I beg to direct the attention of the guardians to the necessity of urging on the erection of convalescent wards for the fever patients. Two of the upper dormitories on each side of the house, are already taken up with ordinary sick cases of the house, and until the fever patients are removed from the Infirmary, the latter cannot be enlarged so as to give the required accommodation. Beside, the advantage of maintaining a proper Hospital accommodation, if the Infirmary were enlarged by raising the idiot ward, &c. it would give considerable Workhouse accommodation, no trifling consideration, at a moment when there is such pressure on your space.— I am the Martin O'olan M.D.
