Mr Blaquiere not having attended to proceed on his notice regarding the allowance of £10 to Dr Mulville, for attendance on the Master of the Workhouse during his illness, and the Board having declined to postpone the subject, Dr Mulville handed in the following statement of his services, —

Gentlemen

I beg leave to state that on the 8th of March 1865, I was called on by Mr Slater Clerk of the Union to visit Mr Birmingham Master of the Workhouse, who I was informed was in the last stages of Typhoid Fever, and it was considered by his Medical attendant that the case was hopeless. I immediately attended in conjunction with Dr Nolan. I found the patient in a state of extreme prostration almost in a state of Coma, covered with eruptions of various character, exhaling a most offensive putrid smell, in addition after examining generally, and minutely into the general symptoms, I discovered that he had the serious complication of retention of Urine. I immediately requested Dr Nolan to send for Catheters, and after much difficulty I drew off about five pints of putrid Urine highly alkaline, and containing a large deposit of Urea. In my opinion this disability to pass Water existed for five or six days. I attended him for about ten days regularly twice a day, his water being drawn on each occasion. I then discontinued my attendance for two or three days hoping the bladder had regained its tone, however, I again visited him and found the bladder again distended, and again recourse was had to Catheterism, and continued my attendance for ten or twelve days more until his convalescence was fully established. I beg to state I also attended to the Medical treatment (which was important and necessary) as well as the Surgical. I beg to refer to Dr Nolan's report of the 21st of March 1865, in which he distinctly states Dr Mulville saw him with me in consultation, and I had the advantage of his assistance during the remainder of the case. —

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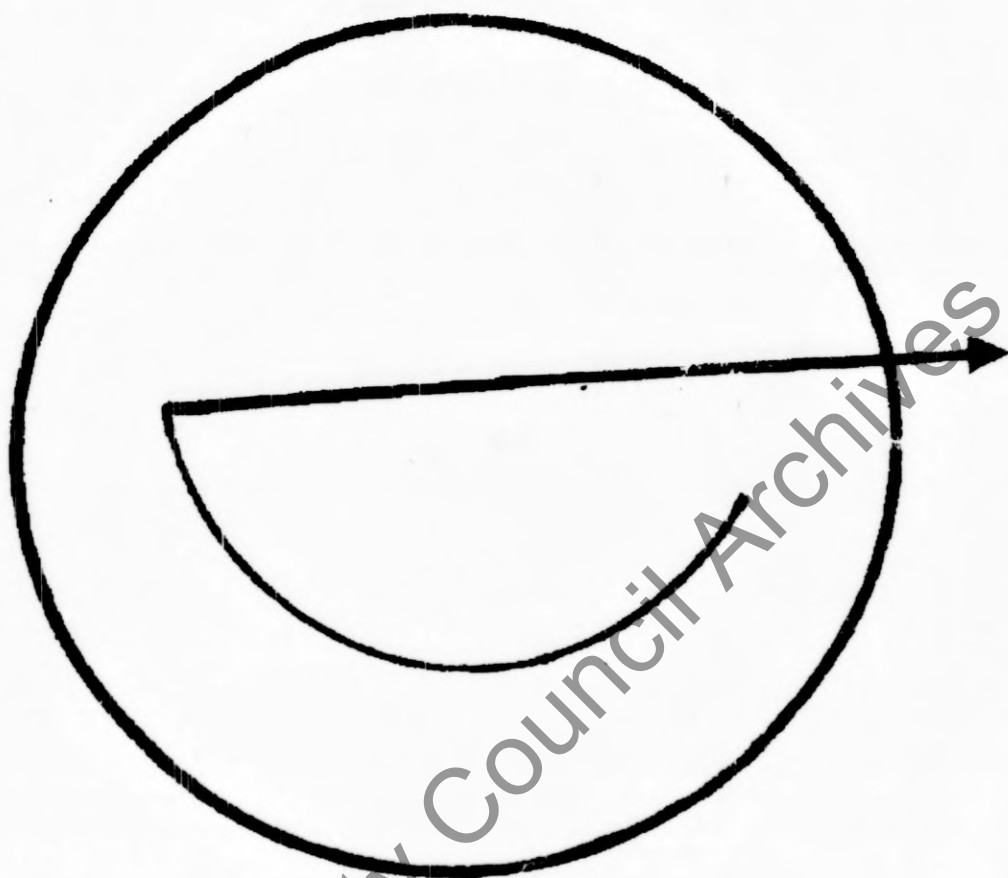
