The Master reports that some of the pauper inmates refused to use the soup for five days, in consequence of Potatoes being put on it, some of them protested against it before they saw it, but since Friday (23) they are using it.

The Medical officer reports the cases of scarlatina under treatment are going on favorably. I have used every precaution, and up to this have been successful in preventing any spread of the Disease through the inmates.

In reference to the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners to which you called my attention on this day fortnight, I beg leave to state, that no complaint was made to me of the soup, nor was I aware until I accompanied Mr Bourke on his inspection that the vegetables in ordinary use had been discontinued, immediately on my becoming aware of the fact. I consulted the Master and we agreed to have rice added to the soup, pending your final directions on the subject.— For the last ten days Potatoes have been in use as directed by you, but have been complained of by the inmates, particularly the infirm class as giving rise to Diarrhea, — I have myself examined the soup, which I am sure tho' not very palatable is nutritious, and as I am aware that a prejudice exists against it, I would advise a further trial with the addition of onions and Pepper to the Mash before it is added to the

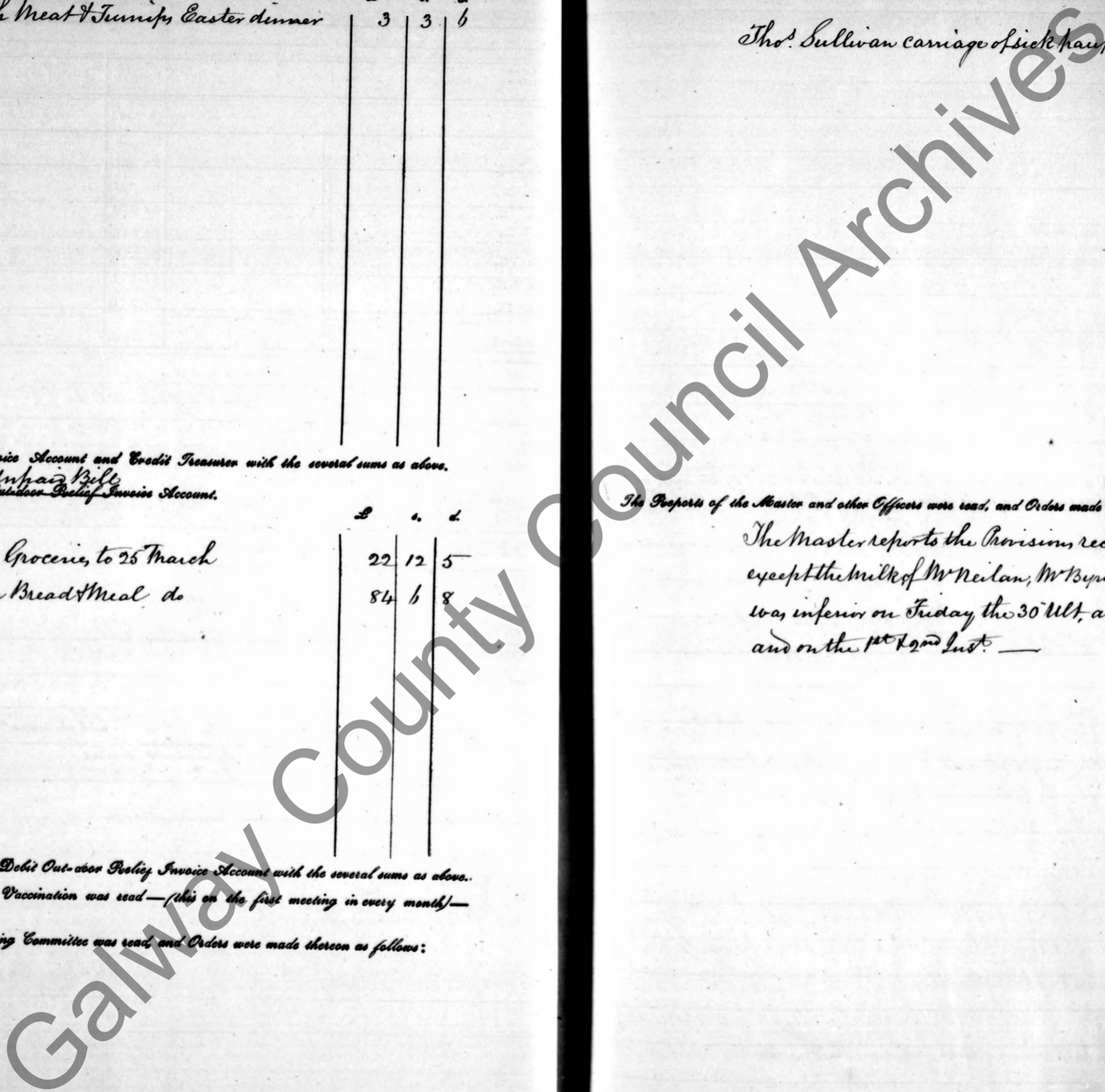
