Letters were read from Dr Stony and from Mr L. S. Mangan requesting, respectively, payment for Vaccination performed, and for gas consumed in the Workhouse.

Doctor Browne having informed the Board that the leakage from the Gas pipes in the Hospital was offensive and unwholesome, the Clerk was directed to write to Mr Mangan requesting that the Gas Co would send a man to have this defect repaired before next Board Day

The Master brought before the Board a dangerous Epileptic lunatic pauper who demanded to be discharged from the Workhouse - After having heard what the pauper had to say, and the representations of the Medical Officer and Master of the Workhouse upon the subject the following Resolution was adopted by the Board

James Calligj a pauper made application to the Board for his discharge but after a minute inquiry, the Board resolved that he was not a proper case for discharge. On the contrary on a statement made by Dr Browne and the Master of the Workhouse that this man was an exceedingly dangerous Lunatic, it was resolved that the Master be directed to take steps to have him brought before the Magistrates with the view of his being committed to prison as a dangerous lunatic prior to his transmission to Ballinacloe Lunatic Asylum.

+ Read Letter from Messrs Gleeson Simpson dated 27 January 1862 agreeing to the reduction made by the Board in the price of Blankets supplied.  
 Ordered That the Clerk request Messrs Gleeson and Simpson to enter into a bond for the due fulfilment of their contract -

The Chairman brought under the notice of the Board a paragraph which appeared in the Galway Vindicator of Wednesday last to which he directed the attention of Mr Cullen and requested him to make inquiry respecting those cases.

The following letter from Mr Cullen on the subject was read  
 Relieving officers Office  
 Galway 31 January 1862

Gentlemen  
 Having read a Paragraph in the Galway Vindicator of Wednesday last - Headed "Homes misery - Death from starvation" - I have made inquiry into the truth of these statements, and I am happy to say that the cases of distress put forward are entirely without foundation. James Murphy who died on Sunday last in the old House in Cross Street had been several times an inmate of the Workhouse; he left that Institution in August last and has been since up to Thursday last employed by James McDonogh of Cross Street. McDonogh's daughter states to me that during the time Murphy was ill they supplied him with abundance of food; the "M'Donoghs with whom he lodged state that he had more food than he could use, and that he never made use of the expression "throw me out into the street there to die" rather than that "I should be sent to the Workhouse";



With reference to the old Bladdagh Fisherman who has been led on the Sticks or Skins of Potatoes, and who has neither Blanket or Sheet, - I visited the old man, whose name is Tom Connell; he denies ever making such a statement and I am informed by parties who I can rely upon that old Connell has a considerable sum of money and will be able to provide himself with the necessaries of life.

Gentlemen  
 Having laid before your Board on last day of meeting a report relative to the alleged cases of destitution and death from destitution described by the Galway Vindicator of the 29<sup>th</sup> January last. I again repeat there has been no foundation for that statement. In last Saturday's issue of the paper my <sup>above</sup> paragraph is <sup>questioned</sup> relative to the above report. I beg to reiterate my former statement and at the same time I do so I challenge any member of the Relief Committee, or the Editor of the Vindicator to contradict one line of my report to the Board of Guardians as your paid officer I have a public duty to discharge and I shall do so faithfully

A very lengthy discussion arose upon this letter, having reference particularly to a statement alleged to have been made by Mr Cullen with regard to the state of the roof of a house in Cross Street. Report of Visiting Committee  
1 February 62

Influenced by an anxious desire to make ample provision for any increased number of admissions which may possibly arise. The Chairman of the Board and Visiting Committee met on Wednesday and devoted considerable time, assisted by the Medical Officer, Clerk, and Master, to a thorough examination of the entire Workhouse, its Hospital - and its Subsidiary buildings. The Committee feel gratified in being enabled, after the strictest investigation, to report - to the Board, that with some additions to the stock of clothing and bedding, and the economising of room by shifting some of the classes, the House may be rendered capable of accommodating several hundreds beyond its present number of inmates. In order to protect the classes who frequent the Dining Hall from any risk of contamination arising from bad example and to carry out classification more strictly, the Committee consider it expedient that those women with illegitimate children should either have their meals supplied at hours different from the others or given to them in their own building, a portion of which appears unoccupied. With a view to preserve the sanitary state of the house, they recommend that the male adult class be transferred in day terms from the Infirmary men's day room which is overcrowded to a shed in the men's yard. The Committee bear willing testimony to the

