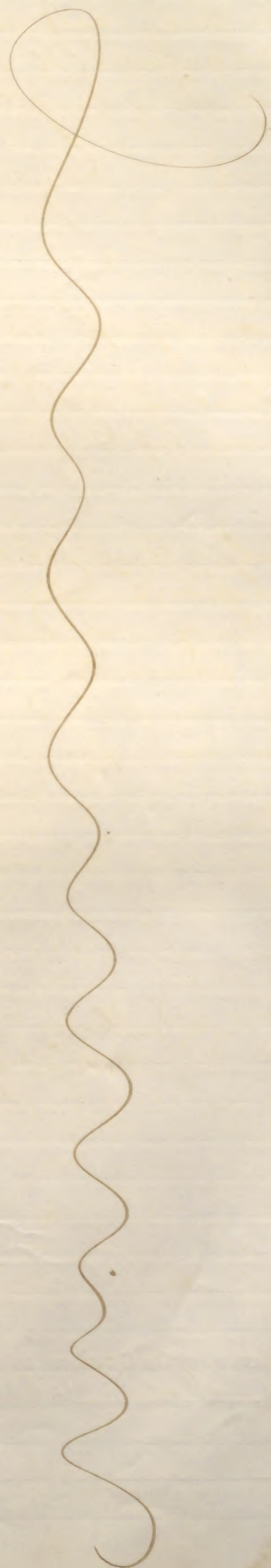

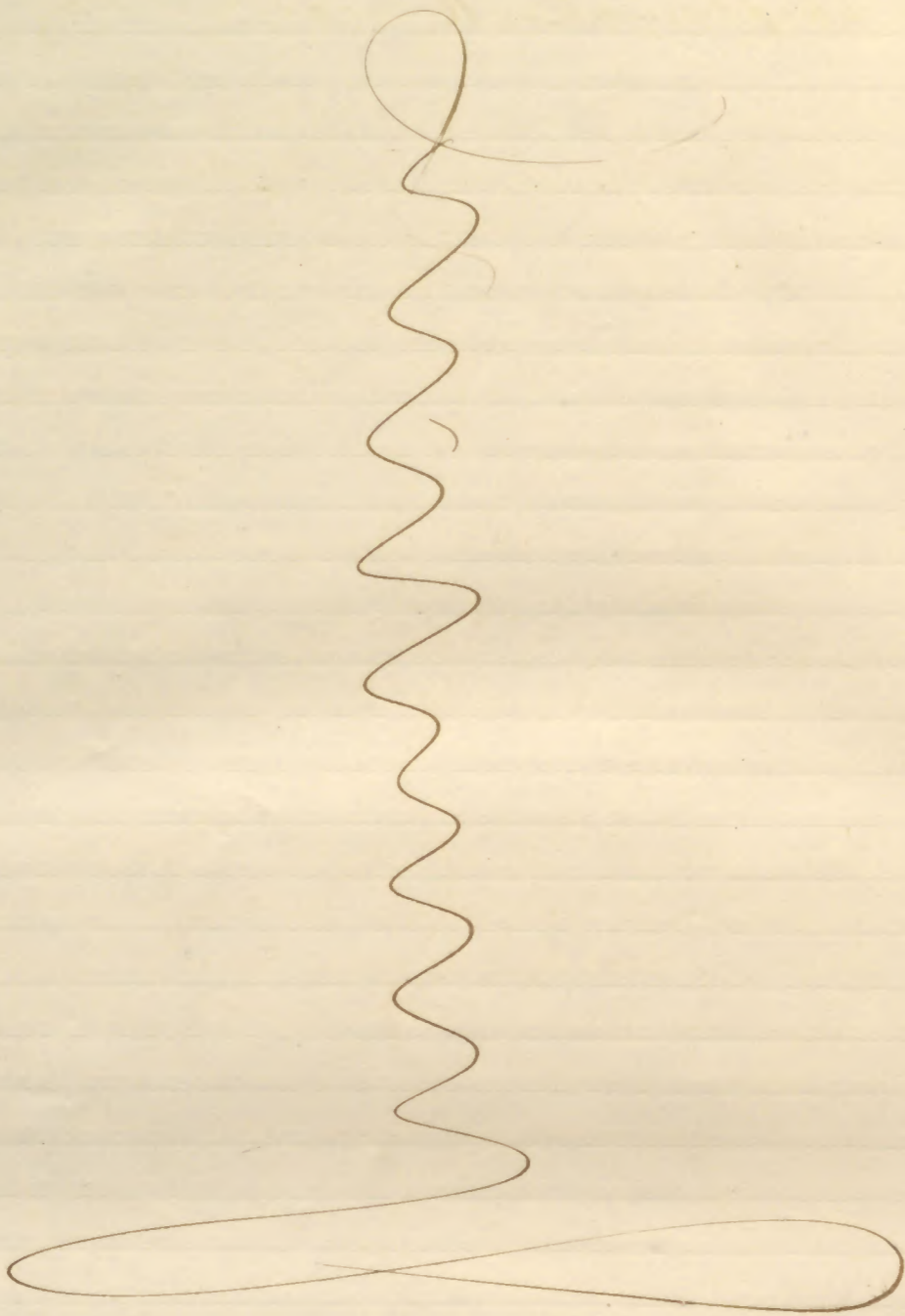

The Visiting Committee having assembled to consider objections raised against the Ratebooks of the Galway E. division—
their accuracy being questioned, in the course of a lengthened & very
minute investigation, presided over by the Chairman of the Board,
it was discovered that various premises set down in the Ratebooks
as "vacant", were, on the evidence of the Collector, occupied at the making
of the rate particulars whereof are given in Schedule annexed with
Collector's Report.

The Committee being apprehensive lest any
advantage should hereafter be taken of such informality, or mis-
description, and the rates on the premises thereby perilled, una-
nimously adopted the following resolution, and instructed the
Clerk, without loss of time to forward a copy of it to the Poor Law Com-
missioners for their opinion and advice.

Resolved, That having ascertained that several premises in
the town of Galway—inserted in the Ratebooks as "vacant" were at the
making of the rate, and are now occupied, that other premises have passed
into the hands of new tenants, and that the usual corrections as to the changes
of occupancy, had not been made, although the Ratebooks lay on the table
more than the time prescribed by law for the purpose, should this state of
things be suffered to exist, a large sum in rates will be lost to the Union
and parties disenfranchised, who ought not to be, if the proper revision
took place, The Committee therefore strongly urge the Guardians not to sign
