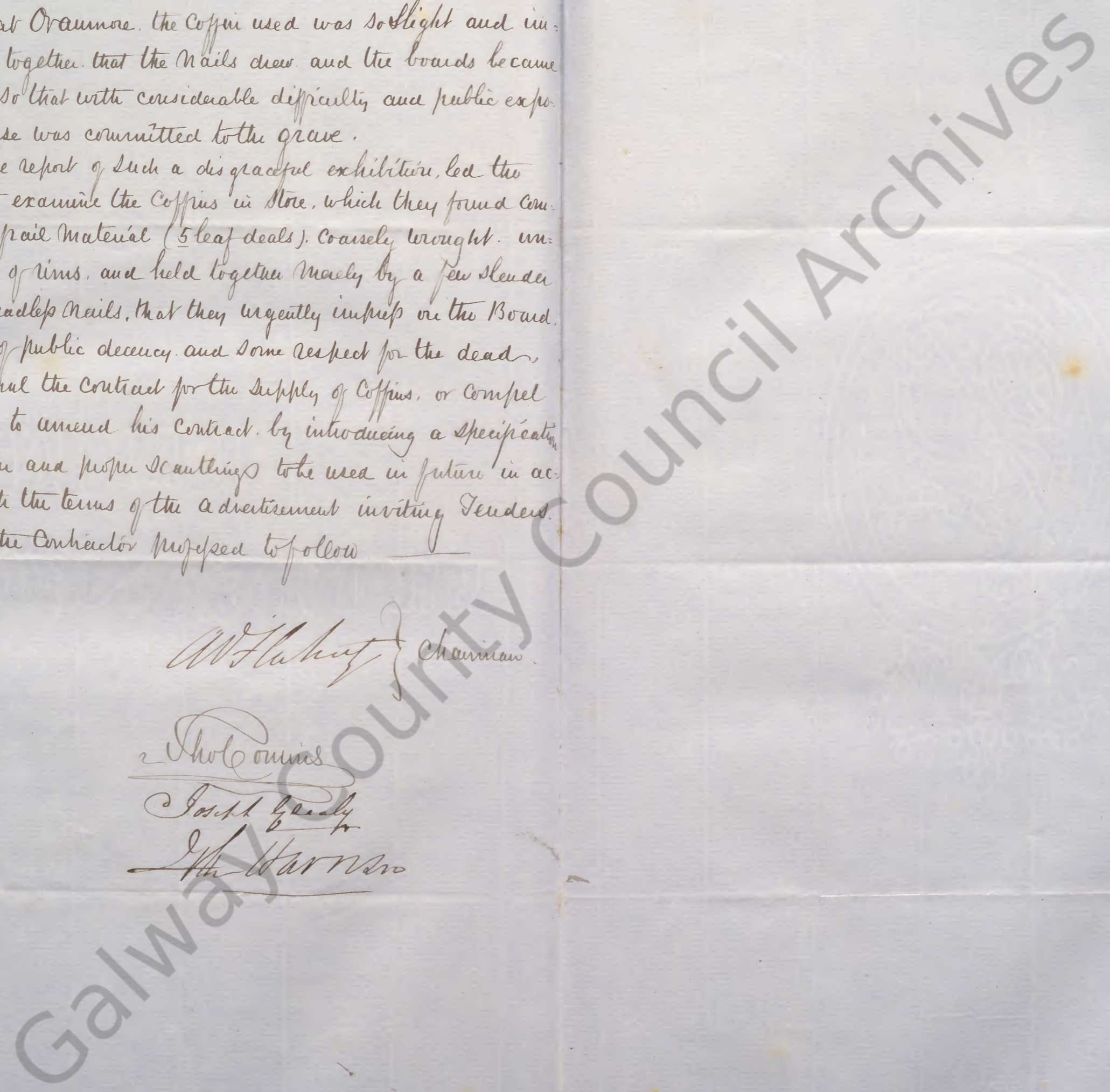

ledges, and headless Nails, that they urgently impud on the Board,
for the sake of public decency, and some respect for the dead,
either to annul the Contract for the supply of Coffins, or compel
the Contractor to amend his Contract, by introducing a specification
of the particular and proper scantlings to be used in future in ac-
cordance with the terms of the advertisement inviting Tenders,
and which the Contractor proposed to follow

Letter from the Poor Law Commissioners dated 14th Nov. 1861 on the subject of the resolution passed at a meeting of the Visiting Committee representing that errors exist in the rate books of the Galway Electoral Division and recommending the Board not to sign or issue the Collectors books until the necessary corrections shall have been made. The Commissioners state that the Guardian cannot themselves amend the rate after its make but the 106th & 107th sections of 1^o & 2^o Vic. Cap. 56 provide that the Assistant Barister may on Appeal order persons names to be inserted in the rate books but that the Guardian may alter the Books in any case in which a claim to be rated may be made on them under the 110th Sec. of the Act 13th & 14th Vic. Cap. 69. The Commissioners observe that the Clerk of the Union and the Collector should be required to furnish explanations as to the cause of the errors.

