"The course of training and instruction is moderately extended, the proficiency of the pupils tolerably fair, and on the whole the School is progressing. —

"The school at present in the school room is in bad repair.

"and it is most desirable that a new one should be substituted.

"The Teacher states, that the breakfast hour, interferes with the observance of the arrangements for school business, as set forth on the Time Table, and I would therefore suggest, that

"the time for giving literary instruction be altered in consequence,

"and that a plan of school business in accordance therewith

"be written out on a new form, and strictly adhered to for the "future"

I am in receipt of your letter of the 22nd Instant forwarding me copies of correspondence between the Poor Law Commissioners and Mr Slator respecting the late Election of Guardian for Ardaraullivan.

As the Commissioners still see fit to refuse an enquiry into the late election, and which alone could prove the validity of the objections made to it, then in the case of John Mealy, Mary Sinnane and Mary Diving, which Mr Slator in his letter to the Commissioners, of 16th May most unsatisfactorily disposes of.

Mr Mealy's name is in the Rate Book in Mr Hardiman's Office rated at a few pence a year, but which rate is paid by J Kelly from whom he holds the house he lives in.

Mary Sinnane and Mary Diving are rated also at a few pence a year, which rate in both instances, are paid by Mr Sinnane, from whom they hold the Houses they live in.

These three voters (supposing them to be really entitled to such) under precisely similar circumstances, are disposed of by Mr Slator disallowing John Mealy's vote, but considers Sinnane and Diving entitled to votes, and who gave them to his favorite candidate Rochford. I take the liberty of calling him his favorite because on my first nominating Pat Scoghegan, Mr Slator represented Rochford to me "as a very attentive and experienced Guardian none better".

I don't know what the qualification of a rate payer for a vote is, but if the returning officer has the power of rejecting or allowing any vote he pleases, qualifications are of little use.

May I beg the favor of your causing this letter to be forwarded to the Commissioners for their further consideration.

