In compliance with your request conveyed to me on the 30<sup>th</sup> April last relative to alterations in the dietary rendered necessary by the difficulty of procuring a sufficient supply of milk, and in conjunction with the Master, I have carefully considered the subject, and beg to submit the accompanying scale of dietary for your approval,

In suggesting these alterations I have not made any reduction in the quantity of milk issued to the healthy children or to the infirm classes, tho' as regards the latter I can see no objection to the substitution of skimmed milk for new milk during the summer months, at dinner the  $\frac{1}{2}$  at present on the infirm diet is large, and tho' it is optional with a majority of them to have  $\frac{1}{2}$  infirm diet, which allows Meat Soup 3 days weekly, I find that all prefer the milk dietary for choice, while submitting some slight alterations in the dietary of the sick & infirm I take this occasion of recommending an increase in the dietary of the able bodied men and women, say 1oz of meal to their breakfast diet as they at present have no evening meal. In making the proposed reduction in the milk diet in the Infirmary, of course I bear in mind that it is optional with me to increase the supply in any individual case by extras when necessary. —
