Letter from Poor Law Commissioners No 13320. 20 May 1867 embodying report from Mr Bounke Poor Law Inspector on the financial state of the Union, also the inferior quality of the Milk, the insufficiency of food to the three classes of adult inmates, the necessity of putting the drying room in order, and to make perfect the poles and lines, in the female yard, and to provide new doors particularly in the probationary and Hospital yards. Mr Bounke states he is unable to furnish a school return as no school has been kept since the 22^d February, and for other reasons he recommends that the Schoolmistress should not be allowed to resume her place in the schools. —

Ordered that the Master be instructed to be particular in future to test the Milk, and if it should appear in any degree adulterated or inferior, to reject it, and use his best efforts to purchase in the Market and to report the same to the Board at next meeting. —

Mr Bounke having entered fully upon the subject of the dietary the Board made no orders thereon

In reference to the resignation of the Schoolmistress caused by the report of Mr Brouke Poor Law Inspector, we find that there is some discrepancy as regards her absence from the Workhouse from 27 January to 8 February, taking the Porters Book as our standard of information, by which it appears that she was in the House on the 1st, 3rd, 7th & 14 February, tho stated in the report to be otherwise, and as regards her performance of the duties of Matron, we find by the clothing receipt book, that she got 184 articles of female dress made, and could not consequently be expected to perform the duties of Schoolmistress during the same period, we wish therefore to draw the attention of Mr Brouke to the discrepancies between the Porters book and his report, and pending the information required the advertisement for Schoolmistress is postponed. —
