In compliance with letter from the Poor Law Commissioners, I beg to lay before you the Statistics they require relative to Mortality amongst the children between the ages of 5 & 15, relieved in the Workhouse for the year ending 25 March last. — The return I now submit clearly shews the excellent sanitary state of the children referred to, the Mortality being only a trifle over 2 per cent, whilst the number treated for scrofula and diseases of the Eye was only 10 in 115, and of these 7 were admitted labouring under those diseases, only three having originated in the house. — These facts contradict in the strongest manner (as far as our house is concerned) the statement set forth by the Prefs on this subject, and from my own experience in a large rural district I can confidently assert that the health of the children in question can be compared most favorably with that of the children of the lower orders outside the house. — In my experience in the chief mortality amongst workhouse children is confined

Foundlings under two years of age, and I think it is of the greatest importance that they should be put out to nurse at the earliest possible period. — you have already acted on my suggestion in this respect as far as practicable, and I should be glad to see the system still further carried out. — with regard to the proposed extension of time from 5 to 10 years in the bill now before Parliament it appears to me to be a question more of utility than of health, the children of this class may be looked upon generally I believe as the most healthy of our workhouse inmates, while on the other hand the period between 5 & 10 years of age if allowed to remain out, is just the time they would begin to become acquainted with habits of industry on which in after life they may have to depend. —