Cleanliness, and comfort which were apparent in every department and ward of the Hospital as they passed through it: the sick and convalescent - attending to the attention with which they were cared and their wants supplied. There are a few minor points affecting the general management of the house which appear to the Committee to require some improvement and which may hereafter be looked into, but they deem it better not turn aside from the paramount object in view, namely, to use every available means to meet any pressure, which the Committee are sanguine enough to believe the Guardians will be fully able to cope with. Finally they decided that the articles hereinafter enumerated should be cast from the stock of clothing, as unfit for use, 10 mens shirts, 20 Flannel Vests - 25 mens' and 25 boys' caps, - 17 womens shifts, and 20 petticoats - and that the Master should at once employ two Tailors to make up new clothing and repair old. They have selected two needle women from the wards to assist the Master in the clothes cutting department.

Statement made by Thomas Connell, the old man residing at Claddagh referred in the letter addressed to the Board of Guardians by Mr Cullen, Relieving officer, on the 21<sup>st</sup> January 1862 -

I know Mr Cullen. - When he went to my house he asked whether I was sick, and said he heard I had £2.15.0 in money. - On my oath I had not one pound at any one time for the last 20 years. - My house was in the same state when Mr Harrigan, Mr Martin, and Dr Melville visited it, as it was when Mr Cullen and a gentleman in boots went to see it. There was no person with Mr Cullen on his first visit. The house was in the state on all those occasions. I was in bed on the first visit, and at the fire on the second. I had no sheet on either time. My shirt was pawned to get the price of coal and a quart of milk. I had a blanket on me in the bed, it was white, broken in the middle. I had a horse rug for a quilt. I had a Jacket given me by Mr Morris. I had no suit of clothing, save what I now wear, and can produce a witness to prove, that I had no more than I have no boat, nor a share in a boat; have not had for 40 years past. - When Mr Cullen called I told him I wanted something to eat, I had a few Potatoes, a little Bread, and a bit of meat, which I was sparing for my dinner. - I gave half to a woman in the house. The provisions found in my house were supplied by Mrs Lynch in Charity. I am owner of the house in which I live, and pay no rent to Mr Cullen. - John Fahy paid the last rent for me about five years ago. - I have no means of support but begging. - I receive, meal, bread, and candles from Mr Morris to the value of 6<sup>d</sup> per week. - I am over 60 years of age. I was out fishing last harvest, and was turned out of the boat, having no net. - My bed was a penny worth of straw laid on the ground. - I have a pot, a stool, a bowl, and a mug. - I have neither table

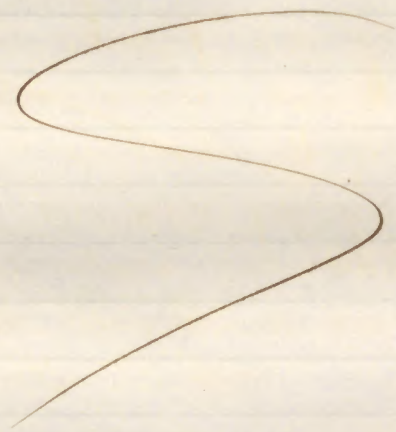

Galway, 14 February 1862 -

Gentlemen, The several persons mentioned in my report to your Board on last day of meeting are removing the nuisances complained of. Some washing and otherwise cleaning their premises, with the exception of Pat Kane of William Street West, and Peter Faherty of Henry Street. I have summoned these parties before the Magistrates at Petty Sessions on yesterday; the Magistrates ordered the nuisances complained of to be at once removed & Kane and Faherty to pay costs. The great want I find in the several premises visited by me, especially in large Buildings let out in small tenements, is the want of properly constructed privies. If the owners of these premises would construct privies and keep these privies cleaned, I am confident it would in a great measure tend to the cleanliness of the Town and do away with those unwholesome nuisances to be met with daily on your Public Streets and foot ways. Gentlemen,

In compliance with the order of the Board, I beg to state that my attention had been called by Police Constable Mullin to the case of Anthony Walsh on the 14<sup>th</sup> Inst. - whom I found sitting at the large door of a person named Hughes at Bohunores. I asked him did he wish to be removed to the Workhouse, and if so, that I would provide a conveyance and have him sent there all once. Walsh refused to become an inmate of the Workhouse. No previous application for relief was made by him, or on his behalf. Mrs Caulfield who gave Walsh Lodgings, the night before he died, stated to me that she gave him some food for his supper, and on leaving next morning she provided him with Tea. In July last, Walsh was fined at the Petty Sessions Court for an assault on a young woman at the Long Wall. To the Chairman and Gentlemen of the Board of Guardians of Galway Union.

