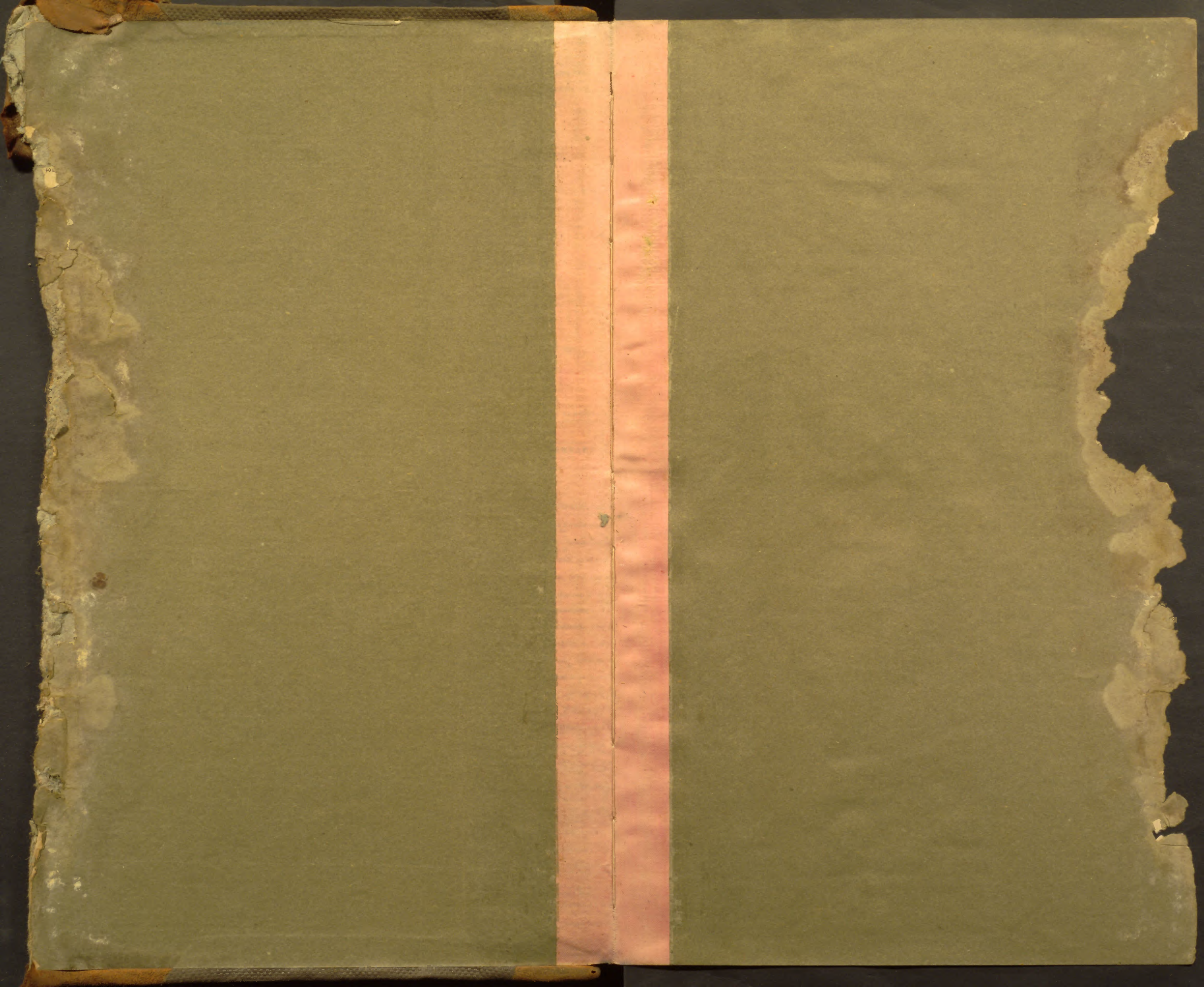

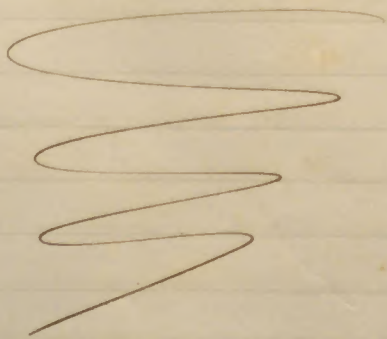

Read Letter from J. B. Grene, dated 10th Jan'y 1865. Stating that Mr. Wm O'Brien has been appointed to make the Annual Revision of the Valuation of the Union.

