Sick is so inordinate that he must report upon the Board the necessity of taking some steps to secure at least for class of inmates, a sufficient supply; Yesterday the quantity of Milk that ought to have been supplied for the Infirmary, and Fever patients was 22 Gallons, of this only 15 were delivered.
