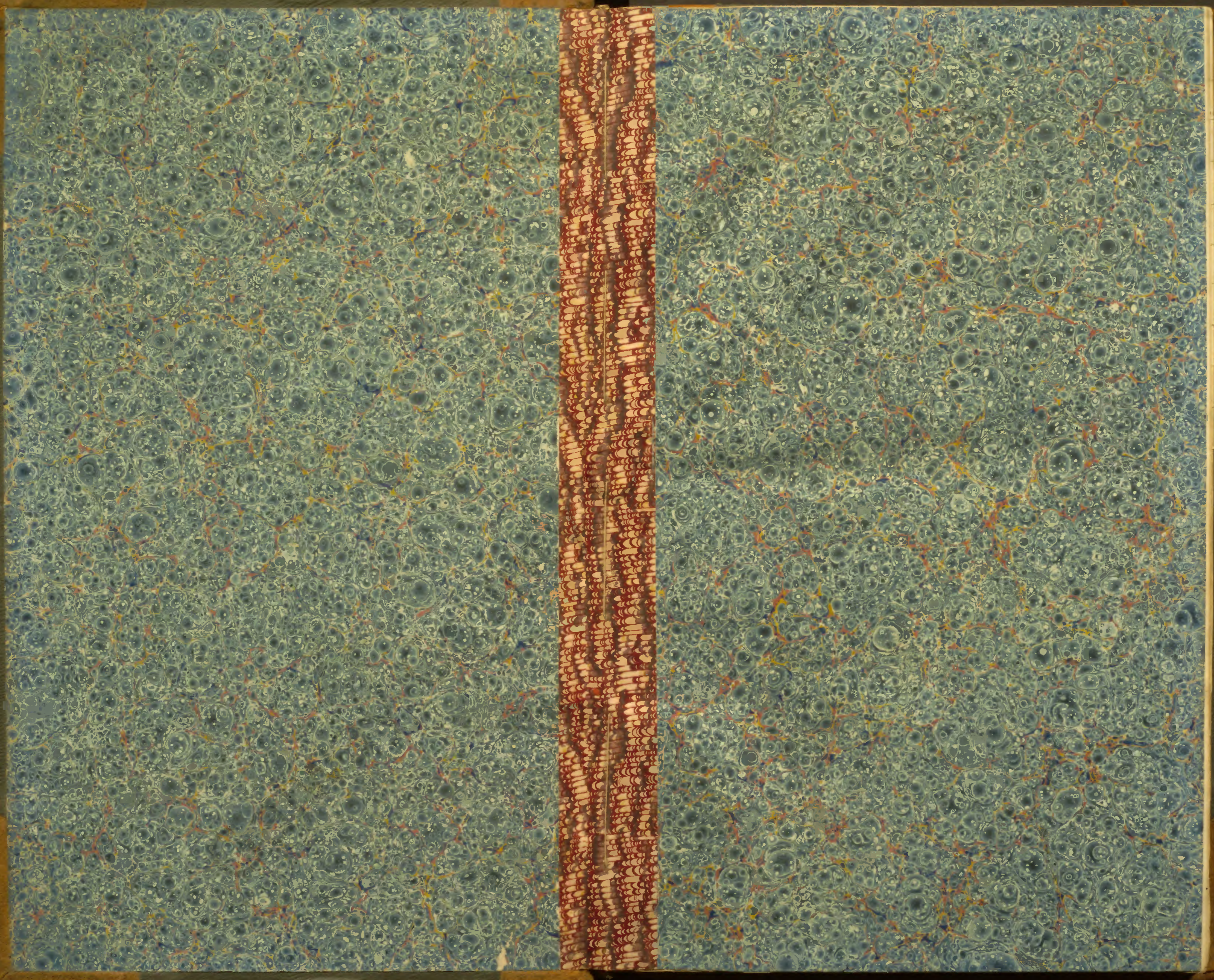

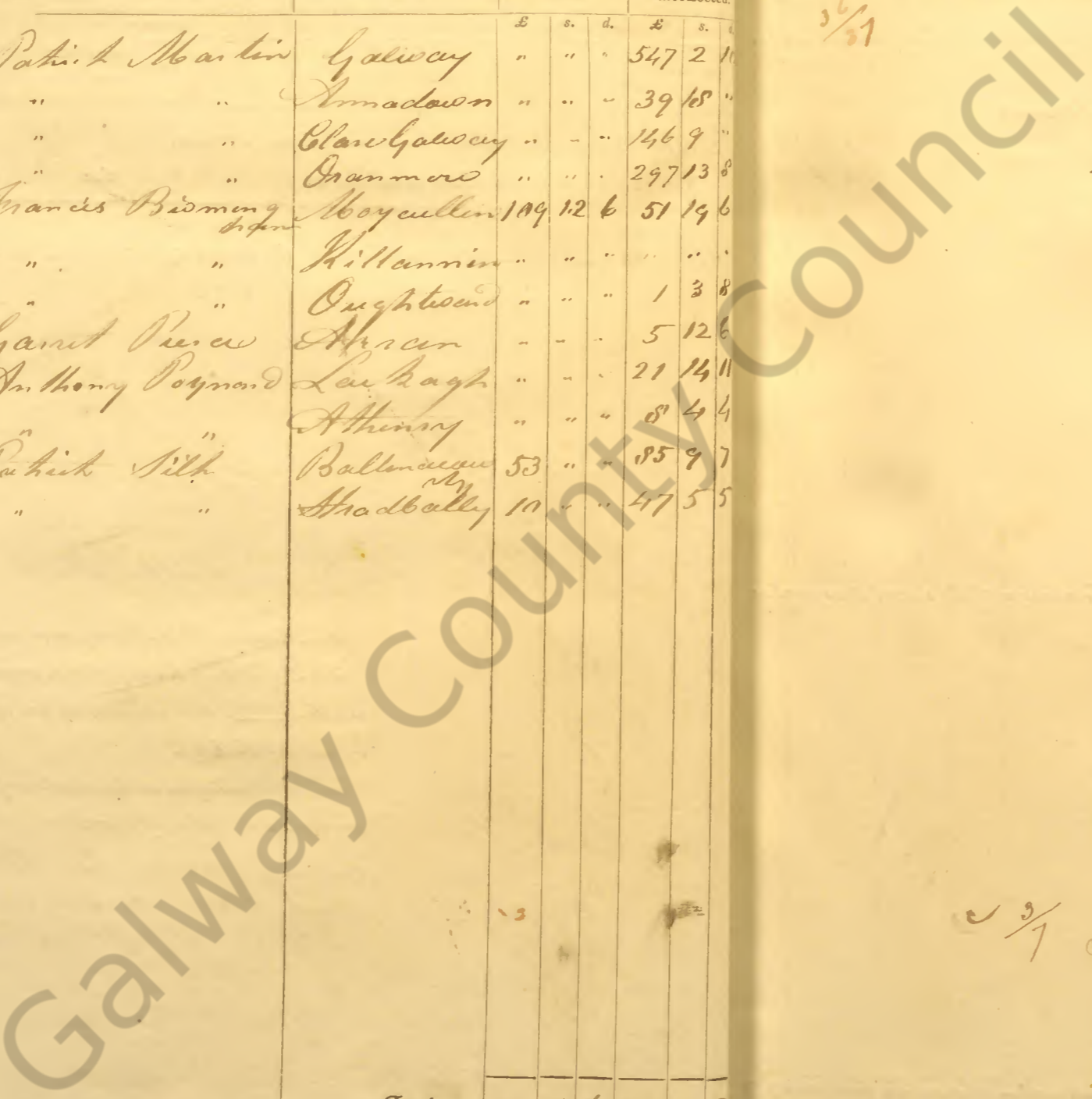

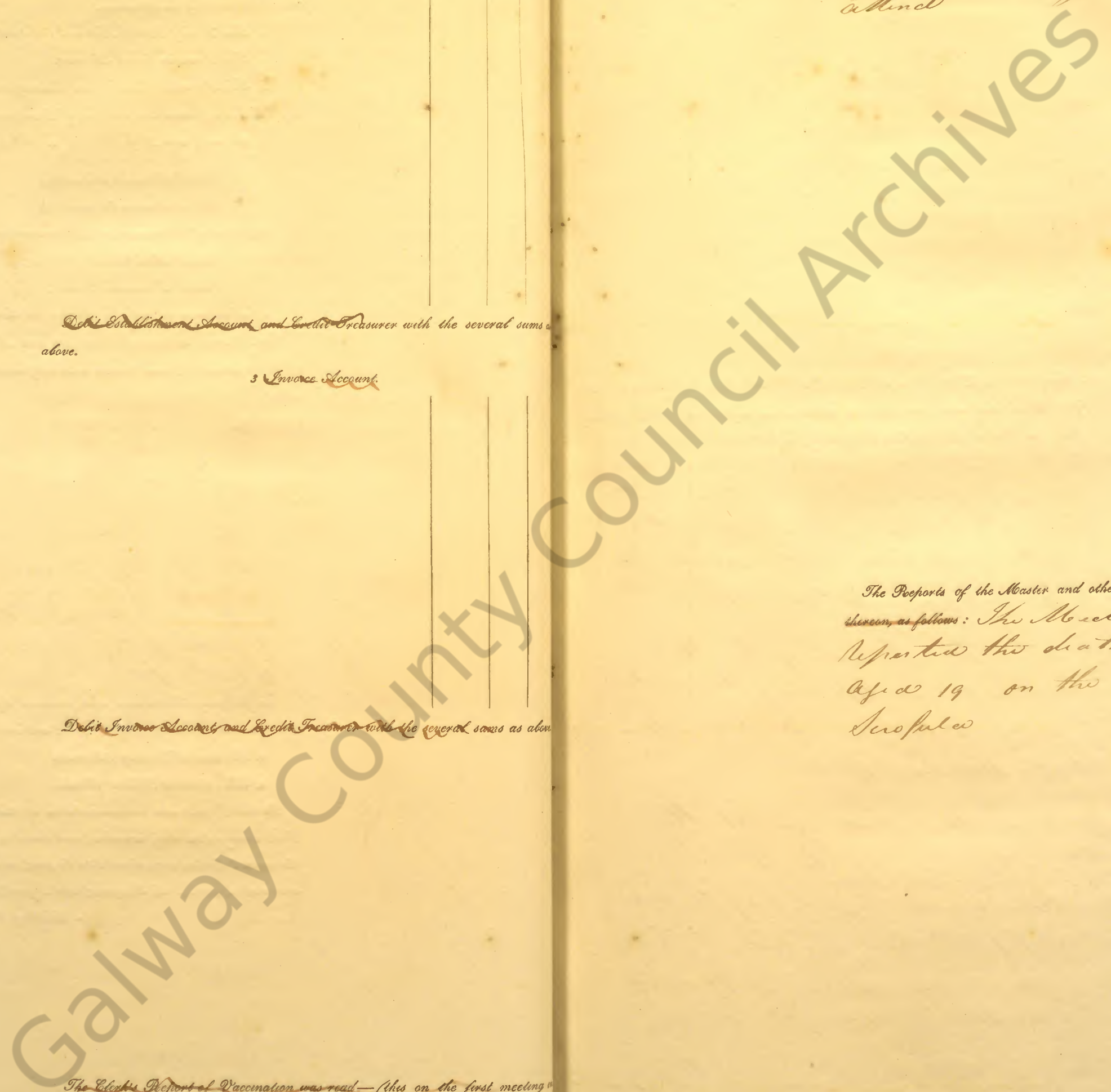

Excellency from all quarters of the total inadequacy
of that Measure to meet the difficulties of the present
trying period

That Your Memorialists most cheerfully and
readily acknowledge the obligation which rests on every
Individual, in proportion to his Interest in the soil,
freely and abundantly to contribute towards averting
from his suffering Countrymen the threatening horrors
of Misery and Want; in Confirmation of which, they point
with pride and pleasure to the fact, that tho' strongly depre-
cating the principle of the present Measure, yet in no one
Instance throughout the Country have they refused to undergo
any amount of taxation which might be deemed necessary

to furnish ample and liberal employment to the poor.

