Gentlemen I have to report 13 deaths, since this day week 10 from Dysentery 2 from Fevers and one suddenly on the 5th from the rupture of a blood vesel, there is one other man who was admitted yesterday, in the last stage of spotted Fever, that cannot pass this day. They again to call the attention of the Board to the state of the Clothing, no supply has yet been got, and half the children are literally naked, or wearing their old filthy rags. It is quite futile to expect an improvement in the sanitary condition of the House, until this matter be remedied, and with the same view I would recommend that the inmates generally of the establishment during the prevalence of Dysentery, should get dinner about only once a day, and in lieu thereof a day 10 ozs of white bread for an adult, from 9 to 15. 7 ozs, and from 2 to 9. 4 to 5 ozs for dinner per day. Gentlemen,

I have to report 14 deaths since this day week 7 from Dysentery 4 from fever 2 from Malaria disease, and one a little girl admitted on the 19 Inst. (and who was thrown inside the gate) died on the 25th a wretched example of defective nutrition as the fever sheds will probably be fit for the reception of patients in about a fortnight. I think it would be well to make some arrangements for procuring a proper responsible nurse, at a fair salary to superintend the whole Hospital department, who can read and write, and also have a knowledge of Midwifery.

I beg to hand in a letter received this day from the apothecary relative to a change of surgery, together with the necessity of getting a proper corner, sheltering and draining. I have only to say I quite concur in his observations.—
