Report of Rate Committee -

The Committee on Collectors accounts having met on Monday last proceeded to the usual investigation.

They have to report that the Collection generally has been a satisfactory one, taking into account the singular depression that has existed amongst the agricultural classes and in the Town of Galway during the current year.

All the collections with the exception of Messrs Youngs, Creaven and Kellys have been closed. Cranmore Electoral Division -

In this division youngs has returned £12. 8. 5 as still outstanding, a sum of 7/6 only being uncollectable - with the principle item (£8. 6. 7) chargeable against the Lenchfort estate, the Committee have had some difficulty in dealing, owing to the entire rate having been made against a former tenant, and the lands being now in the possession of Sir Thomas Burke. Captain Harding, Captain Lpdell, and Kennedy, who dispute their respective liability for rate.

Captain Harding attended and ^{afforded} every information as to the portion of land he holds, and offered to pay as appeared to the Committee his full proportion of the rate. A similar offer was made on the part of Sir Thomas Burke. As regards the lands occupied by Captain Lpdell taking the area, the quality (evidence of which was given to the Committee) and the assessable rent into calculation, the Committee believe he has not paid his due proportion, and accordingly they have directed the collector (after having first obtained the instruction of the Commissioners) to resort to the lands for the recovery of the rate, as the Committee are of opinion that a Collector is authorized in law to make a distress for any component part of a rate even tho' a portion thereof had been previously paid. The converse of this opinion seems to influence Captain Lpdell in withholding the remainder of his rate. He has already paid £4. 6. 6 on account.

Blaufalway Electoral Division

Creaven handed in an abstract showing arrears to the amount of £4. 2. 3, but as a portion of them is due by solvent "immediate lessors" the list has been given back to him, with instructions to collect such sums and close his account within one week. The whole of his outstanding balance is recoverable, and the residue will be transferred over to the ^{new} rate Books.

Galway Electoral Division

Kelly has as usual made a creditable collection. The irrecoverable rate returned by him (the lists of which the Committee have closely examined) Although Apparently

It will be observed that though the cases seeking admission are steadily decreasing, the mortality for the last week has exceeded a similar period for many years. This is to be attributed to several causes. - to the late

period of admission into Hospital of three cases, and the consequent improper management of the earliest the most important for successful treatment - to the filthy badly ventilated dwellings of the poor people - and above all to the remarkable prostration, one of the most striking features which the Epidemic has assumed within the last month. This debility is also traceable to the wretched and filthy condition of the dwellings of the poor both in the claddagh and at Licken, and I may remark that, in addition to the severe depressing influences of the morbid poison, the foul air, the filthy state of the cloths, and the absence of all cleanliness in the houses of the poor, induce when united a state of constitutional weakness which frustrate in many cases the most judicious efforts to save life. I take the liberty of making these few observations that the Board of Guardians, always anxious to devise every means for the safety of the poor, may place additional powers in the hands of the Sanitary Officer (who has so well and faithfully discharged his duties hitherto) as may enable him more completely and successfully to avert such deplorable consequences. (Signed) N. Colahan

A special meeting of the Committee of Management of the Western Dispensary District, convened by Circular, was held this day for the purpose of taking into consideration a letter from the Poor Law Commissioners dated 28th August, in which they inform the Board of Guardians and this Committee that they decline to hold an inquiry into ~~which~~ the grounds on which they have suggested a subdivision of the Western Dispensary District as requested by the Committee in their resolution passed at the meeting of this Committee held on the 13th August last. Present in the chair.

Geo. E. C. Hare, Esq. Other members - Anthony O'Flaherty, George Morris, P. S. Comyn, W. J. Smith, G. E. Burke, Rev James Kenny, Thomas Bunbury, Warden, also attended.

The Committee having considered the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners of the 28th of August to the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union desire to record their unaltered opinion that the present arrangement as to the Medical attendance for the Western Dispensary District answers every ordinary requirement, and that every unusual requirement would be met by temporary provision, that as they have failed in satisfying the Poor Law Commissioners upon this point and having ^{been} refused the opportunity they requested of proving at the inquiry ~~they~~ sought the grounds in which they have held and continue to hold this opinion, they desire to submit for consideration the two following propositions, First - That this District should pay a salary not higher than £20 per annum to the Medical Officer of the Lettermore District in the Outerard Union for attending the two Electoral Divisions of Kilmummin and ~~Killannin~~ ^{Seleina} in this District provided the Lettermore Doctor resides at Carrivoe: The Commissioners stated in their letter of the 30th July that the Doctor might probably be induced to reside at Carrivoe, but the Committee wish to be informed whether the present Doctor has changed his residence in accordance with the desire of the Poor Law Commissioners, otherwise we consider the Doctors residence being at Lettermore would be far more inconvenient to the people of these two divisions than his residence in Moycullen as at present. We are of opinion that in any case the Electoral Division of ~~Killannin~~ ^{Killannin} should remain as at present.

Secondly - that the present Medical Officer of this district might be induced to reside at Middle Land the present Dispensary District to remain as it is. Should the former proposition be approved of the Committee proposed that the present Medical Officer's salary be reduced by ten pounds Proposed by Sawfield Comyn Esq. seconded by Ge. E. Burke Esq. & Resolved.

That the Committee cannot help protesting strongly against the arbitrary principle of imposing a considerable increase of taxation on the rate payers of an already heavily burthened district without any opportunity being afforded them of proving the utter want of any necessity for the alteration involving such increased expenditure and that the proceedings of this days meeting be forwarded to the Board of Guardians of the Galway Union for their next meeting.

I regret to add that there ^{has been} several cases of Typhoid in Quay Street, the Fish Market, and Blind arch. - these places are densely crowded by Connemara people who keep their premises in a most filthy condition. I beg to call the attention of the Board to the filthy state of several streets in the Town, viz. Suckeen, the Bowling Green, Henry Street, Shell Lane, Kelly's Lane, New Street west, with the New Road. - there are heaps of nuisance accumulating for weeks on these streets. I understand that Town Steward being limited in scavengers is at present unable to cope with the difficulty.
