Gentlemen —

As you are assembled to day for the purpose of devising means to extricate the Union from its embarrassments and to provide funds for the adequate support and maintenance of the workhouse I feel I would not be discharging my duty as its Medical Officer, if I did not again call your attention to the Medical department of the Institution, which I regret to say is in a most deplorable condition, Fever & Dysentery have increased to an alarming extent, and though our Mortality has not been so great as in other houses, it is still considerably over what I have no hesitation in saying, it would be, under more favorable circumstances.

There are at this moment sixty in the Infirmary or Fever Hospital, over forty in Dysentery & Diarrhea, besides about seventy lying in the upper stories in the centre building, both Male and female side, in fever & small pox, and other cutaneous infectious ~~diseases~~ diseases.

forming an aggregate of considerably more than a fourth of the entire inmates. In fact the whole house is in one mass of disease & infection without accommodation, cleanliness, clothing bedding or proper attendants, and in my opinion it would be much safer and more charitable to close the house altogether, than keep it open in its present state. The truth is the time has arrived when serious changes must be made in the Establishment, or else the whole of its inmates, officers, and all, will be swept away by one common pestilence. —

The Remedies I would suggest are
1st The immediate erection of Fever wards or ^{temporary} sheds as in the Galway house. —

2^{dly} The enlargement of the present Infirmary, by raising the side walls on each side & attaching them to it, and also by taking down the lath partition which separates the two centre wards up stairs, from the passage that divides the Male and female side of the Infirmary, it would afford considerable accommodation

and thorough ventilation at a very trifling cost.

3^{rdly} a sufficient supply of bedding and clothing to meet the increasing demand nearly one half of the present inmates are wearing their filthy flaps, full of vermin and contagion.

4^{thly} Proper responsible wardmen and wards maids, to report accurately the health of the pauper, under their superintendance to preserve classification.

5^{thly} proper intelligent nurses fairly remunerated for their labour and risk of life in attending on such cases as Dysentery and Typhus fever.

These are the several and most urgent matters I would beg this day to bring under your consideration there are other matters of detail that can be considered on a future occasion, but those I have enumerated, ought with a due regard to human life be carried into immediate execution.

I feel fully the difficult position the Guardians are placed in, I should regret extremely to add to their embarrassment, but the responsibility that attaches to my situation and the amount and magnitude of

Disease I have to contend with, leave me no alternative than to place before the Board, a plain statement of facts with the remedies I would propose.
