Resolved that Our Solicitor do prepare Warrants with a View to the several Judgments obtained by the different Creditors of this Union against the Govt Board of Guardians, being satisfied on Record, pursuant to the Directions of the Commissioners, as conveyed in their Letter to Captain O'Brien of the 5th Instant, and that Our Clerk do furnish Mr Nolan with the Particulars, and Names of the Creditors.

Resolved that no larger Sum than Six Pence in the Pound be paid to the Collectors for a future Rate.

In his Opinion the above may be safely accommodated in the respective Buildings provided some additional day room accommodation were provided; Judging from past experience, and the very superior Ventilation of the several Buildings, I should have no hesitation in saying the whole accommodation above referred to, might with the addition of extra day room be made Capable of accommodating without any injury to the inmates 2000.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board and directions given thereon, as follows:

If the day room accommodation were considerably increased, it would of course still further add to the general accommodation of the whole Establishment, by allowing the present day rooms to be converted into dormitories; there is now ample accommodation for the Sick in the Infirmary Buildings, and as it would considerably add to the comfort of this class to have them removed to the place originally intended for them, whilst by so doing you will greatly encrease the general workhouse accommodation I think it would be well to make an order this day on the subject.

It is now very important before winter sets in to have all the sheds on the premises put into a state of thorough repair.

He reports the supply of Milk to Hospital on Saturday last was 20 Gallons short of the Estimate; the quality of the Milk still continues very inferior.

The pump in the Fever Hospital yard should be either completed, or covered in; at present it is a receptacle for nuisance.

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners 11th Octob: 1850 calling the attention of the Board of Guardians to the constant practice of the Collectors retaining balances in their hands from week to week contrary to the Commissioners General Order of 5th June 1844, and requesting the Board of Guardians to call upon the Collectors to lodge all sums remaining in their hands, and in future to lodge on each Saturday all sums collected during the week.

The Medical Officer reports the number in Workhouse Hospital this morning as 156 and in the Fever Hosp. 28. Deaths in the former last week four, and in the latter none. On the whole the Sanatory Condition of the House, and its Auxiliaries with this low rate of Mortality is very Satisfactory.

He recommends Foot Boards under the seats in the Earthen floor day Room in the Boys School, and the same in the back day room in the Girls School; He is induced to recommend this from the experience he has had of a very unpleasant form of Chills which is apt to appear at this season of the year amongst those located on a damp earthen floor. He also recommends to have the Brackets in the Windows of the Dormitories removed, that they may be closed at night in order to guard against Ophthalmia.

The Foot Boards were Ordered to be provided, and the Brackets removed.
