"The course of training and instruction is moderately extended, "the proficiency of the pupils tolerably fair, and on the whole the School is progressing.—

"The blackboard present in the School room is in bad repair.  
and it is most desirable that a new one should be substituted.  
"The Teacher states, that the breakfast hour, interferes with the observance of the arrangements for School business, as set forth on the Time Table, and I would therefore suggest, that the time for giving literary instruction be altered in consequence,  
"and that a plan of School business in accordance therewith  
"be written out on a new form, and strictly adhered to for the future"