or issue the Collector's books until the necessary alterations shall have been
made with the consent of the Poor Law Commissioners, & that their opinion shall be sought
as to the legal mode of effecting the changes.

The Committee also entertained an application from the
Master, for permission to keep two of his children in his apartments
in the Workhouse, in consequence of another child of his having been burned
to death outside, owing to the want of proper vigilance. The Committee
were unanimous in conceding this favor to the Master under the afflicting
circumstances disclosed.

It having been reported by the Relieving Officer, that at the
burial

of a pauper at Oranmore, the Coffin used was so slight and im-
perfectly put together, that the Nails drew, and the boards became
disjoined - so that with considerable difficulty, and public expo-
sure the Corpse was committed to the grave.

The report of such a disgraceful exhibition, led the
Committee to examine the Coffins in store, which they found com-
posed of such frail material (5 leaf deals), coarsely wrought, un-
planed, void of ribs, and held together merely by a few slender
ledges, and headless Nails, that they urgently impud on the Board,
for the sake of public decency, and some respect for the dead,
either to annul the Contract for the supply of Coffins, or compel
the Contractor to amend his Contract, by introducing a specification
of the particular and proper scantlings to be used in future in ac-
cordance with the terms of the advertisement inviting Tenders,
and which the Contractor proposed to follow