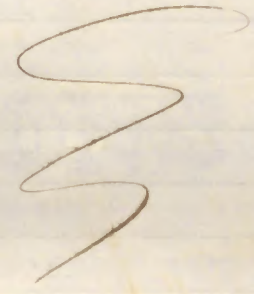
Gentlemen, The circumstance of my having been appointed to the Medical superintendance of other institutions connected with our Town and County would, I find, prevent my devoting sufficient time (without injury to my health) to the discharge of the heavy duties of this establishment. I feel therefore I am only acting up to the trust you have placed in me by tendering to you my resignation as your Medical Officer.

Gentlemen, I take this step with very great regret. I have been 20 years connected with this institution, and with your assistance and most generous liberality I have been enabled to bring the Hospital into a high state of efficiency, to maintain it so up to this day, and to have obtained for it the confidence of the working classes as well as the poor of this Union, and I feel my separation from this Hospital and your Board most deeply. I have, Gentlemen, to return you my most grateful thanks for your unvarying kindness to me during this long period of trial, and, in taking my leave of you, I venture to hope I may carry with me the friendships I have had the good fortune to make here and which I will value all my life. I trust it may not be considered out of my place giving expression to my deep sense of gratitude to the Poor Law Commissioners, and to their Inspectors, with whom it has always been my good fortune to have stood well, and to whose assistance and advice I owe so much, and to none more than my kind friend Dr Brodie.



I beg also to return my thanks to your excellent Apothecary, Mr Broughall, and the Officers acting under him in the Hospital, to whose unremitting care and kind readiness to obey all my directions I attribute much of the good order and regularity to be observed at all times in your Hospital.

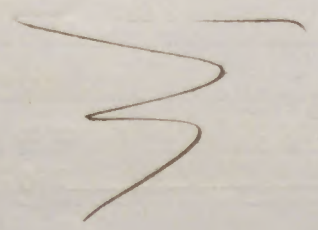

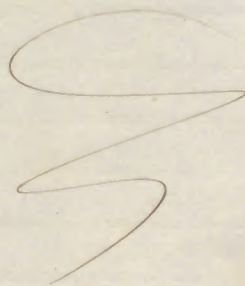

Report of Visiting Committee  
7 May 1862

The Visiting Committee having this day met to consider among other subjects, the extra diet given for their services to paupers assistants throughout the House, the scale of which was laid before them by the Clerk, in pursuance of a Board minute made in February last. After discussing the matter fully, the Committee are not prepared to recommend any reduction at present in the Staff: they deem it inexpedient from the augmented number of inmates to do so, notwithstanding the serious expense involved by these increased rations. They are distributed amongst 16 individuals / 4 males and 12 females, the cost of which exceeds the ordinary half diet by 3/9<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> per head per week, making in the



the aggregate a sum of £63 annually. This cost being allocated in proportion to the numbers in the House, passes heavily on the Galway Electoral Division, as the paupers chargeable thereto are 27 out of 566.

To the Committee it appears inconsistent that while the officers Rations are an establishment charge the rations of these subordinates or petty officers should not be included in the same category, inasmuch as the women are employed as Ward-mistresses and in attending the Hospital, Cookhouse, and dormitories, and the men consist of an Hospital surgeon and watchman. Food is given besides as extra to paupers who make themselves useful, and to the messenger, which may be safely discontinued. The extra Rations allowed to the woman who attends the Cookhouse are also superfluous.

The Committee next examined and checked over the stock of clothing and bedding, the entire of which they found classified with the utmost regularity, and the stores and dormitories in good order and well ventilated. The articles they have set aside as unfit for use are Blankets 19, Sheets 10, Womens gowns 20, Petticoats 6, Shifts 20, Aprons 29, Caps 84, towels 6, girls frocks 40, Shifts 20, & Aprons 48. In accordance with the recommendation of a former report all such articles should be distinctly defaced, either by cutting up or being branded, as "cast". There are 1750 cotton neckerchiefs for