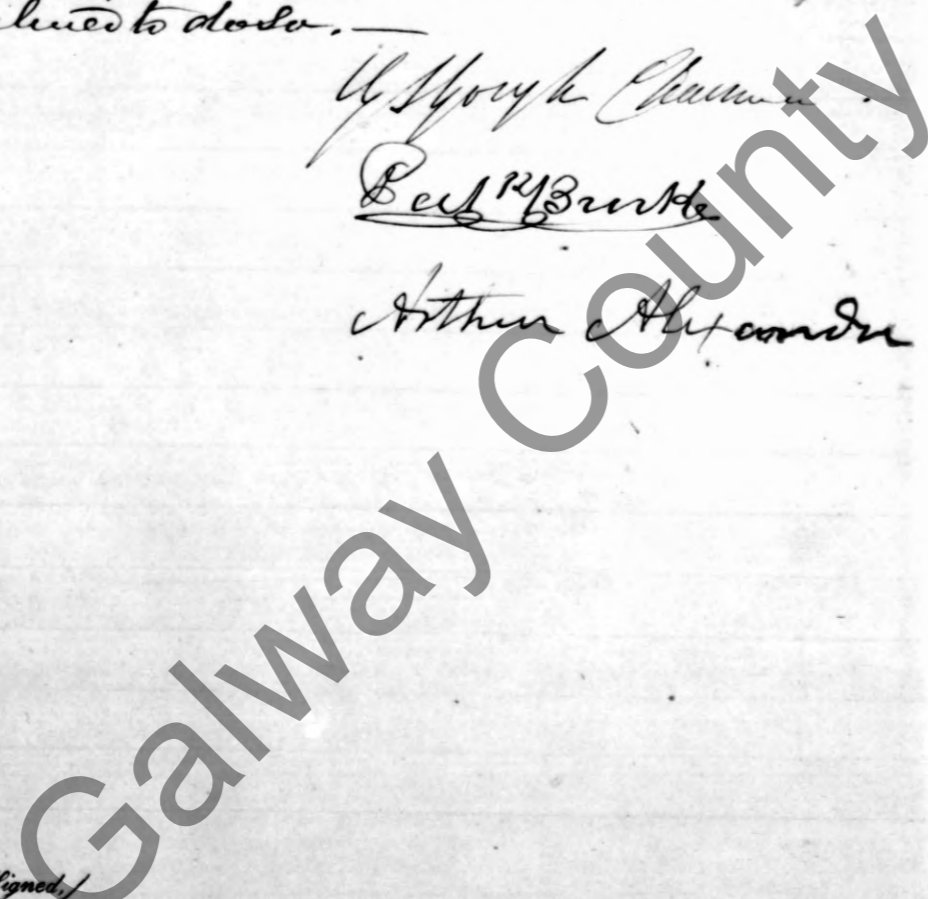

