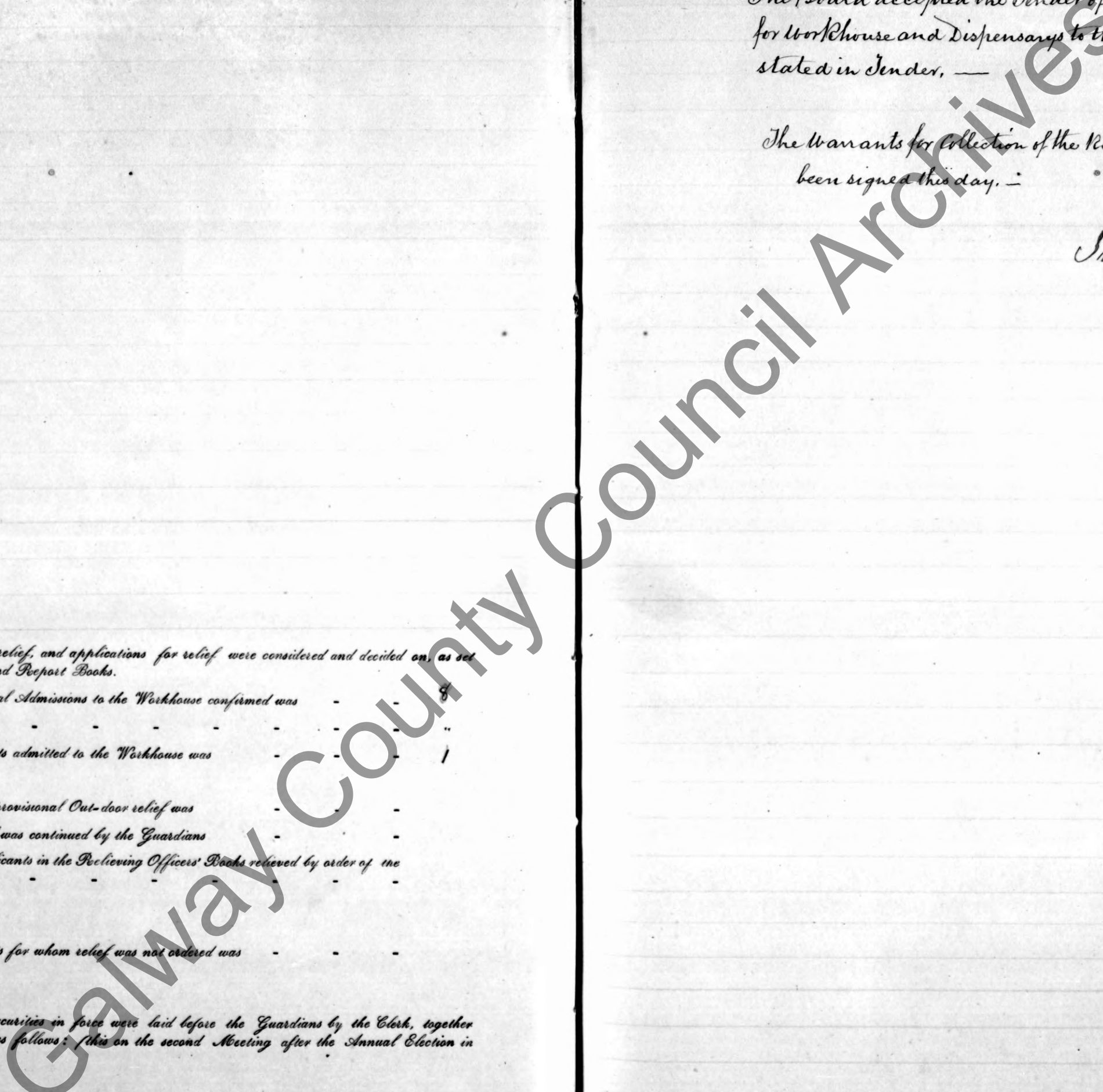

Gentlemen

I beg to lay before you my explanation relative to the charge of neglect of duty brought against me by Mr Edmund Burke at your last meeting.

