Letter from Poor Law Commissioners, No 64443. 24 March 1863, requesting to be informed of the number of protestant paupers in the Workhouse.

Answered by the Clerk of the Union.

Letter from same No 6365, 26 March 1863, relative to the case of the old woman Margaret Fitzgerald, stated to have been removed from Cork Workhouse to Tulla Workhouse, and stating that they do not consider the Guardian's explanation satisfactory, and they have directed their Inspector Mr Burke, to enquire into the facts of the case.—

Letter from same No 6802. 30 March 1863, in reference to the Matron's report against the Infirmary Nurse on the 24 Inst, and calling for a written explanation from the Nurse.—

The Nurse has promised an explanation by next Board day,

Letter from same No 7030. 30 March 1863, forwarding copy of W Boukes report on his late inspection of the Workhouse, — in which he states, the Workhouse in most respects, present, a satisfactory appearance, that stock of Bedding and Clothing are very insufficient, and the Commissioners request that these matters may receive the attention of the Guardians, — that the Master's Clothing Book is so inaccurately filled, it is difficult to arrive at any clear conception of the existing state of matters in this respect, as regards the Infirmary, he states, that he cannot report favorably, that department not being maintained in as clean a condition as might be expected, that the Laundry is not available at present for drying the clothes, the Stoves being out of order, and the Commissioners think that no time should be lost, in making it available for its proper purposes.

W Bouke states, that the Porter's Book is inaccurately kept, caused as the Porter states by all the clocks being out of order. W Bouke states, that there has been progress among the children in the school, since his last visit, and he considers the Teacher as efficient and careful, and recommend, that the room occupied by the able bodied women adjoining the female school room, should be added to the school department, and the very young children placed in it, and to make some other arrangement for the able bodied women, or if this cannot be effected, the Commissioners think that the door should be built up.—

In obedience to your order I beg leave

that I have repeatedly insulted her on each
time she visited the Infirmary in the discharge
of her duty - and as regards the particular
charge "of my having taken a bottle of Holy
water and sprinkled it between the Matron
and myself in the presence of the Patients and
then turned her into ridicule" my explanation
Gentlemen of what circumstance is this -

On the 7th March last I applied to the Matron for
some clean clothing that was very much wanted
for the Patients as required to change some of the
beds that were most in want of clean linen -
In two days after the Matron came herself
with a few quilts. Then took a very soiled
quilt from off one of the beds. and the Matron
in presence of the Wardmaids and of the
Patients put the soiled quilt back again on
the bed, saying, that nothing should be done
there (meaning the Infirmary) but as she
would order. Considering the Matron came
to pick a quarrel with me I made no remark,
and remained silent. The Matron then
commenced giving orders in the Infirmary
and speaking in such a manner as to make
little of me, and said, I could do with
quilts once a month, to which I replied. we

must do with them once in three months. The Matron then said publicly before the Wardmaids and Patients that I was telling lies, which pained me very much to be so abused, and made little of in their presence, and being at the moment excited, I did take a small bottle containing Holy Water and Sprinkled some on myself in order to restrain my feelings, but in taking the Holy Water and thus using it, I beg to say it was not thro any disrespect in a religious point of view I did so, being a Roman Catholic myself as well as the Matron - In Conclusion I beg leave respectfully to State to you that I can Confidently appeal to Dr Nolan as to my general Character and the manner in which I discharge my duties as Hospital Nurse since my appointment about twelve months since. I can also appeal with equal Confidence to the Rev Mr Barry who has had such frequent
