Got 27 March 69

Gentlemen

In my report of the 20 Feb'y I drew your attention to an epidemic of Measles, which had just broken out in the House, since then nearly all the Children and some of the adults, have been attacked by the disease, I had separate Wards opened in the Fever Hospital for their treatment with very favorable results, no death having taken place out of over 70 cases that were treated, —

I wish to day to draw your attention to an alteration of Dietary I propose to make, it appears to me that the quantity of Milk allowed to the healthy Children in classes 2 to 5 and 5 to 9 is excessive, I am informed by the Master that he finds it difficult to get them to use the quantity now issued to them, and judging from the excellent quality of the Milk supplied, I think the allowance of the 2 classes alluded to, might be reduced to $\frac{1}{2}$ a pint at dinner, instead of 3 piggins as at present. —

There is also an alteration in the infirm dietary which I would wish to recommend to your notice, and that is in class N^o 1 to substitute white bread for brown at dinner, in the proportion of 10 ozs of the former in lieu of 12 ozs of the latter, this alteration would allow of a considerable reduction in the consumption of Milk, as the great majority of the infirm class could well use the excellent Soup now in use, but find it difficult to digest the brown Bread, many of them being of advanced age. —

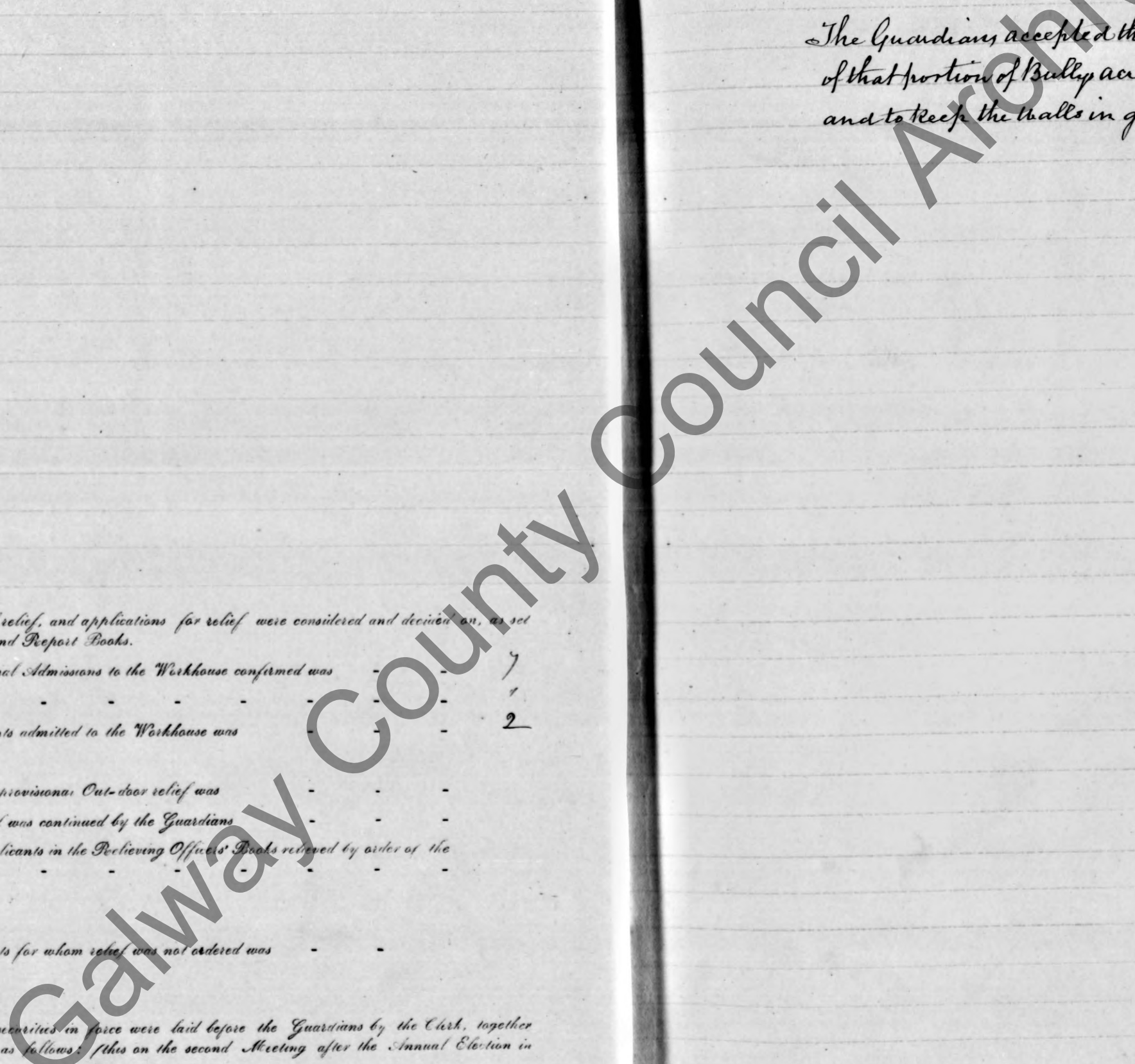