In doing so I shall first give a plain statement of the facts of the case, as they came under my notice, and then I shall endeavour to reply to Mr Burke's charge separately. —

The man Fahy to whom the complaint refers, first came under my notice about two months ago, when he called at my house and consulted me as a private patient. I then found that he was suffering from extensive disease of his liver, and wished me to undertake his case, conditionally to his being cured. I told him I could not do so and declined his fee, he then said that he had been at great expense for medicine and advice, for the last four months, upon which I told him that he had better get a ticket to the Dispensary and that he could have any medicines he might require, he soon after did so and attended at the Dispensary on four or five occasions, and was prescribed for with however but little relief to his symptoms, — On the 8th instant between 10 & 11 o'clock in the morning a visiting ticket was handed to me by a girl in the street, on looking over it and seeing from whence it came, I asked her how it was that she did not get a ticket from Mr Burke, she said she went to him but he had not one, I told her I doubted that as I knew Mr Burke had tickets, she said that he directed her to go to Mr Forrest, I then asked her if this was Fahy who was attending at the Dispensary, she said it was, and that he had been very bad for the last four or five days, and that the Priest had been with him, she then asked me when I could go out, I said I could not say, as it was a very busy day, but that from what I knew of the case, I was afraid I could do very little for him, she then left, sometime afterwards, I met the clergyman and asked him about the case, he said that when he was there the night before, the man was very bad, and that he thought

he would have died while he was preparing him, he also said that he told Jaheys friends when they spoke of sending for a doctor that it was useless as he was dying, — On hearing this account of Jaheys state I changed my route of visits and postponed a visiting ticket to near Tubber, in order that I might proceed at once to Jahys where I reached about 4 o'clock, and found him in a state of collapse suffering from symptoms of general Peritonitis with effusion, he referred his sufferings principally to his right side, Peritonitis appeared to be general, — on examining his abdomen I found a small liguminal rupture which he told me he had for some time, but that it gave him no trouble as he could return it, I tried to do so and it went back without difficulty, On being questioned by his wife as to his state I told her that the symptoms were fatal and that I had no hope of him. I recommended warm stupes and a hot Bran poultice to the abdomen, and as he was uneasy about his bowels, I directed him to have a simple Enema, I told them there was an experienced Nurse near who had the materials and to go to her with word from me, and that she would attend to him I also told them that a little Brandy with Soda water would be the best thing to give him, they said they had wine and that it was the only thing that remained on his stomach, before leaving I told his wife to let me hear in the morning, if he got over the night, and that if his stomach was settled, that I would send him some powders to relieve the pain, I then left, on my way home close to the Town, I was stopped by a man who asked me if I had been to Jaheys and what I thought of him, I told him I had been there and that I had a bad opinion of him, he then asked me if I was to send anything out, and I said not to night, I then proceeded on a visiting ticket to near Tubber, and on my return home I found a ticket from Mr Redmond Burke to the same man, but as he had been already attended to I took no notice of it, — on the following morning at 11 o'clock I attended at the Dispensary, and seeing no messenger from

Jaheys, I asked the Nurse already alluded to (Mrs Heher) who happened to be there, if she had heard anything of Jahey, and if he had got over the night, she said he was very bad but still alive, I asked her if they had sent for her the night before and she said not, but that they had got another woman, I told her I was to send out some powders and as she was passing she could leave them at the house, she said she would do so, I then proceeded myself to prepare some of the medicine necessary as I was about leaving the Dispensary at one o'clock, Jahys daughter came in, she described her Fathers state as very bad, and I told her of the medicine I was sending out, I advised her to take some brandy home to him, and also told her that I would be in Peterswell next day, and that if she would let me know I would see him, —

Gentlemen these are the facts of the case as they occurred I will now proceed to reply to the statements of Mr Burke. —

1st with regard to my questioning the issuing of a ticket by Mr Forrest in the case, I beg to refer you to a resolution passed by the Dispensary Committee on the 2nd July 1867. —

That in all cases where practicable visiting tickets should be issued by members of the Committee resident in the locality to which the party requiring relief belongs. —

2nd as to my refusal to attend on Mr Forrests ticket, that statement is sufficiently contradicted by the fact (admitted by Mr Burke) that I actually did attend on Mr Forrests ticket before Mr Burkes arrived,

