I have to request the favor of your ordering a scrutiny into the recent Election of John Rochford as a Poor Law Guardian upon the following grounds. — It is alleged
That voting papers have been sent to Rate payers, in the E Division of Ardamullivan who are not qualified to vote by the Amount of Rates they pay. —
That voting papers have not been sent to Rate payers who are qualified to vote. —
That Rate payers who are entitled to more than one vote. — have had only one paper sent to them. —
That several of the voting papers have been initiated in more than one place, or otherwise altered, and an enquiry is particularly requested on that point. —

Finally That should any of these allegations prove to be correct that the said election be declared void. —
I believe that I am the principal owner of the E Division of Ardamullivan, and my tenants complain of the high rate in proportion to other parts of the Union, put upon it. It is said to be caused by a lamentable amount of illegitimacy upon the Townland of Lerraghrie or Knocknagrough, and as there are only four tenants including Rochford himself residing there we are at a loss to know how this can be. if Rochford attended to his duty. —