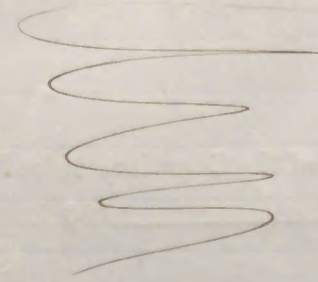

a lengthened period in store; these are of little or no value in their present shape and the Committee suggest their conversion to some more requisite articles of clothing, such as children's undergarments. The attention of the Committee has been also directed by the Clerk to the system pursued by the Master, in accounting for the consumption of meal when converted to Bread, namely, by allowing an increase of  $\frac{1}{7}$  <sup>the</sup> to the weight of meal issued as representing the quantity of <sup>baked bread</sup> ~~made~~ ~~consumed~~ ~~or~~ ~~now~~ ~~state~~. In explanation the Master stated such was the practice he found established when he took charge, and he did not deviate from it. The Committee conceive <sup>this</sup> an inaccurate rule for obtaining proper results, because the received opinion is, that instead of  $\frac{1}{7}$  <sup>the</sup> ~~or~~ <sup>14</sup> per cent being gained <sup>in the</sup> ~~in the~~ process of Bread making an increase of at least 25 per cent is obtainable. In other words, 112 lbs of Flour will yield 36-4 lb Loaves, or 144 lb weight. In order to have this question correctly ascertained they have requested the Master to get 112 lbs meal worked up, baked, and the Bread therefrom accurately weighed, and when so done to report results to the Board. The Clerk kindly volunteered to supervise the operation. Looking at the entire stock of clothing as compared with the numbers in House, an increase in several articles is required, such as Jackets, Trowsers, shirts and Shifts, Petticoats, men's and Boys' caps. We observed with pleasure a great improvement in the cleanliness and order throughout the entire house

Dr Colahan, Medical Attendant at the Fever Hospital, who was present at the Board's meeting, stated that the cause of non-admission was the late hour at which it was sought that he was obliged in the interest of the sick inmates of the Institution to direct the Porter not to receive persons into the Hospital after a certain hour of the evening. Dr Colahan also directed attention to the fact that Dr Consideine, Dispensary Medical Officer, had directed the patient in question to be removed to the Fever Hospital so early as 2 o'clock on that day, and that it was near to 11 o'clock when the application was made at the Hospital.

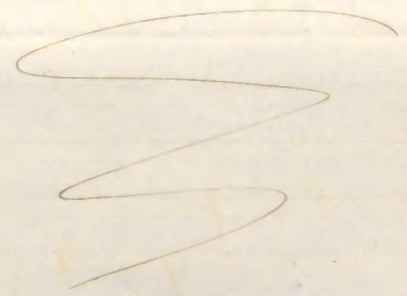

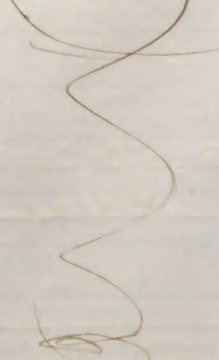

Copy - Opinion of Michael Morris Esq on instructions sent him to draw Petition to the Court of Chancery for the transfer of funds in pursuance of the directions of the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union and the Dispensary Committee.

In my opinion no further or other Petition can be presented. Any new Petition should only be an echo of the former, and the order made by the Master of the Rolls on the 19 January 1859 is as favorable and as general in its terms as could ever be obtained. It directs a reference to the Master to ascertain and enquire into the truth of the two sums of £700 and £500, to settle a scheme or plan for the future disposition of the fund and to decide who



who should be the future trustees of the fund." It is suggested in this case that the fund should be transferred over absolutely and without any more about it to the Guardians or Dispensary Committee. I do not see a shadow of ground for such an application. The principle universally ruling funds for charitable purposes is "that if the charity to which the fund had been applied is no longer in existence, or is altered to such an extent as to render the former mode of allocation no longer feasible, the Court of Chancery will see that the fund is applied in a manner as near as conveniently can be to the original plan and that one of the Masters will be directed to settle upon the future plan" - The Master will of course be very much guided by the suggestions of persons interested, and as the Guardians and Dispensary Committee represent the parties who would be the most interested, I have no doubt their scheme or plan would if reasonable be adopted by the Master. The scheme drafted by the late Mr Kelkenny was only a sketch of his own and was never before the Master. The Guardians can therefore now bring forward any plan they think fit for the Master's approval, making themselves sole trustees for the future application of the fund according to the plan suggested by them: it will be for the Master to approve of alter or modify such a plan. What I therefore advise is that a Committee of the Board should sketch out a plan for the future application of the funds to such charitable objects as they think best and that such plan be brought before the Master under the present order of reference to him, which can be renewed. - I don't understand the suggestion that the fund should be transferred to the Guardians like a cheque on the Bank; what rights have the Guardians to such a transfer rather than any member of the Community at large? They may get the management of the fund under certain fixed rules as to its distribution, approved of by the Court of Chancery through its Master, but they have no greater right to ask it to be just handed over to them unconditionally than I have to ask it to be handed over to me to put in my pocket. The mode of proceeding is not - give us the money and we will have a plan of our own hereafter - but