3rd with regard to the urgency of the case,

There is no remark either on Mr Forrests ticket or on that of Mr Burke of the case being urgent, both Gentlemen are in the habit of marking tickets as urgent when they wish to direct my particular attention to them, — the fact also of my being aware that the man was suffering from an incurable disease of long standing would lead me to believe that the case was not one requiring immediate attention,

4th with regard to treatment,
 I submit that taking into account the fatal symptoms that
 were present, I did all I could to allay the patients sufferings
 tho' unable to relieve the disease from which he suffered. —
 Gentlemen I will conclude by expressing my regret to trouble
 you with so lengthened a statement, but you will pardon me
 I am sure when you reflect on the pain it must necessarily give me
 to have my professional character attacked. I have been now
 for more than 10 years your Medical Officer, and this is the first
 occasion that the slightest complaint of neglect of duty has been
 brought against me, I have endeavoured to discharge the duties
 of an extensive district to the best of my ability, and I believe with
 the single exception of Mr Burke, I have succeeded in securing
 the good will and confidence of every member of the Committee
 and of the Board of Guardians. — with these remarks I shall
 leave the case with fullest confidence in your hands. —

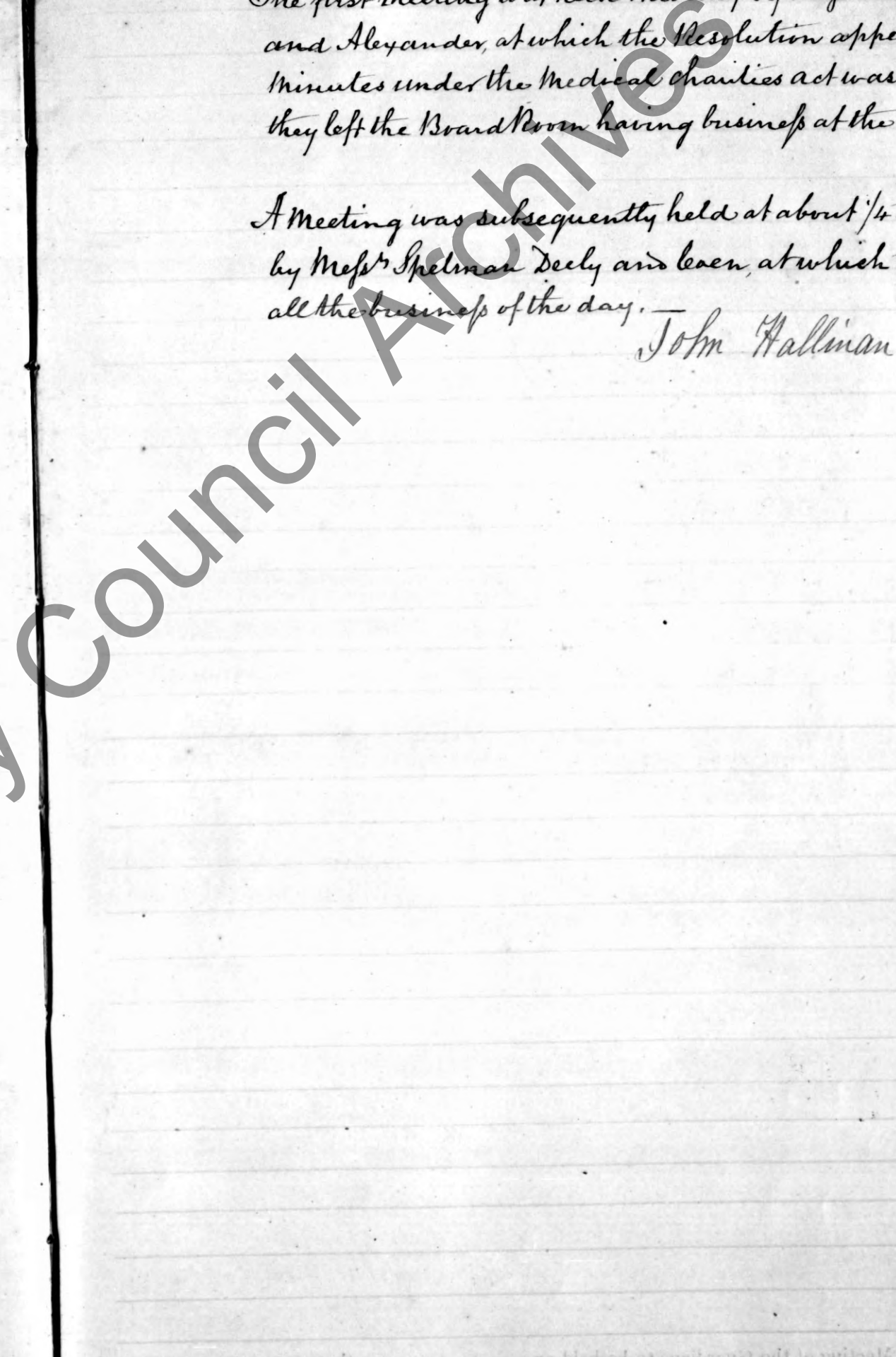

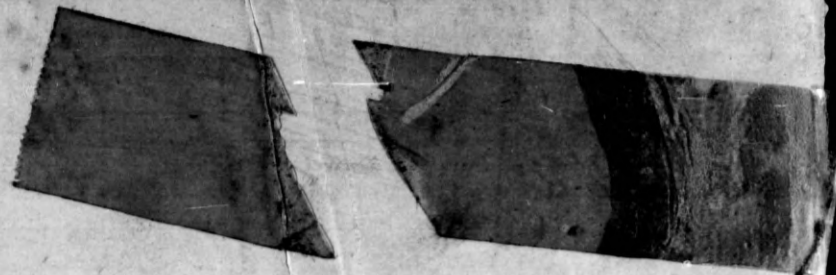

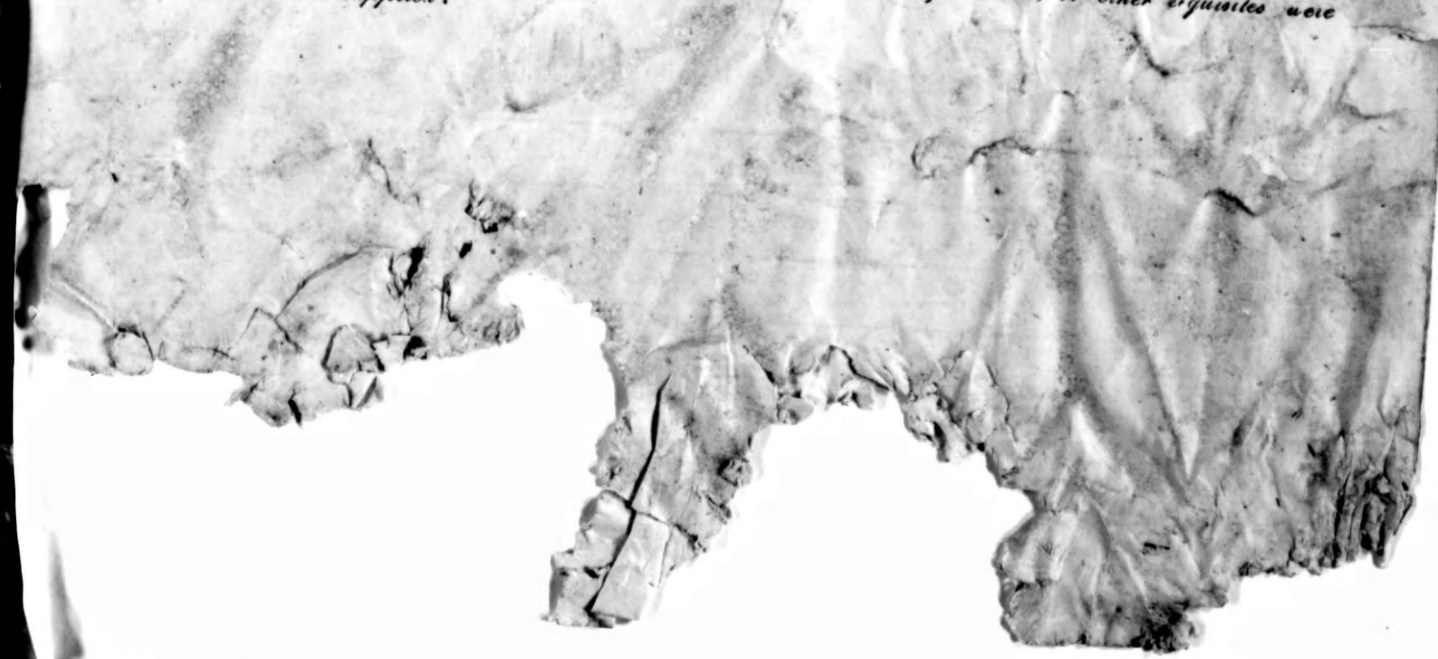

He has to report with regard to the sanitary state of the District that no case of Fever has occurred in the Village of Mehanagh since the 20th