My attention having been drawn to a letter of the Poor Law Commissioners, relative to the Dietary of the Children in Classes 4 & 5, suggesting the propriety of substituting soup at dinner in lieu of Milk at present in use, I beg to say in reply that I am not prepared to recommend the proposed change,

Tho' fully admitting the advantage of vegetables in the diet of all classes, still I cannot think that soup composed probably of oatmeal and vegetables, would be so desirable for the Children as Milk, which contains in a great degree all the elements required for infant nutrition, The only alternative for the dietary of the Children that I would suggest to the Board of Guardians, would be in the class 5 to 9, the substitution of white Bread for supper in lieu of oat and Indian Meal as at present.

In conclusion I beg to observe that the health of the