the converse: suggest a proper plan and the Court of Chancery if it approves will authorize the money to be paid over to you to carry out such a plan. Practically to work then, devise the plan of the future allocation of the fund, in the first place, and then come before the Master to approve of it.

A few articles of medicines set out in the Medical Officer's requisition were ordered to be supplied -

The following letter from Dr. Reid, Surgeon General for S. King, dated 11<sup>th</sup> July 1862, was read.

Gentlemen, I beg leave to call your attention to the practice of sending from the Fever Hospital to the Union patients who have become only so far convalescent as to be able to leave their beds from four to seven days. This practice is not only injurious to the patients but imminently dangerous to those they may come in contact with, and instead of a honing the fever poison by fire out, feeds from time to time the focus of contagion -

I consider that no patient should be returned under at least ten days convalescence, understood in the sense of being able to leave bed so long; otherwise I advise that proper convalescent wards be prepared in the Union Hospital for the reception of such patients (as above mentioned) so that without danger they can mix with their healthy fellows, and thus isolate the diseased and prevent the spread of contagion -

I have also to call your attention to a statement made by Dr. Colahan at a Fever Board a few days ago, charging the Medical Officer of this Union with the inability of distinguishing diseases, - and with reference to this I have to inform you that on the afternoon of Monday last I posted to the Editor of the Vindicator a letter demanding of Dr. Colahan to withdraw the above charge!



or I would its falsity as far as I was concerned. This letter did not appear in Wednesday's "Vindicator", and on yesterday, I sent a copy to the Express.

No. 16,234/62 2 Again advicing to the subject of the relief of 24 July - 38 Fever Cases in the Union - Stating that both for convenience and for economical and Sanitary considerations a Fever Hospital on the Workhouse ground would be far preferable to the existing arrangements - That if the Guardians should decline to build a Fever Hospital the Commissioners think it will be desirable that convalescent wards for male and female patients, quite detached from the present Workhouse Buildings, should be erected on the Workhouse site, at a safe distance from the other Workhouse Buildings, and provided with proper yards -

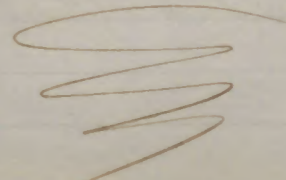

A Communication was received from the Committee of Management of the Western Dispensary District forwarding a copy of a Resolution adopted unanimously at a Special Meeting of the Committee held on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1862. <sup>Proposed by</sup> George Morris Esq. <sup>Seconded by</sup> Rev<sup>d</sup> Francis Kenny P.P. and unanimously Resolved -

That having fully considered the Poor Law Commissioners Letter of the 17<sup>th</sup> July, respecting the Division of the Western Dispensary District, we are unanimously of opinion that the present arrangements are quite sufficient to enable the Doctor to afford relief to the Poor of the district. Considering that the present Doctor has been residing for some weeks at Spiddal, and although it is stated in the Commissioners letter that he only attended one case of Scurvy, we consider this as proof that having the Western Dispensary district as at present arranged, divided, would be of no advantage to the poor of the district, while it would increase the taxation under the Medical Charities act, from 5<sup>s</sup> 6<sup>d</sup> in the pound the present cost, to nearly double that amount, we entirely disapprove of putting part of this district to the Lettermore Division, the Doctors residence at Moyculleen is far more convenient to the Poor of the extreme end of the present district than the Doctors residence at Lettermore could be.