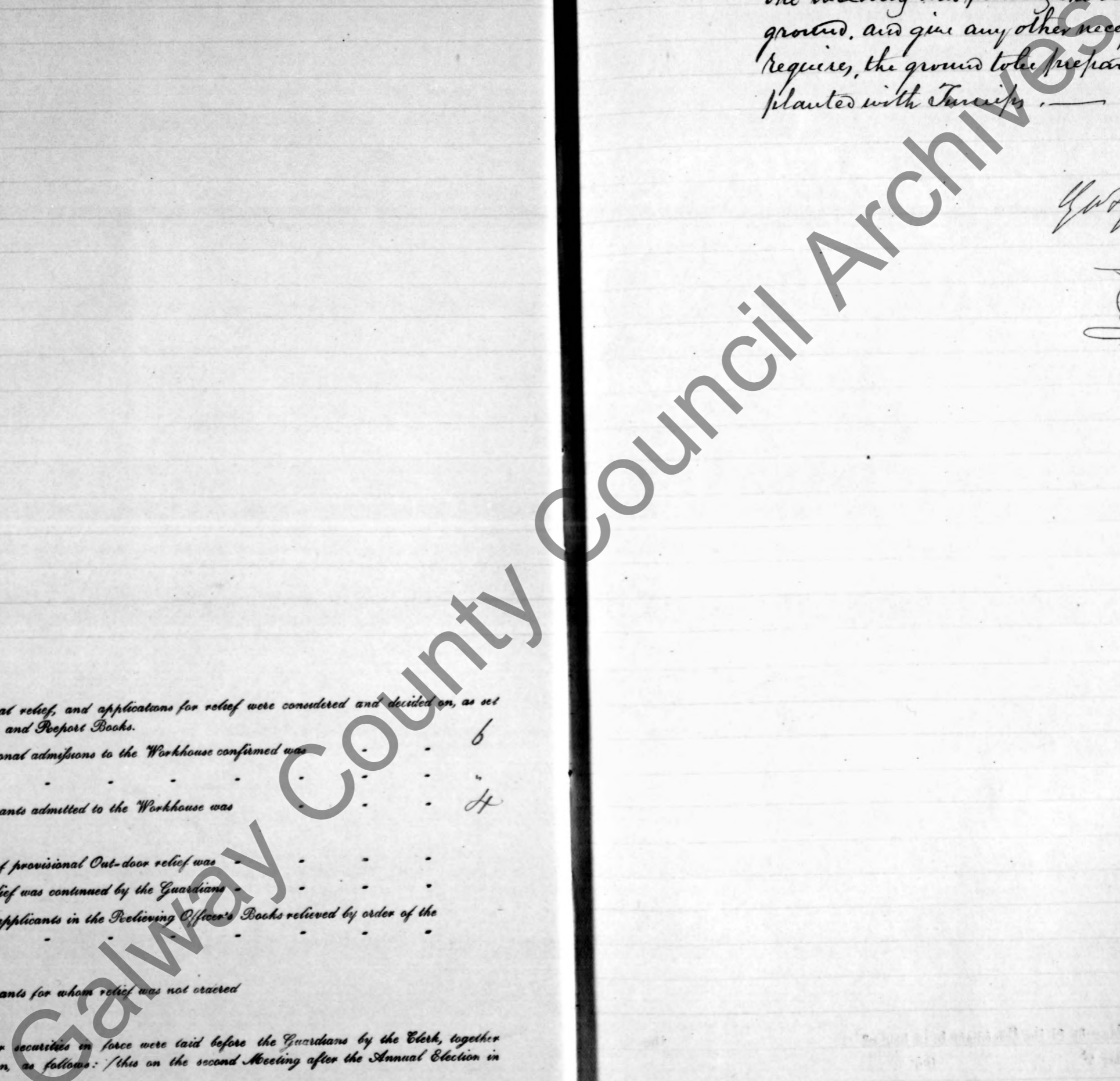

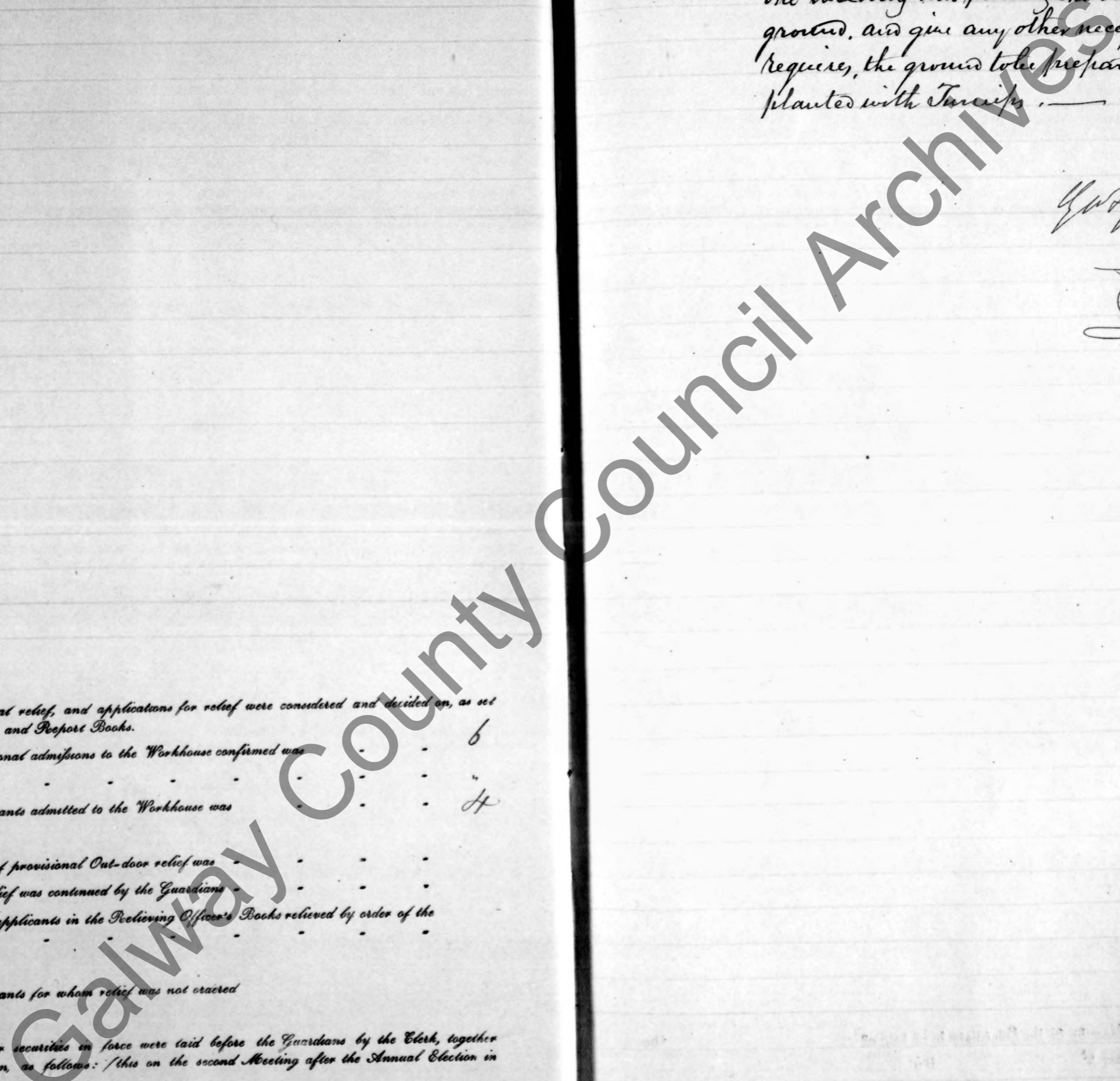
