The difference in ^{value} ~~price~~ between the two articles is so trifling, we would recommend as an advantage in point of health to the Infirm men and women, that the benefit of this change be extended to the adult paupers generally - we also recommend the substitution of four ounces of white bread at the suppers of the children."

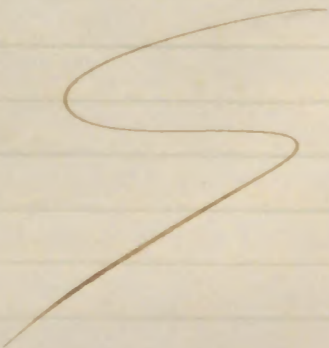

(The Plan and Specification were handed to Mr. A. Semple to enable him to say upon what terms he would execute the works according to the new Specification.)

Read Letter from Secretaries of National Education Board, dated 18th January 1864, forwarding the following Extracts from the District Inspector's Report of the 18th ultimo on the Workhouse Schools: -

"Except in arithmetic the answering of the boys was of a fair character, but their penmanship was careless.

"The discipline in this department is not satisfactory, the boys being disposed at first not to reply to questions.

"The clothing of a large number was very bad, and personal cleanliness seemed neglected. On approaching close to the boys the smell was offensive and indicative of habits injurious to health.

"The tone of the girls' school was, in every respect, superior, and the answering was very fair. Needlework, a most important branch for girls, seems to be attended to, there was a large quantity in their hands of clothing for themselves, and the articles appeared well made.

"Since the beginning of the year 1863, 16 boys have been promoted from one class to another and 10 girls: of the latter 16 have virtually been promoted in addition, though their names have not been enrolled in the higher classes, yet they are reading in the more advanced books. In neither case do I consider this a satisfactory progress. The proportion of girls is much greater, however, than of boys, but with such regularity of attendance there is no reason why a child should be more than three months in passing from ^{one} class to another."

Letter from Mr John Kilkelly, dated 19th January, forwarding detailed particulars of the Bills of Costs relating to the transfer of the Dispensary Trust Funds, ordered. Committee on Law Costs to meet on Wednesday next to consider the Bills.

Letters from Messrs Gleeson and Simpson, dated 20th January, forwarding 88 yards of Tweed in lieu of a portion of that rejected last Board day, and enclosing a sample of a different shade but better material to complete the order. ordered. The Board will not accept the proposed substitute.

Report of P. A. Bullen, Relieving Officer.

That he has received notice of the eviction of two families in Market Street, and one in Bohemore, in the town of Galway.

Martin O'Seill's application for clothing to enable him to leave the Workhouse, referred to Visiting Committee,

ordered That William Connolly get the clothing brought into the Workhouse by his brother, James Connolly, a deceased inmate.

ordered That the Clerk summon the Visiting Committee to meet on Wednesday^{next} at one o'clock.

Mr P. A. Bullen, Relieving Officer, complained that the Workhouse Master refused him the use of the Donkey and cart for the conveyance of paupers to the Workhouse, whereupon the following order was made:-

The Donkey and cart to be at the service of the Relieving Officer for the purpose of conveying the paupers of the Galway Electoral Division to the Workhouse whenever required by the Relieving Officer.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Resolved That the application of constable Edward Burke to be allowed to diminish his payment on account of the support of his three children in the Workhouse from three pounds to two pounds per quarter for the future, be granted, in consequence of the correct manner in which constable Burke has acted towards the Guardians in this matter, and one of the children being 15 years of age -

ordered The manure of the Workhouse is directed to be sold by auction on Wednesday, the 3rd February, on the Workhouse grounds, the manure to be removed within one week after sale of same.

Report.

The visiting Committee having noticed a departure from the plan for enclosing the New dispensary, whereby an angle would be formed, instead of a straight ^{line} in the West wall which separates it from the Workhouse ground, and at the same point, an undesirable recess at the rear of the building itself.