That Your Memorialists anticipate with no
Unreasonable hope, that in the awful visitation which has
fallen upon a whole Nation, which no fault had occa-
sioned and no foresight could avert, Her Majesty's Gov-
ernment will exhibit an equally generous spirit by adop-
ting the just and equitable principle, that in so general a
Calamity the State should contribute its fair proportion
of the General Burden - a principle recognized in the
Measure of Sir Robert Peel for the more partial distress
of last Year, and so liberally carried into effect in the
Many Grants which had been made to Scotland in far
less trying Circumstances, that whatever may be the result
of such Anticipations for the present Year they venture
at least to express a strong and confident hope, that those
Works undertaken under the 1st Victoria in full reliance
on the honor and Credit of her Majesty's Government, faithfully
and honestly to carry out the provisions of that Measure, shall

That Your Memorialists feel, that while
the first object of all, must be to provide ample employment

possible amount of benefit on the Community at large.

That it must be evident to your Excellency,
how totally barren, of such advantages, is the unproductive
and demoralizing system of public works, the only employ-
ment contemplated by the recent act, which, by drawing the
peasant for miles from his home exhausts his strength
ere he commences his labour, offers from its unproductive
character no stimulus to exertion, and but too generally
furnishes an example of extravagant expenditure
combined with careless execution, thus wasting, in
profitless employment that energy which might with
such rich remuneration and beneficial results be
expended "to instance our own locality" in the erection

of Fishery Piers along our Coasts, the Construction of a Rail Road to our Town, or the improvement of our Bay, which, according to the highest Nautical Authority requires but a small expenditure to render it competent to the most ^(extensive) Commercial wants and Capable of accommodating the largest Navies of Europe

That your Memorialists are also confident, that throughout the Rural districts of this Union there is no Townland which does not afford a field for profitable employment in drainage, the Reclamation of waste land and general improvement of the soil, which, while bringing employment home to the door of the Labourer, offering a new Location for excess of population, and affording a large Interest to the Rate payers on the sum expended, will make each locality a school for the diffusion of increased industrial habits and more improved Methods of Cultivation of the soil.

That such a System of reproductive labour equally adapted to present wants and rich in future advantages, is yet so simple of Operation as at the same time to have presented itself to all who have considered the subject throughout the Country, and may be carried into effect by the Magistrates and Assessors being authorised to present at the Extraordinary Sessions, a sum sufficient for the Relief of the poor in each Parish to the Board of Works, such a sum to be apportioned and laid out in each Townland of the parish in proportion to the Amount of Cess to be levied off such Townland for the Repayment of the Government Loan, the Rate payers of the Townland to determine in what Manner, the Money might be expended to most Advantage, and the Board of Works, through their Officers, to cause such Works to be carried out and employment afforded to the most necessitous of the Poor of that Locality

That your Memorialists would also impress upon your Excellency's Consideration that while they fully admit the impolicy of interfering in ordinary times with the usual Channels for the supply of Food to the

People, yet in a season, in which want has even at this early period raised the price of Food beyond the highest Calculation, and in a Country, in which many of the abodes of poverty are far distant from the seats of supply, such Measures of wise Control should be adopted, as would maintain the sustenance of life at a reasonable price, and place it within moderate reach of the People

That your Memorialists look with Confidence to her Majesty's Government to call Parliament together at the earliest Moment, for the adoption of such large and far-sighted Measures, as will enable the Country, by the development of her industrial resources and increase of the productiveness of her soil, to meet not only the heavy taxation of the present but also the wants and exigencies of future Years, should it please Providence again to afflict us