The Clerk being called on for an explanation read the following statement:

Gentlemen,

In answer to the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners on the subject of the resolution adopted by the Visiting Committee relative to the omissions in the rate Books I have to state that the course usually adopted in revising or altering the rate books is that the Collector is called upon by the Clerk to come and inspect the rate books and make a list of any changes necessary to be made which the Clerk is to lay before the Board to be ordered by them.

If the Board order this to be done I will require 3 Tailors in addition to the one I have, as one Tailor would not have them made less than five or six weeks. The Schoolmistress was ill from a cold for the last 4 days and could not attend school. The Matron placed a pauper girl named Ellen Murphy in charge of the children and had them taught their lessons every day. The Schoolmistress tells me she will resume her duties. The girl having regained her health and been discharged from the Hospital on the 3rd inst. the Master notified the fact to her mother desiring her to take her out. Accordingly the mother came for her on Saturday the 14th inst. and the Master being about purchasing flannel for the use of the Paupers I deemed it my duty to discharge the girl. But the Porter coming to the door of my apartment refused to allow her out and said that my authority should not extend beyond the door at which I stood at the same time abusing me in the most violent manner & calling me the most opprobrious

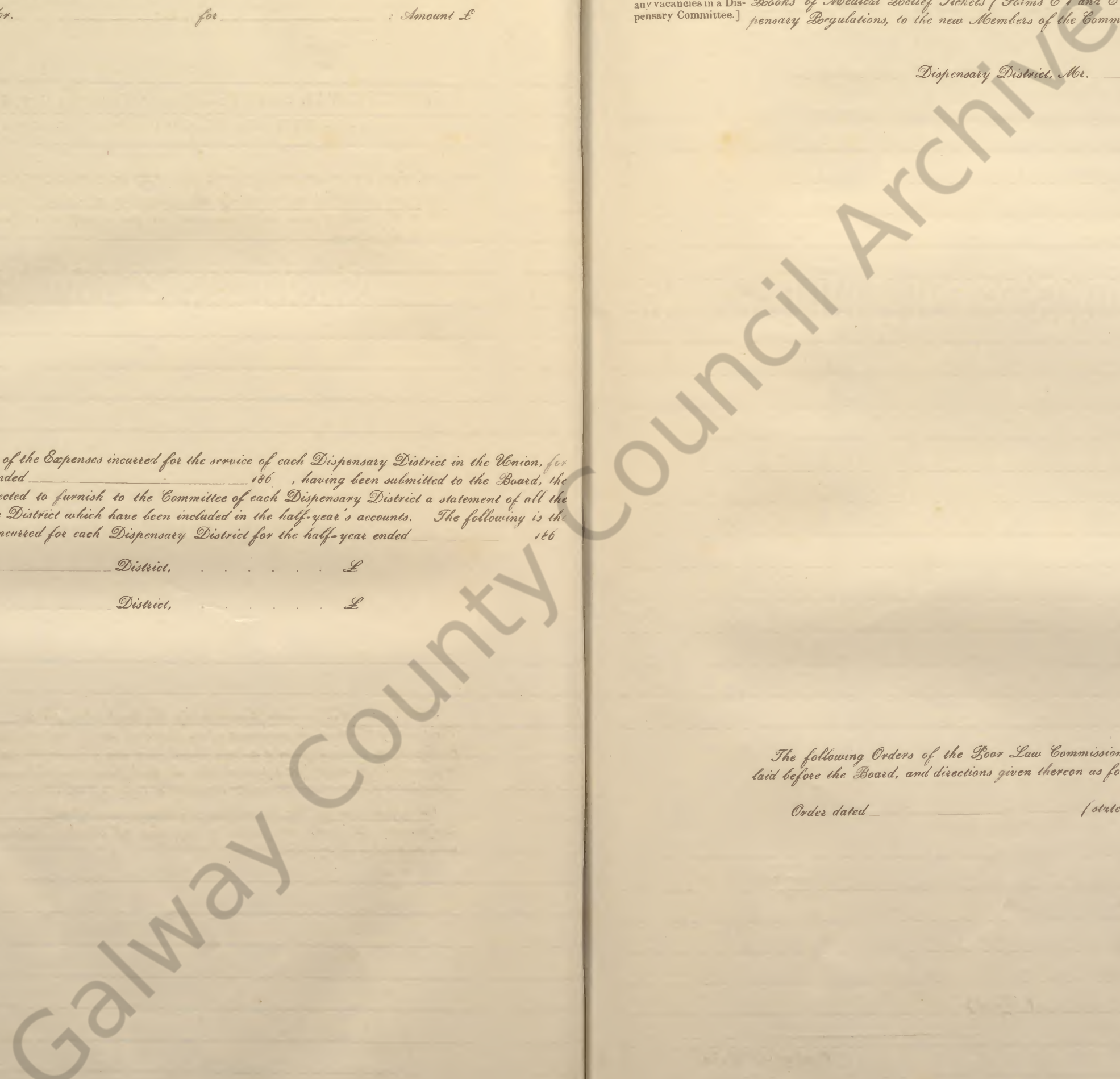

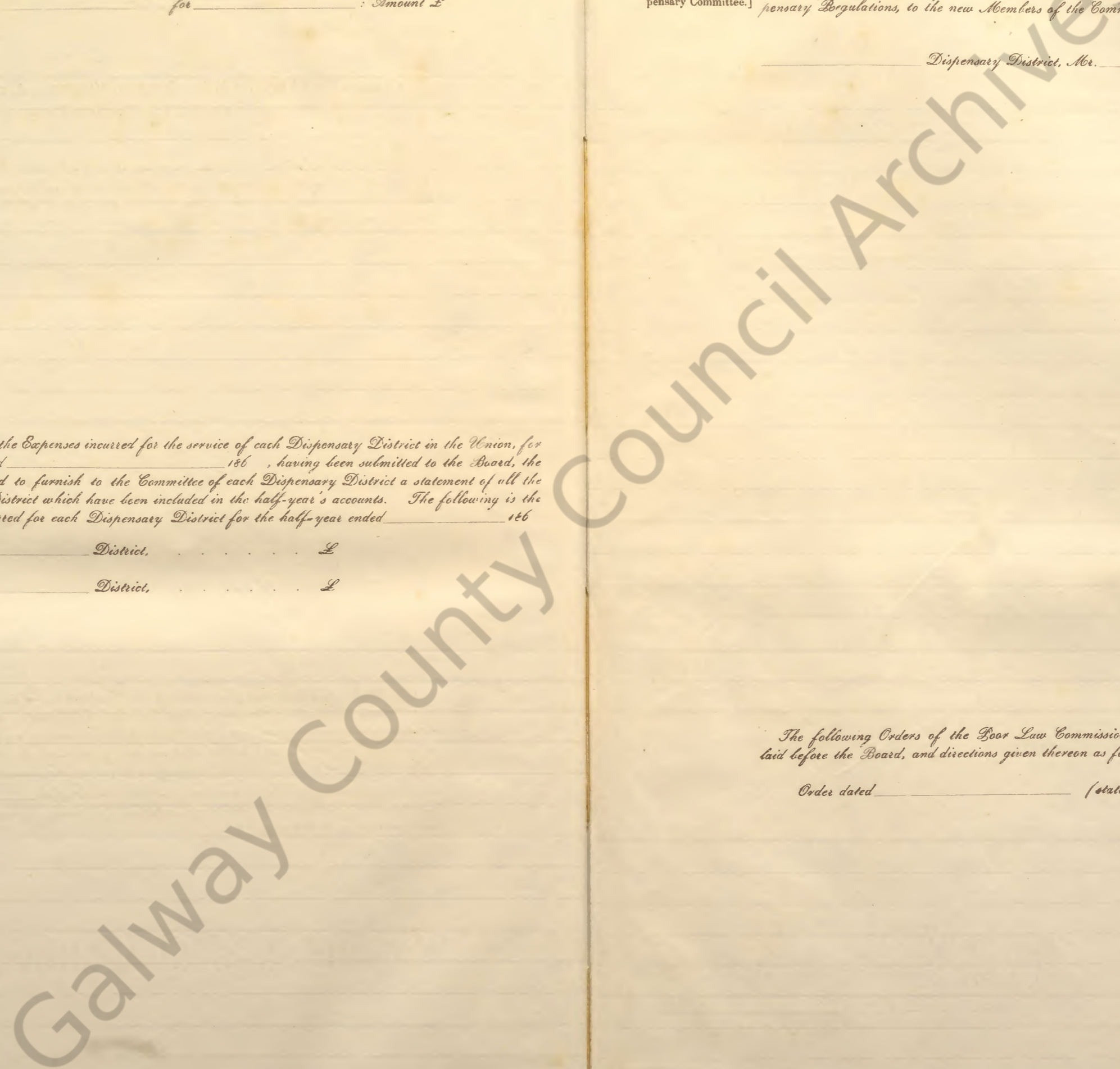