Ordered - That the Clerk give notice by handbills and advertisement in the newspapers that the Revision is now being made - and also to convey to Mr. O'Brien the request of the Guardians that he will be good enough to attend at their next meeting that they may confer with him on certain matters relating to the Valuation.

The Chaplain's Book was produced, and the following entry read:

"Visited the Male School for the purpose of inquiring why or how it was that two of the School boys desired to join the Protestant service on Sunday last. I dread there must have been some interference, or that some hope was held out to those boys, as it appears strange that a child scarcely eight years old, and with no solid idea of religion would manifest a desire to change his faith - I am sure I need not suggest to the Board the necessity of providing that there will be no interference with the religion of the inmates - I also hope that the Board will approve of the conduct of the Master in the case, and that the Protestant Chaplain had no right to ask those Boys to come to his Congregation on Sunday next.

I take this opportunity of requesting respectfully that the Board will see that Mrs. [Name] is not a fit person to assist at the dying bed of the Catholic inmates."

Master's Report with reference to the foregoing: -

"That on the morning of Sunday, 8th inst., Revd Mr. Greane, Protestant Chaplain, called on me to say, that two pauper boys, named Henry Walsh, and Walter

Walter

Walter Walsh, Roman Catholic, were desirous to become Protestants and were then in the Board Room with the members of his religious persuasion, who were about to attend Divine Service there, and that he wished I would be present at their avowal of such intention, previous to his admission of them as members of his Congregation.

I accompanied the Rev^d gentleman to the Board room door, which he opened and called the boys out and asked them were they desirous to become Protestants. They answered they were. I asked them when they took the notion of doing so. The elder boy replied some time ago, the youngest said the other day he thought of it.

The Rev^d gentleman seemed to be under the impression that such avowal on their part was sufficient authority for him to admit them as members of his Church, and they were about to re-enter the Board Room with him to attend the service, when I objected and said I could not tolerate such a change without the authority of the Board of Guardians, and that I would report the matter on next Board day when he would have an opportunity of advocating his claim to them. The Boys are orphan and are aged respectively 13 & 7 1/2 years.

Henry Walsh and Walter Walsh were brought before the Board and questioned by the Chairman. They stated that they are Catholics and desire to continue so.

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief, were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Punishment Book - Mary Quinn was brought before the Board charged with - "refusing to superintend the scotching of the Flax without Compensation" - (Cautious)

Resolved - That having fully and carefully considered the Commissioners' letter dated 29th Ultimo, the Board see no reason to alter the opinions expressed in the resolution passed on the 16th Ultimo. The Commissioners have not shown any valid or sufficient grounds for making a change in the relief Districts as now constituted. When those Districts were formed the Guardians as well as the Commissioners were aware of the area and population of each. The Guardians were then aware, and the Commissioners on two occasions at least have been since apprised, that Mr Cullen had some other employments, but neither the Guardians nor the Commissioners deemed those occupations to be incompatible with the due discharge of his duties as Relieving Officer. Several years experience have satisfactorily proved that his other avocations have not prevented Mr Cullen from performing the duties of Relieving officer with zeal and efficiency. There is no complaint of dereliction of duty on Mr Cullen's part - no allegation that the poor are not afforded full facilities for obtaining relief, and therefore the Board respectfully request the Commissioners to reconsider the view they have taken of the question, and to permit the present arrangement of Relieving officer's Districts to remain unaltered.