On inquiry, the reason advanced for the alteration just conceived was, that it is intended as a Canway, or passage for the conveyance of turf to a shed in the rear. It appears plain to the Committee, that this object could be attained with greater facility and at less cost, by causing an opening with a shutter, to be made in the shed itself, on the South side, as according to the change contemplated, a Cart laden with turf, or Coals, must be "backed" into the passage for some distance (there not being sufficient width to allow a horse to be turned if led forward), before the load could be discharged through the doorway, even then, it should be carried to the shed, in another part of the yard.

The Committee having carefully considered the effect of this proposed alteration, are clearly of opinion, the balance of convenience, as well as uniformity, is against it—Sound policy suggests also, the advisability of not departing from the building contract entered into, and approved of by the Commissioners.

The Committee earnestly recommend, that no communication shall be suffered to exist between the two Institutions, except through the post gates, where a system of check will prevail, therefore they urge that the doorway in the dispensary wall, leading to the Workhouse ground, may be solidly built up.

Report- On Wednesday the 27th inst. the visiting Committee, accompanied by Doctor Brodie, made a general inspection of the Workhouse. Although in detail defects were observable in some departments, as noted hereunder, taken as a whole, the house is in fair working order.

The Boys' school was first visited, and presented a very marked improvement. Both in the clothing, cleanliness and appearance of the pupils. Specimens of writing, and comparisons made, clearly indicate a decided progress since the appointment of the present Master. He reported insubordination in some few instances. The Committee suggested a mode of dealing with it, which they expect will have the effect of restoring discipline, without resorting to harsh means.

The attention and quiet demeanour manifested by the girls, in their school, prove that the instruction bestowed by their teacher is not thrown away. The younger classes were being exercised in spelling and reading, the more advanced, in needle work, an important branch in woman's education.

In the Hospital there was manifestly, not that degree of neatness ~~and cleanliness~~ in the sheeting and bed covering, observable on former occasions. A trace of tobacco being used, was discovered. If such practice be not checked, the risk of fire would be imminent; The Meat and Soup preparing were good.

Space in the laundry being so restricted, the Committee suggest the removal of two boilers, with brick work foundations, which were formerly used in dyeing wool, but are now of no possible utility. They remarked the women, about 12 in number, employed in washing, suffering much from being obliged to stand barefooted for several hours, on cold, wet flags. To obviate this, they decided the Master to supply them with shoes.

They also decided the transfer to the body of the house, of a girl who has been 2 1/2 years in the Separation ward, having cured but one, and shown symptoms of reformation.

The Master pointed out tracks of some of the adult male paupers, who escaped from their dormitory at night, made their way through ^{several} passages and windows, by the aid of forms taken from the dining hall, scaled the walls of the bread store, 14 feet high, and carried off some 6 or 7 1/2 lbs loaves. Beyond this tracing, and some indirect admissions, the Master has no proof to attach the guilty parties. He has been directed to secure, with iron bars, the opening in the dormitory.

A very strange and uncalled for demand has been made by the Sanitary Officer, on the Guardians, to abate a nuisance, arising (as he alleged) from a dung heap on the Workhouse ground. The Committee very closely inspected it, and they affirm, it is perfectly free from any noxious vapour, or smell. The cess pool is covered in, fresh straw being strewn over the interior, to prevent any effluvia escaping. ~~It is unnecessary or improper as this should be reported.~~ As well might the Sanitary Officer proceed to any homestead, or farm yard in the district and insist on the removal of a well trimmed manure heap, as being dangerous to the health of the community. ~~It is not his duty to forbid the collection of a manure heap, or to insist on the removal of it.~~

Sanitary Officer's powers is owing to the absence of that cordiality which should
subsist between him and the Master - as Workhouse Officers. It is not
creditable that the guardians should be mixed up in these petty manag-
ings, and subjected to such annoyance.

The walks and Carways around the house require closer attention
more gravelling, and Metalling to prevent the surface being further broken
up. The water Cistern is in a leaky condition. The Master was directed
to have it emptied out, examined, and repaired.

