An Extraordinary meeting of the Vice Guardians of this Union held on Tuesday the 29 February 1848.

It appearing to the Vice Guardians that the late Board Resolved to procure a Hand Mill, from Messrs Kylan and Deane, of Birmingham, through Mr O'Shaughnessy.

Resolved that Messrs Kylan & Deane be requested to inform the Guardians, whether they have received the order, if the work is in progress, and when the Mill will be completed.

The state of the Workhouse burial ground on the Workhouse premises, having been taken into consideration by the Board, and the absolute necessity of providing a distinct cemetery for persons dying in the Workhouse being apparent, and the Commissioners letters of the 8<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> Inst. on this subject having been read, it was Resolved that the order of the late Board, taking three acres of land for the purpose, be immediately carried into effect.

The overcrowded state of the House being taken into consideration, it was ordered that the Master do furnish the Board with a return of all individuals falling under Sec<sup>t</sup> with a view to discharge them upon pecuniary allowance.

Resolved that in order to relieve the pressure on the Work House, of the No of Sumates, entitled to receive out door relief under the first Sec<sup>n</sup> of 10 Vic<sup>t</sup> Chap 31 the following allowances be given

To single persons and heads of families 7/6 per week  
To each member of such family over 9 yrs 4/- per week  
To each member under 9 years 6/- per week.

Resolved that to enable the Vice Guardians, to ascertain the actual state of the Union funds, and liabilities, and in order to enable them to place the affairs of the Union, in a proper and satisfactory state, that application be immediately made to all persons having dealings with the Guardians to furnish their accounts to the 29 February to enable the Guardians to make arrangements for the liquidation of the debts.

Ordered that notices be inserted in the Galway Herald and posted in the Town for tenders for supplying for three months, the following articles, for which no contract appears at present to exist, viz Oatmeal & Butlin, Bread best and second quality, Groceries including wine spirit, and Porter, Rice starch blue Turf and lime,

The Guardians, having inspected the Workhouse Books, some of which appeared not to have been entered up for some time past, and the other appearing in such a defective state, that



no proper means existed of ascertaining the expenditure of provisions and necessaries, bedding and clothing, that from the number of inmates the attention of the Master was assumed to such an extent in enforcing order discipline and regularity of the House, he could not properly execute his other duties, whereupon it was ordered that notices be inserted in the Galway and Limerick papers inviting persons to propose for the office of assistant-master at a salary of £20 per Annum and Rations.

The Vice Guardians, having in company with the medical officer visited the workhouse and having observed the great necessity for increased ventilation, which has been heretofore repeatedly recommended by the medical officer they beg the Commissioners will direct their architect to send down a competent person from his office to superintend the works necessary to carry out the suggestions of the medical officer on the subject.

The state of the graves of persons who having died in the workhouse were buried on the workhouse site, immediately adjoining the building having been observed by the Vice Guardians, it was ordered that the same be covered to the depth of two feet at least, with soil from the Boys and Girls yards, to be replaced by the loose and broken stones on the workhouse land, and a coating of limestone gravel.