We do not consider the very small amount of sickness at present in the district calls even for a temporary assistant, and we wish to record our readiness if required to give such,

The Poor Law Commissioners appear to attach great importance to the fact of so few visiting tickets being issued,

which is quite answered by the fact of the present Doctors residence being in the centre of the few cases of Scurvy that exist and having been called on to attend only one case, If the members of the Committee and persons having power to issue tickets have not hitherto done so. It is no proof that the Doctor had ever refused to attend or ever give one cause for complaint for not attending in the remotest part of the present district. There are <sup>five</sup> persons resident in the Western part of the present district having power to issue tickets. under these circumstances we unanimously request that this district will be allowed to remain as at present formed. The few few cases of Scurvis that exist being now fortunately on the decline, and should any necessity arise we are quite ready to make any change, the circumstances of the case may demand, and it is resolved that a copy of this resolution and the proceedings of this days meeting be transmitted to the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union in time for its meeting on Sunday next the 25<sup>th</sup> inst.

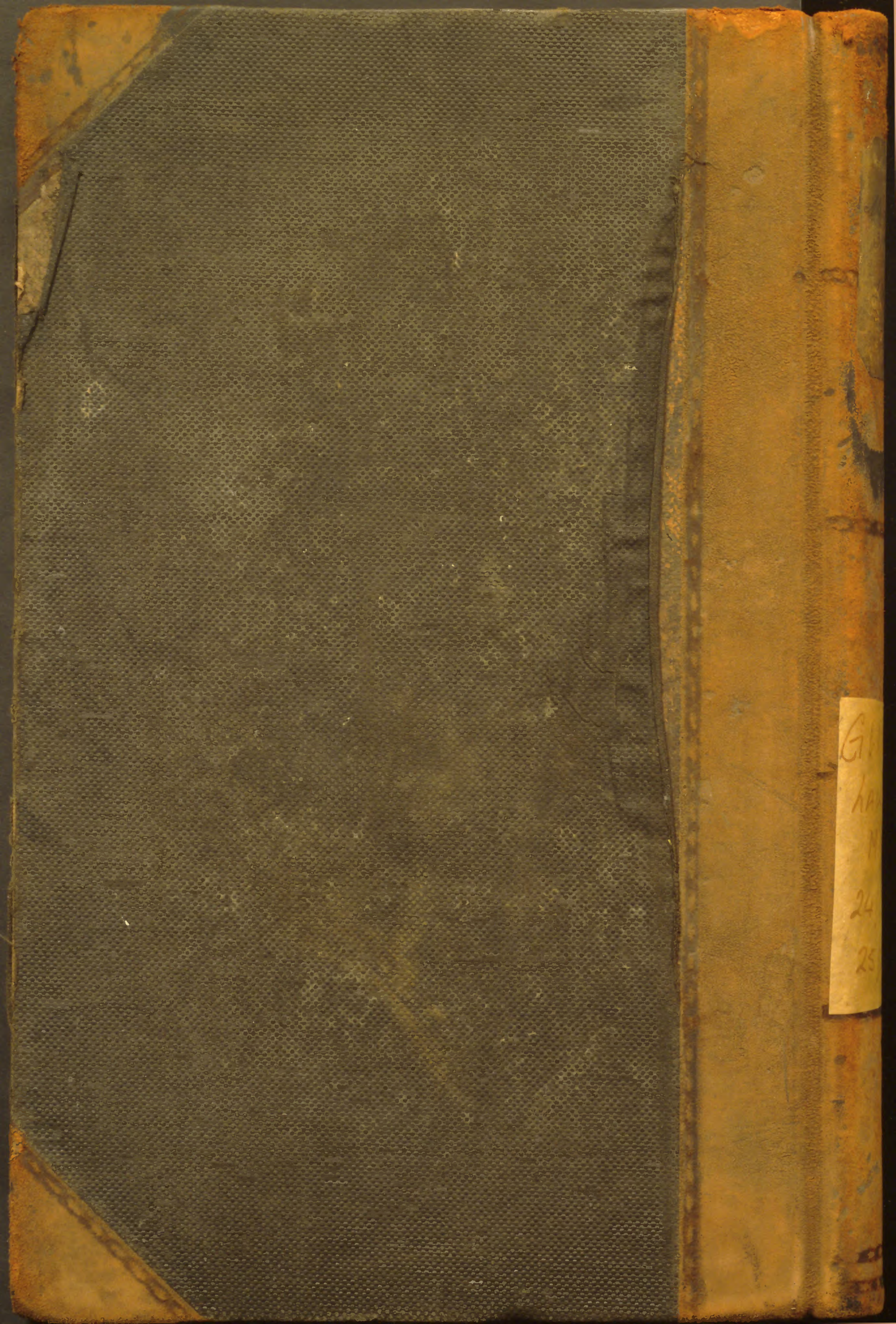
