The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

on the order for a full meeting, to take into consideration the propriety of calling upon Mr Gill Apothecary to resign his office having been read. It was
 Proposed by Mr Patt. Spelman seconded by James Lahiff Esq and
 Resolved that taking into consideration the nineteen years service of Mr Gill against whom there never was any complaint, except the present, which occurred so far back as last spring, and also the diligent performance of his duties, since, we are not inclined to pass so severe a sentence on him as to call upon him to resign, we consider that a severe admonition from the Board will cause him to be more careful in the performance of his duties, and we are the more inclined to retain his services, on account of the prevalence of an Epidemic in the Country, which we fear will oblige us to engage the services of more Medical men, we therefore request the Commissioner will be good enough to reconsider the subject and agree with the unanimous wish of the Board, —

Mr Gill has been subsequently called before the Board and severely admonished, and he has promised faithfully that he will correctly perform his duties in future. —