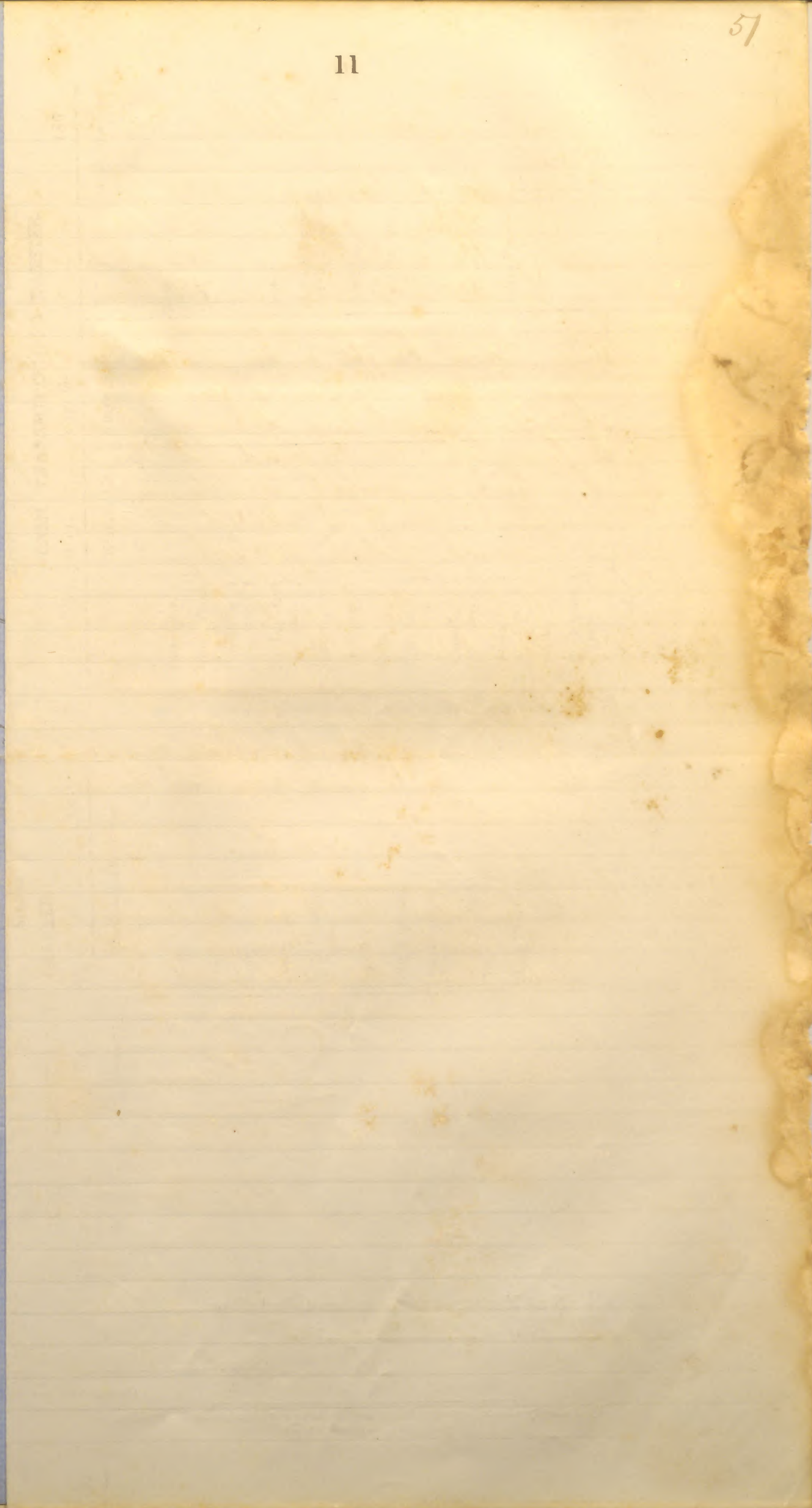
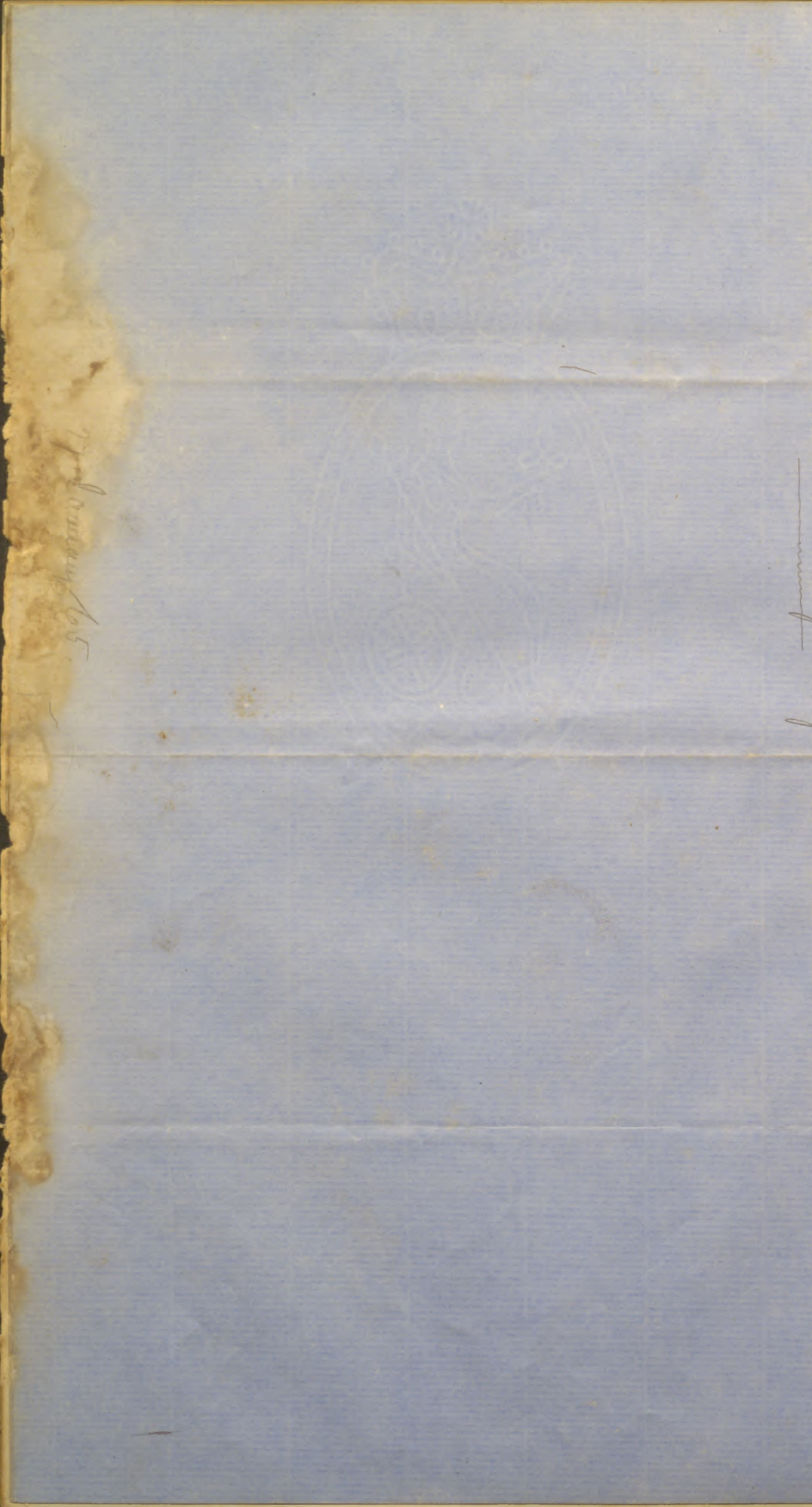
The Visiting Committee having been specially summoned to inspect the stock of clothing and bedding (food being amply contracted for) with the view to ascertain whether, in the event of any sudden emergency arising from the acknowledged distress which unfortunately prevails amongst the laboring and other classes, the Board would be in a position to afford accommodation, and to what extent?