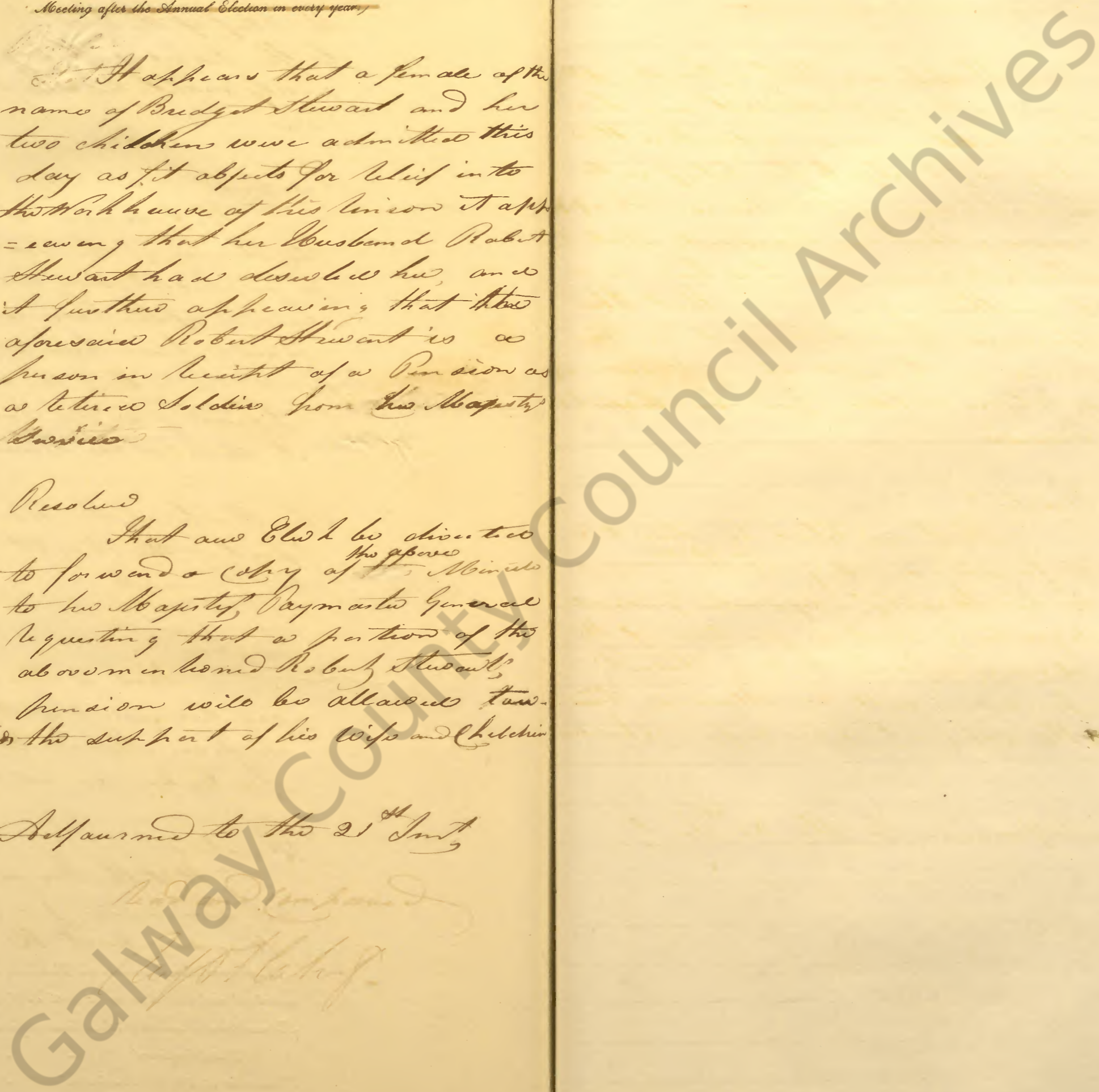