Ult, the Patients then suffering from the Disease with two exceptions are now convalescent, one death having occurred since my last report. The disease Typhoid Fever has appeared in two instances in one of the outskirts of the Town, Crowlane, within the last ten days, and the Sanitary Officers attention may with advantage be directed to the state of the case. Pools and Yards, and a few of the Houses in that lane which appear to me to be in a filthy condition.

He has also to report that the Fever has shewn itself in the Village of Loughlyshaughnessy Parish of Beagh, two cases have already occurred there, and as there are some poor people in the Village occupying small and dirty hovels crowded together. I think it well that the Sanitary Officers attention should be directed to the condition of the place.

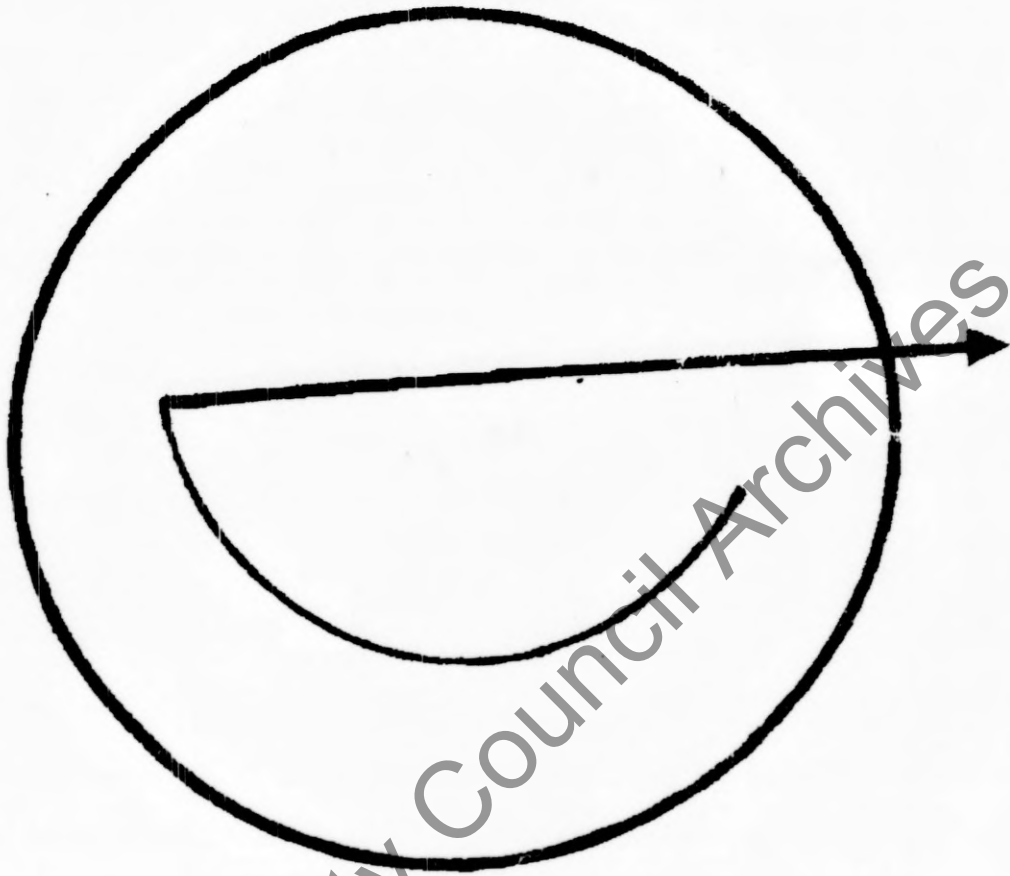
