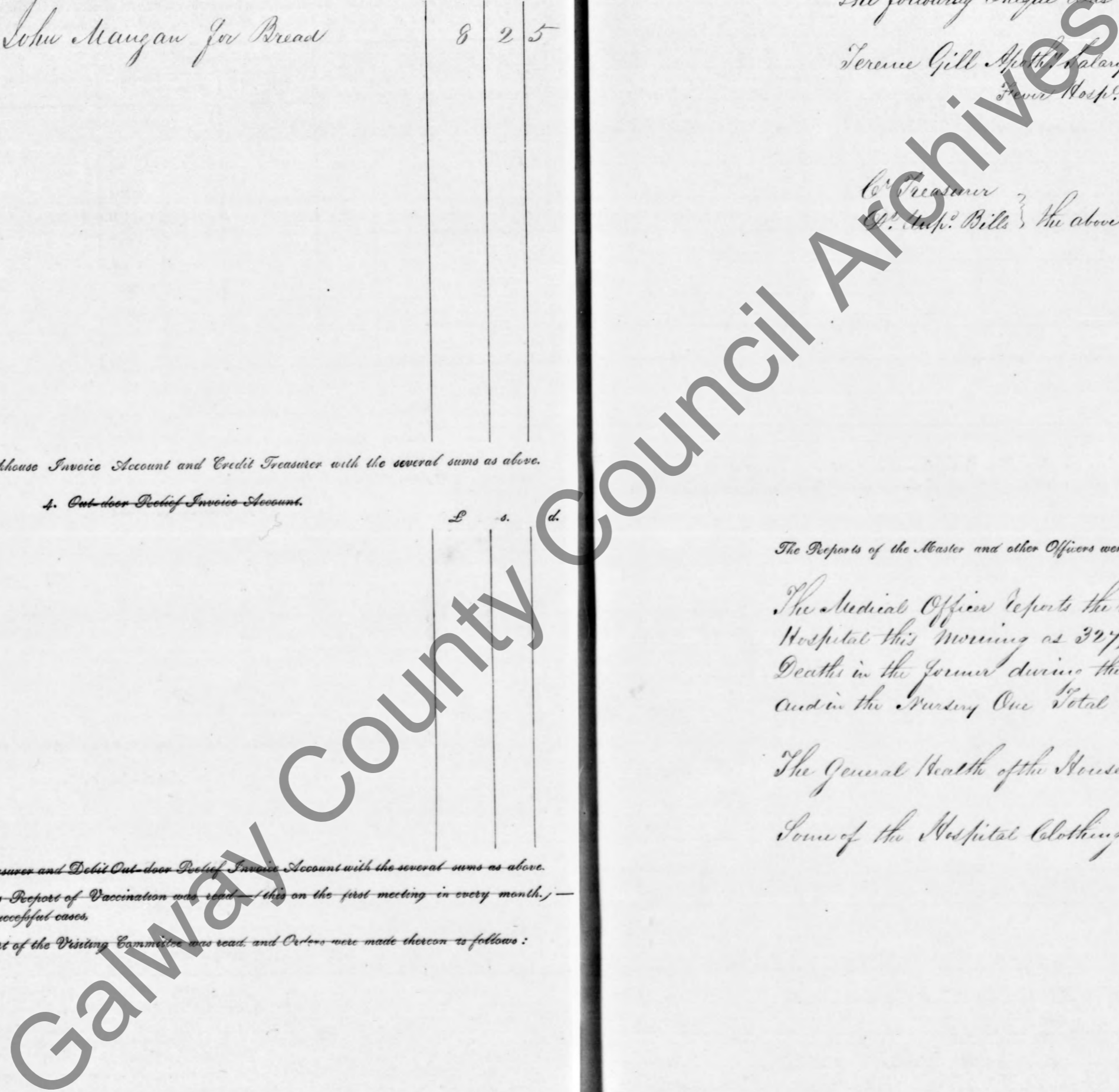

Letter from Poor Law Commissioners 7th June forwarding extracts from Minutes of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians of Corrofin Union regarding the Admission, and discharge of Paupers belonging to that Union to, and from the Govt Workhouse.

Ordered that with reference to that portion of the above letter which states that for eight weeks from the 15th March to the 10th May; out of numbers varying in the Govt Workhouse there were 16 reported deaths. The Commissioners be informed that we find this rate of Mortality nearly doubles that of our own Paupers for whilst our numbers for the eight weeks above referred to averaged 2499 our deaths were only 81 during that period; so that if the Mortality amongst Corrofin Paupers which averaged for these 8 weeks 284 were as ours their deaths should be only 9 in place of 16.

Letter from same 7th June forwarding a Copy of a Communication from Mr. Robert W. Perse relating to two sowlands in his Demesne which were permitted to remain in the Govt Union at the time of the alteration of the Boundaries of the Union.

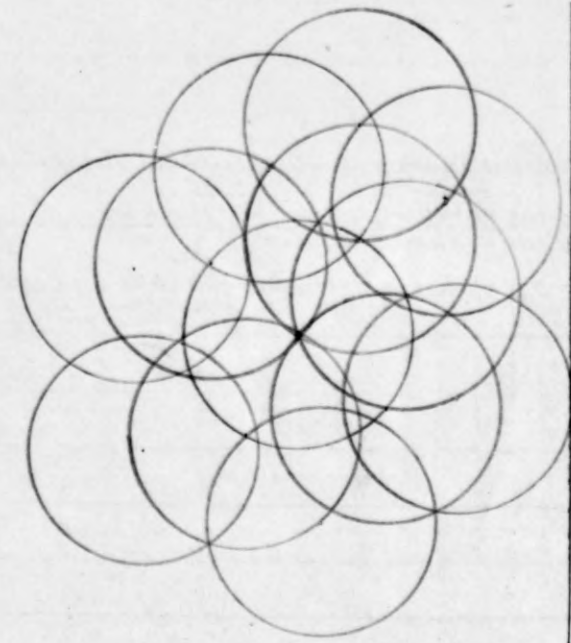