Accordingly the Committee, with anxious care, examined both the extent and quality of the stock submitted to them, and bearing in mind the apprehended pressure, they felt no hesitation in ordering an addition of 100 Beds fully furnished, to be provided with as little delay as possible. They also inspected and traced four pieces of Flannels containing 100 yards for men and boys' clothing, ordered 50 men's and 50 boys' caps, and that all the clothing materials in store be immediately converted into garments for the respective classes for which supplied, and to insure expedition the Master was instructed to employ additional hands - Comparing these supplies with the surplus stock on hand, the Committee have reason for hoping that 200 persons, within the next few days, can, without inconvenience, be provided for in the house. Should there be, however, any symptoms of the rapidly falling short of the demand, the Committee recommend to the Board to issue such supplemental orders, as will insure ample provision for the maintenance of the maximum number the house is capable of accommodating, namely 400 - The number at present approximately 600. - The Committee cannot abstain from the expression of their regret, at the frequency of these demands for relief for the able-bodied, caused by extreme want and privation, and which impose much pressure upon an already overtaxed community. - To be obliged to prepare for the returning wave of periodical distress, is indeed a painful and perplexing duty for the Board, as well as the Committee. From these constantly recurring examples, it is obviously the duty of the Poor-law Commissioners to suggest, and of our Rulers to apply a remedy, by some salutary change in the policy, and social laws which affect this Country, to avert this chronic destitution. Among many modes of redress would be, the enlargement of the basis of taxation for relief purposes, so as to embrace other species of property, the transfer of the Consolidated fund, of many of the burdens which are unfairly charged upon the Rates, as well as the more equal distribution throughout the United Kingdom, of the expenditure of the Revenues of the State, which would give an impetus to industrial and remunerative employment, and open a vista of hope to an unprovided people.