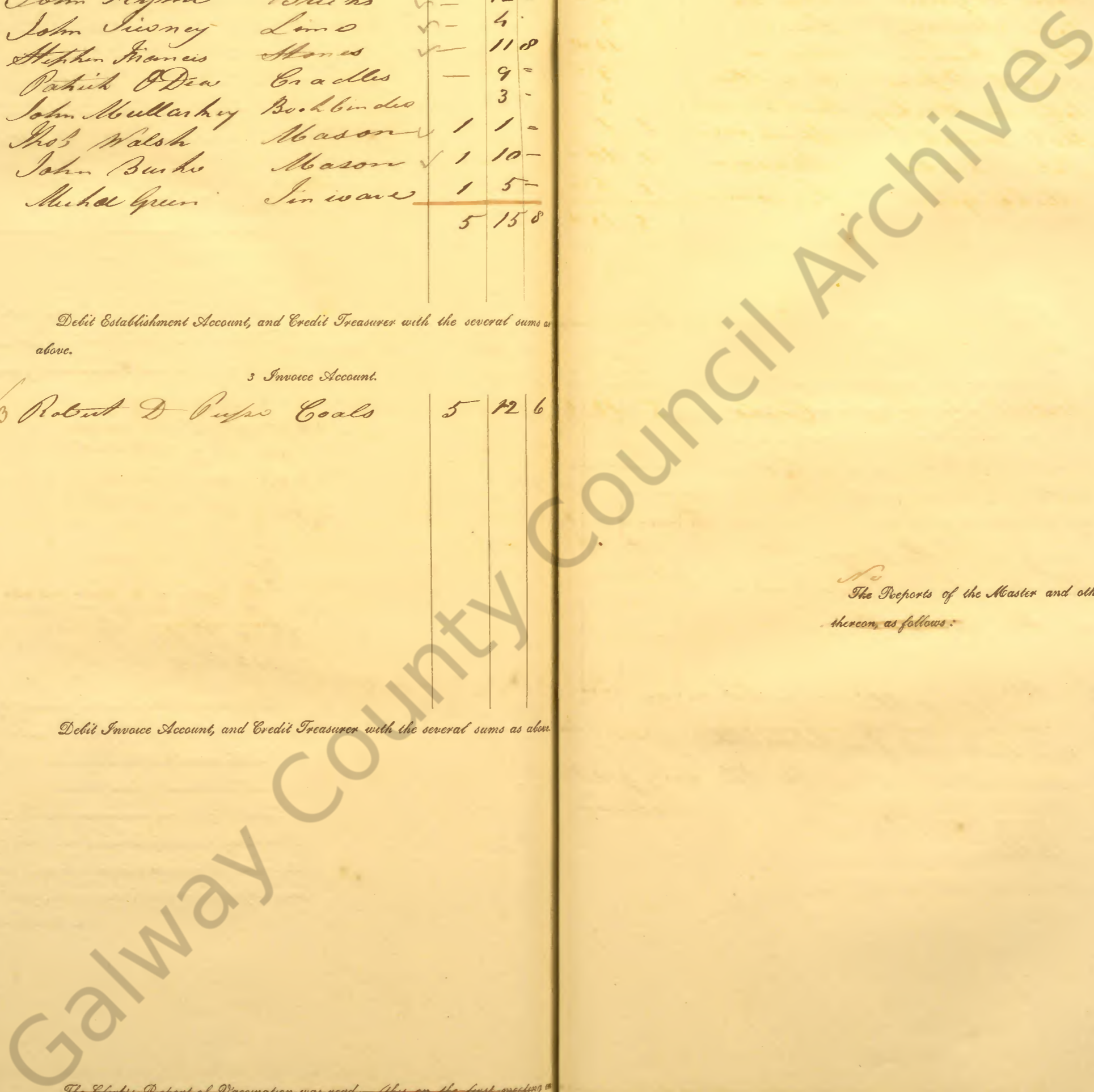

