The Medical Officer report, the admission of a case of Malignant Scarletina from the Kinvara district, he took immediate steps to have a special ward opened in the Fever Hospital for its treatment, and hopes by carefully isolating the case, and preventing all communication with the other inmates, to prevent a spread of the disease.—

Letter from same No 13666, 24 July 1865, in reference to the report of the visiting Committee on the cases of three women with illegitimate children located in the separate ward.

The Guardians have considered the report of the visiting Committee and have examined into the cases of the three women referred to. In one case, the woman has been transferred to the body of the House; in the two other cases, the Guardians are unanimously of opinion that they come clearly under the denomination of notorious characters. The Guardians have made an order to remedy the defective ventilation commented on by the visiting Committee.—

Letter from same No 13666, 24 July 1865, in reference to the disallowance of £1 provisional relief given by the Relieving Officer of this Union to paupers from Ballyvaughan Union.

The ground of objection on the part of the Gort Guardians to be charged with relief of the pauper referred to, was, they were persons sent officially by the Guardians of Ballyvaughan, to Kinnane (Gort Union) on business connected with their Union, namely to prosecute a putative Father. This Board considered the Ballyvaughan Board alone were responsible for expences which they ought to have provided when they gave those paupers passes which they produced, and this Board directed the Relieving Officer to apply to Ballyvaughan Union for the money he necessarily advanced for them.

This Board wish to be informed as to the steps that should be taken by them in this matter.—
