A conversation ensued in which other cases of neglect on the part of Dr. Comerford were mentioned, and the Board -

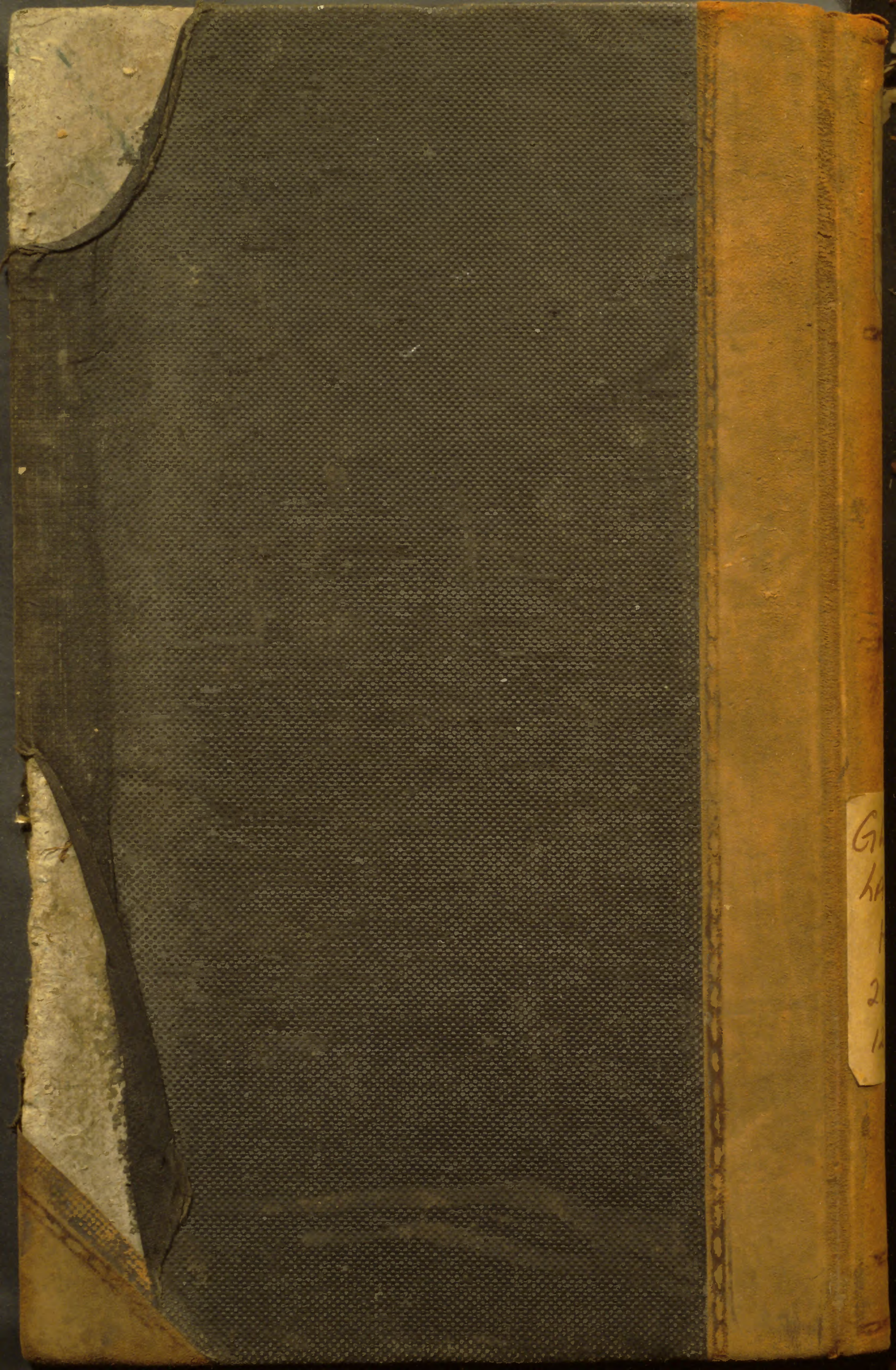