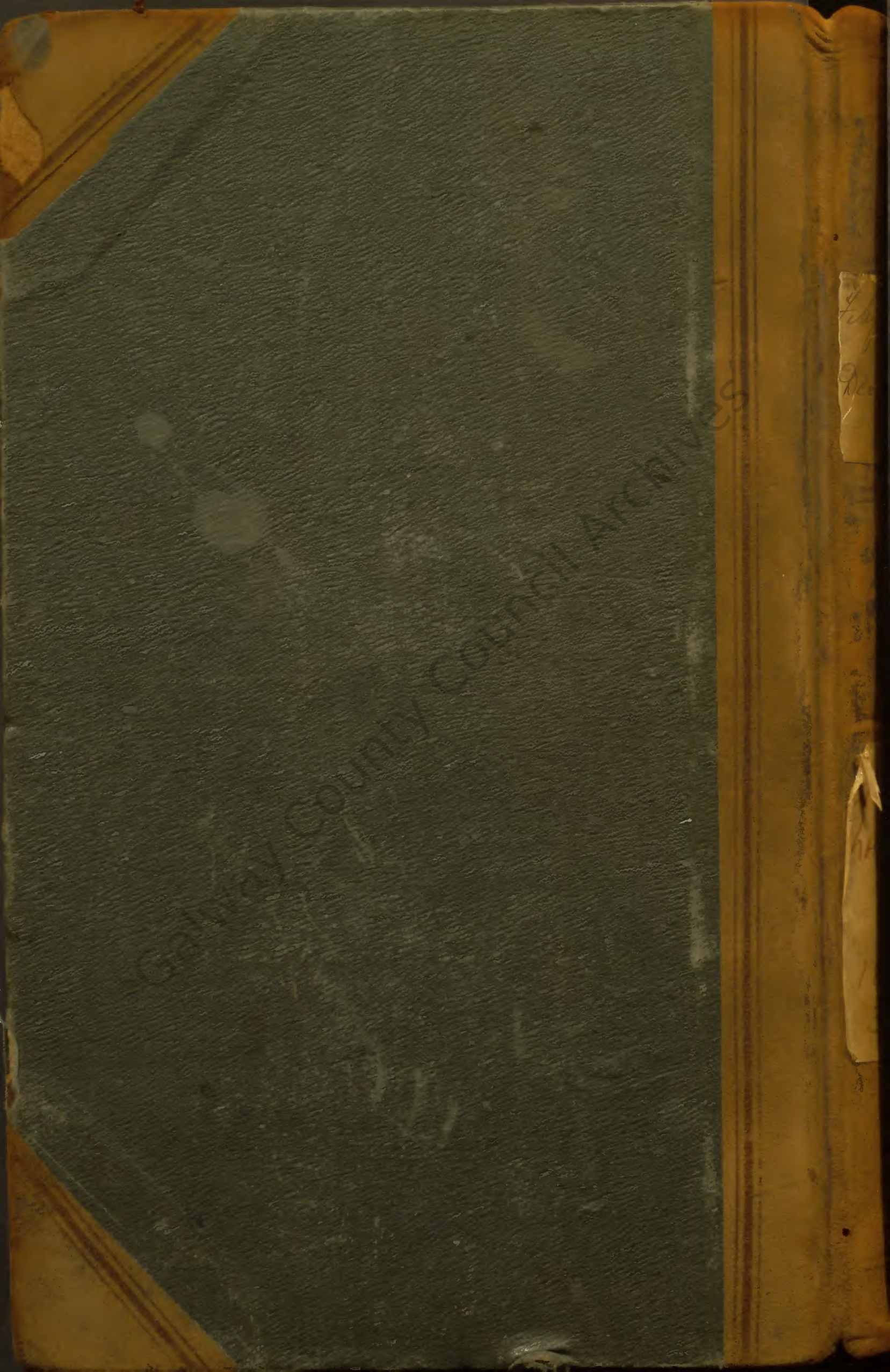