The Committee inspected and tasted the Bread, and found it of a
fair average quality. The Mixed Meal Stirabout (Indian and Oaten)
lately recommended for use, appeared excellent food. The Milk about here
delivered by the Contractor, showed evident symptoms of having been
diluted - They suggested its rejection -

The Revd Mr Kilbride has established a school there, which he has placed under the charge of a Scripture Reader, and he gives relief to those poor persons who consent to send their children to this school. Coleman Flaherty and Thomas O'Brien, relieved provisionally by me, were sending their children to Mr Kilbride's school; and on withdrawing them from it, the relief which was being given was thenceforth withheld. Report of Visiting Committee.

The Master having brought before the Board the fact that the women with illegitimate children are found occasionally with the school girls, in their day yard, it was referred to the Committee to enquire into and alter this objectionable practice, which they found was occasioned, by the women having been restricted from their usual exercise on the grounds, during the building of the Dispensary, which was shown to the Committee to have been a wise precaution, and as the Womens' sheds open into the girls yard, hence the evil complained of arose. However as the boundary wall is again closed up, the Committee have directed the Master, on no account ^{whatsoever} to permit any intercourse between these classes. And further, so as not to deprive the women and their children altogether of recreation, that they be allowed, for one hour each day, upon the grounds in case of one of the officers, this is rendered necessary, as the Master has reason to suspect these women were in the habit of communicating with parties outside the walls.

The attention of the Committee was called to the Wash room connected with the boys' school, the floor of which, an earthen one, being lower than either the school room, or the outer yard, is necessarily, in cold, damp, and comfortable condition, altho' used, on wet days, as the Boys' play room, and as they are invariably barefooted, it is recommended that the floor should be boarded, the cost of which has been calculated at some three or four pounds, the dimensions being 26 x 12 feet. - The washing trough besides requires lengthening, and an additional one for the feet to be set up.

The entire outer woodwork of the several buildings stands in much need of thorough repair, and painting. As the season for doing so with advantage is now approaching, the Committee suggest that an estimate of the cost be prepared, with a view of entering into contracts for these necessary works.

The provisions and groceries have also been examined, and found of a very fair quality - except the Indian Meal, which was not so carefully sifted as it ought to be. However this was the only instance for a long period, in which the Committee had cause of complaint.

Read Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, No. 10214/1864, Dated 19th May, 1864, stating that the Commissioners have received a report from Dr. Bowditch, Poor Law Inspector, of his recent inspection of the Workhouse, and on the affairs of the Union generally.

That as regards the financial condition of the Union, Dr. Bowditch reports that the current rate will fall short of the expenditure to the 29th Sept next by £1750.

That with reference to the Workhouse Buildings, Dr. Bowditch reports that the woodwork requires painting both inside and externally, and that many of the Sashes at the East or West side of the House require to be repaired - also that the floors in the Women's Day-room and Infirmary Ward are in an unsatisfactory state - that the floor of the Fever Hospital which is of Brick is very much worn and broken, and that a boarded floor is absolutely necessary.

That as regards the clothing and Bedding of the inmates, Dr. Bowditch states that the clothing of some of the male inmates is not in good order, - that the articles of clothing in store

are

are generally unfit for further use, and that it appears that a necessity exists for condemning such clothing as is useless - that the Bedding of the inmates both of the healthy and sick classes was also not in a satisfactory condition -

That with respect to the supplies of Provisions, Dr. Bowditch observes that the milk is "occasionally bad and usually of poor quality", and that active & persevering efforts will be necessary on the part of the Master to enforce a supply of better quality -

That as regards the Schools, Dr. Bowditch states that the Teachers are attentive to their duties, but that the female children present a rather delicate appearance -

Calling attention to the necessity for the children being taken out for exercise under the care of their respective Teachers.

