Dr Colahan also directed attention to the fact that Dr Consideine, Dispensary Medical Officer, had directed the patient in question to be removed to the Fever Hospital so early as 2 o'clock on that day, and that it was near to 11 o'clock when the application was made at the Hospital.

Dr Colahan denied that patients are discharged from the Hospital so early as to cause any risk of contagion to healthy persons - He said that of course many persons leave the Hospital in a very weak state, and that it would be well to have wards in the Workhouse for their reception, where they might receive other than the ordinary House diet until restored to strength.

That having fully considered the Commissioners Letter on the subject of the Fever Hospital and having heard Dr Colahan's statement we do not at present consider it necessary to carry out the suggestions in their letter.

Thompson, dated 14 June, stating that scarcely any rents have been got this year from the Islands of Annan. while the outlay for support of the poor for months past has been at the rate of £20 per week, which must continue for at least six weeks more. Copy - Opinion of Michael Morris Esq on instructions sent him to draw Petition to the Court of Chancery for the transfer of funds in pursuance of the directions of the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union and the Dispensary Committee.

In my opinion no further or other Petition can be presented. Any new Petition should only be an echo of the former, and the order made by the Master of the Rolls on the 19 January 1859 is as favorable and as general in its terms as could ever be obtained. It directs a reference to the Master to ascertain and enquire into the trust of the two sums of £700 and £500, to settle a scheme or plan for the future disposition of the fund and to decide who



who should be the future trustees of the fund." It is suggested in this case that the fund should be transferred over absolutely and without any more about it to the Guardians or Dispensary Committee. I do not see a shadow of ground for such an application. The principle universally ruling funds for charitable purposes is "that if the charity to which the fund had been applied is no longer in existence, or is altered to such an extent as to render the former mode of allocation no longer feasible, the Court of Chancery will see that the fund is applied in a manner as near as conveniently can be to the original plan and that one of the Masters will be directed to settle upon the future plan" - The Master will of course be very much guided by the suggestions of persons interested, and as the Guardians and Dispensary Committee represent the parties who would be the most interested, I have no doubt their scheme or plan would if reasonable be adopted by the Master. The scheme drafted by the late Mr Kelkenny was only a sketch of his own and was never before the Master. The Guardians can therefore now bring forward any plan they think fit for the Master's approval, making themselves sole trustees for the future application of the fund according to the plan suggested by them: it will be for the Master to approve of alter or modify such a plan. What I therefore advise is that a Committee of the Board should sketch out a plan for the future application of the funds to such charitable objects as they think best and that such plan be brought before the Master under the present order of reference to him, which can be renewed. - I don't understand the suggestion that the fund should be transferred to the Guardians like a cheque on the Bank; what rights have the Guardians to such a transfer rather than any member of the Community at large? They may get the management of the fund under certain fixed rules as to its distribution, approved of by the Court of Chancery through its Master, but they have no greater right to ask it to be just handed over to them unconditionally than I have to ask it to be handed over to me to put in my pocket. The mode of proceeding is not - give us the money and we will have a plan of our own hereafter - but

the converse: suggest a proper plan and the Court of Chancery if it approves will authorize the money to be paid over to you to carry out such a plan, Practically to work then, devise the plan of the future allocation of the fund, in the first place, and then come before the Master to approve of it.



Gentlemen I beg to report that during the past week the portion of Gladdagh belonging to Miss Grattan has been thoroughly cleansed and lime washed. The following letter from D<sup>r</sup>. Reid, locum tenens for D<sup>r</sup>. King, dated 11<sup>th</sup> July 1862, was read.

Gentlemen, I beg leave to call your attention to the practice of sending from the Fever Hospital to the Union patients who have become only so far convalescent as to be able to leave their beds from four to seven days - This practice is not only injurious to the patients but imminently dangerous to those they may come in contact with, and instead of a person being free from the fever poison to die out, feeds from time to time the focus of contagion -

I consider that no patient should be returned under at least ten days convalescence, understood in the sense of being able to leave bed so long; otherwise I advise that proper convalescent wards be prepared in the Union Hospital for the reception of such patients (as above mentioned) so that without danger they can mix with their healthy fellows, and thus isolate the diseased and prevent the spread of contagion -

I have also to call your attention to a statement made by D<sup>r</sup>. Colahan at a Fever Board a few days ago, charging the Medical Officer of this Union with the inability of distinguishing diseases, - and with reference to this I have to inform you that on the afternoon of Monday last I posted to the Editor of the Vindicator a letter demanding of D<sup>r</sup>. Colahan to withdraw the above charge!

or I would its falsity as far as I was concerned. This letter did not appear in Wednesday's "Vindicator", and on yesterday, I sent a copy to the Express.

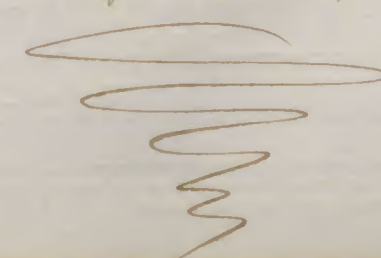

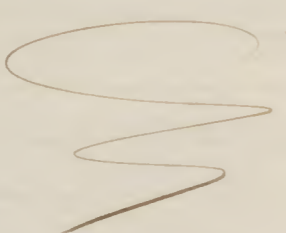

A Communication was received from the Committee of Management of the Western Dispensary District forwarding a copy of a Resolution adopted unanimously at a Special Meeting of the Committee held on the 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1862. <sup>Proposed by</sup> George Morris Esq. <sup>Seconded by</sup> Rev<sup>d</sup> Francis Kenny P.P. and unanimously Resolved -

That having fully considered the Poor Law Commissioners Letter of the 17<sup>th</sup> July, respecting the Division of the Western Dispensary District, we are unanimously of opinion that the present arrangements are quite sufficient to enable the Doctor to afford relief to the Poor of the district. Considering that the present Doctor has been residing for some weeks at Spiddal, and although it is stated in the Commissioners letter that he only attended one case of Scurvy, we consider this as proof that having the Western Dispensary district as at present arranged, divided, would be of no advantage to the poor of the district, while it would increase the taxation under the Medical Charities Act, from 5<sup>s</sup> 6<sup>d</sup> in the pound the present cost, to nearly double that amount, we entirely disapprove of putting part of this district to the Lettermore Division, the Doctors residence at Moyculleen is far more convenient to the Poor of the extreme end of the present district than the Doctors residence at Lettermore could be.

We do not consider the very small amount of sickness at present in the district calls for a temporary assistant, and we wish to record our readiness if required to give such.

The Poor Law Commissioners appear to attach great importance to the fact of so few visiting tickets being issued,

which is quite accounted for by the fact of the present Doctors residence being in the centre of the few cases of Scurvy that exist and having been called on to attend only one case, if the members of the Committee and persons having power to issue tickets have not hitherto done so. It is no proof that the Doctor had ever refused to attend or ever give one cause for complaint for not attending in the remotest part of the present district. There are <sup>five</sup> persons resident in the Western part of the present district having power to issue tickets, under these circumstances we unanimously request that this district will be allowed to remain as at present formed. The few few cases of Scurvy that exist being now fortunately on the decline, and should any necessity arise we are quite ready to make any change, the circumstances of the case may demand, and it is resolved that a copy of this resolution and the proceedings of this days meeting be transmitted to the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union in time for its meeting on Sunday next the 25<sup>th</sup> inst.