Finally the Committee had to condemn as useless, except for repairs, 20 blankets, 20 sheets, 10 ticks, 6 men's jackets, 6 men's vests, 6 men's trousers, 33 men's caps, 20 men's shirts, 10 boys' jackets, 10 boys' trousers, 20 boys' vests, 20 boys' shirts, 30 women's shifts, 10 women's gowns, 50 women's aprons, and 30 girls' frocks

Read Letter from Poor Law Comm^r, N^o 287/55 dated 2nd March stating that

the Commissioners have given directions for the issue of an Order under their Seal fixing the Salary for the Office of Medical Officer of the Kilcummin & Selma Electoral Divisions of the Western Dispensary District, at £30 per annum. They do not consider unreasonably high. That with regard to the Guardians' observations respecting the want of arrangement by the Commissioners with D^r Evans as to his taking charge of the Divisions referred to, the Commissioners desire to state that they have not the power to oblige D^r Evans to undertake the Duty, if he chooses to decline it.

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, N^o 3393/65, dated 2nd March, stating that the Guardians in not taking the necessary steps for the prosecution of the defaulter under the Compulsory Vaccination Act are opposing themselves to the benevolent intention of the Legislature, and that they will incur very serious responsibility in the event of any deaths occurring in the Union from small-pox among unvaccinated children born since 1st January, 1864, for whose protection against neglect on the part of their parents, the Act was passed.

Report.

On the subject of providing additional shelves in the Hospital. the Visiting Committee, after having inspected the wards and consulted with the attending Sisters, find that it would much conduce to convenience and regularity in dispensing food and medicine, to have increased accommodation at the bedside of the patient. They therefore suggest the propriety of having the shelves fitted up, and that the work, together with the Communion Tables already ordered by the Board, should be executed under contract.

To insure more complete classification, it becomes unavoidable to divide the day yard between the hospital buildings, by the erection of a wall six feet high, along the paved channel from the Eastern door of the hospital to the corner of the accommodation shed on the opposite side. This should be also by contract.

Another desirable improvement suggested by the Sisters, and which the committee adopt, namely, the setting apart the laundry during two, or three days as occasion might require, in each week for the exclusive washing of hospital clothing. Besides, that the clothing, bedding &c. of this department, should be branded, and numbered according to each sex, ward, and bed, the initials M & F. for male and female, with figures to indicate the number of each bed and its furniture, -

It is also recommended that that portion of the ground upon which the flag cusp was raised, and which lies south of a straight line drawn from the dead house ~~west~~ ^{to the} ~~at a right angle~~ ^{to the} west boundary wall, should be fenced off by an earthen bank, and quickset hedge, laid down with grass seeds, and intersected, or laid out with gravelled walks, for the special use & recreation of the hospital Sisters. A bell has already been ordered by the board, for the use of the hospital, which should be procured without further delay.

28th April 1865.

Gentlemen.

I beg to report. That of some of the milk supplied on one occasion during the week. I had reason to consider that it was adulterated with some mineral substance like chalk; not then knowing with certainty to which Contractor it belonged, I on next day gave a sample of each Contractor's milk to the Doctor to analyze it, and I will next Board day report the result.

That in company with a Police Constable I examined in the Pawn offices certain articles of which he held the Tickets that had been found on the person of a pauper named Mary McWough, now in Prison; that of two sheets found (in different offices) one of them evidently had the appearance of having had the Union Brand cut away and pieces substituted; the other of like material had no trace of the Brand: they are in good condition, and the sum of 1/3 is due on each sheet; other articles mentioned in some of the Tickets were not Union property.

That Mr Madden delivered here on last Saturday a week's supply of Potatoes at 4^d per stone.

That I got cleaned the Union Star seed and had it sown on the Farm, and require your order for an additional quantity for to seed the land set apart for Star.

That one of the Cookhouse Boilers which was reported some time since as having an extensive flaw in its bottom has a few days ago become wholly useless by the piece having fallen out; this is a great inconvenience, as it was one of those most in use, your consideration of the matter is requested.

"In the boys' department especially I find a marked advance in intelligence and observance of order and decorum during the year ended 31st March last, notwithstanding that twice lately offences have been committed by Mal-Contents in order to render themselves amenable to punishment which would withdraw them from the trammels of school life, and the particular scale of dietary allotted. Twelve of the more grown boys have lately been removed to the workrooms, and are being initiated in the use of the gimble or awl, and the remainder seem happy and contented, and are making satisfactory progress.

"In the girls' school the proficiency is also creditable, but the progress is less marked than in the boys' department, inasmuch as there was not so wide a margin for improvement. The schools are well conducted."