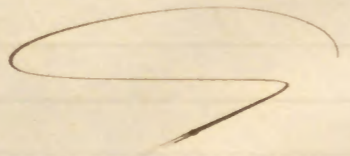

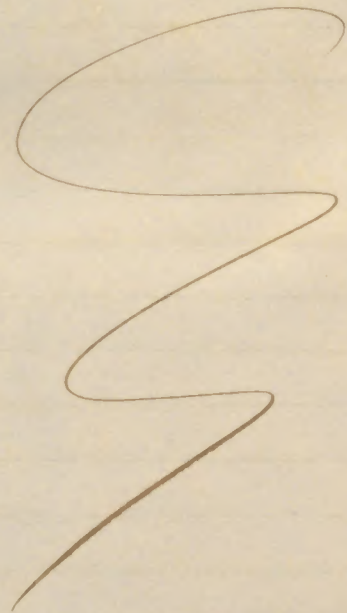

The visiting Committee having been summoned to examine and report on the condition and extent of the Stock of Clothing and Bedding as adverted to by Doctor Brodie in his Report to the P. L. Commissioners, as well as to inquire into the general state and efficiency of the House, & the manner in which the Officers discharge their respective duties, they met accordingly, but as their attention was first and principally directed to the clothing, the minute and careful examination of which occupied several hours, they were obliged to postpone the consideration of the general state of the house. As regards the clothing, a great portion of the Stock presented little more than an accumulation of useless rags, torn, worn, and quite unfitted for any description of garments. The Committee therefore had little hesitation in condemning the several articles named in the sub-joined Schedule, including 20 sheets, 36 blankets, 17 rugs, and 21 bedticks worn out stock which belonged to the old Fever Hospital.

In all 1885 articles of clothing and bedding, of which the Stock should have, ere this, been divested, and that they escaped from Committees created by the Sanitary Board, but it appears the practice previously pursued was, to count over the articles, typed up as they were, in lots of 10 each, and on application of the Master Station a certain number was cast for the purpose of repairing others. But as a general rule the parcels were not opened.

The entire Stock in Store has now undergone a thorough examination and separation. The Store has been emptied of all unserviceable articles, and those that remain are available for immediate use. The Committee cannot refrain from observing, that they have come to the conclusion that in the management of the clothing department, neither care, prudence, economy, or judgment has been duly exercised, still as they had no means of ascertaining how long this delusive system was kept up, they are unwilling to cast all the blame on the present Officers. But unquestionably such articles should not have been permitted into Store at all. They should have been either repaired, or rejected, and the Board should in future insist that no torn articles should find their way to Store. To carry out this essential regulation a room should be

apart for the express purpose of repairs, in which all articles leaving the laundry should be examined, and those requiring renovation retained there. The idle females throughout the house should be sent daily, for some hours to the useful employment of mending the clothing.

The Committee recommend such additions only to the stock, as cannot be dispensed with, by reason of the state of the finances, and as many of the contracted goods are of an inferior class. To render the present supply as available as possible, the House, for washing purposes, should be divided into sections or wards, and after such division, the articles taken from one ward, when properly repaired and washed, could be applied to the next.

The milk supplied was tasted by the Committee and found good, But its general character should not be judged of, by what is sent in on a published Committee day. Unexpected examinations would be more serviceable, and reliable.

The attention of the Committee has been called to the risk, in a sanitary point of view, likely to be incurred, if the operations of steeping and spreading the flax are now going upon the limited area of the workhouse, and so contiguous to the public road, be permitted, as contemplated. This appears a subject worthy of consideration, and should be referred for their opinion, to the ~~Sanitary~~ Workhouse Medical Officer.

The schools have been visited, comparing results with former inspections, a marked progress in the appearance, clothing, discipline and proficiency of the Boys is manifest, reflecting much credit on the zeal and ability of the Master. The same observations apply to the girls school, where all appear to be very obedient and attentive, and moreover contributing a good deal to the industrial stock of the House by needlework.

Finally, the Committee herewith annex, an improved Schedule, gleaned from other Workhouses, shewing at a glance the state of the clothing account. It presents in a clear and concise form the various data required before buying supplies, namely - The Stock on hand, articles cancelled, not available stock, an approximate estimate of the additional quantity required, provided on the number of inmates, together with the quantity sanctioned by the Board, It is recommended that printed forms of this Summary, should be ordered.

The Board should also consider what is best to be done with the cast clothing.
