Letter from Poor Law Commissioners No 7289. 15th March 1872, in reference to the gratuity proposed to be granted to Mrs Gill the widow of the late Apothecary out of the profits of Fairyhill and the sale of Hay, and the Commissioners state that the fund arising from profits out of Fairyhill and the sale of hay must be regarded in the same light as money raised under the authority of the Poor Relief Acts, and the proposed expenditure could not be legally defrayed out of the fund referred to, any more than it could be defrayed out of the Poor Rates or the Interest fund. —

In reference to the Commissioners answer No 7289, refusing to comply with a resolution of the Board to give £15 as a gratuity to the widow of our late Apothecary Mrs Gill, the Board are of opinion that the funds named viz profits arising from farm produce and Interest fund are not rates, and they would wish to know by what Relief Act they are empowered to raise money in advance of rates and pay interest thereon, which the Commissioners would not allow to be paid out of rates, thereby allowing the Guardians a certain control over funds other than Rates created by themselves, and the Guardians request the Commissioners to inform them of the law prohibiting them from any control over such funds. —

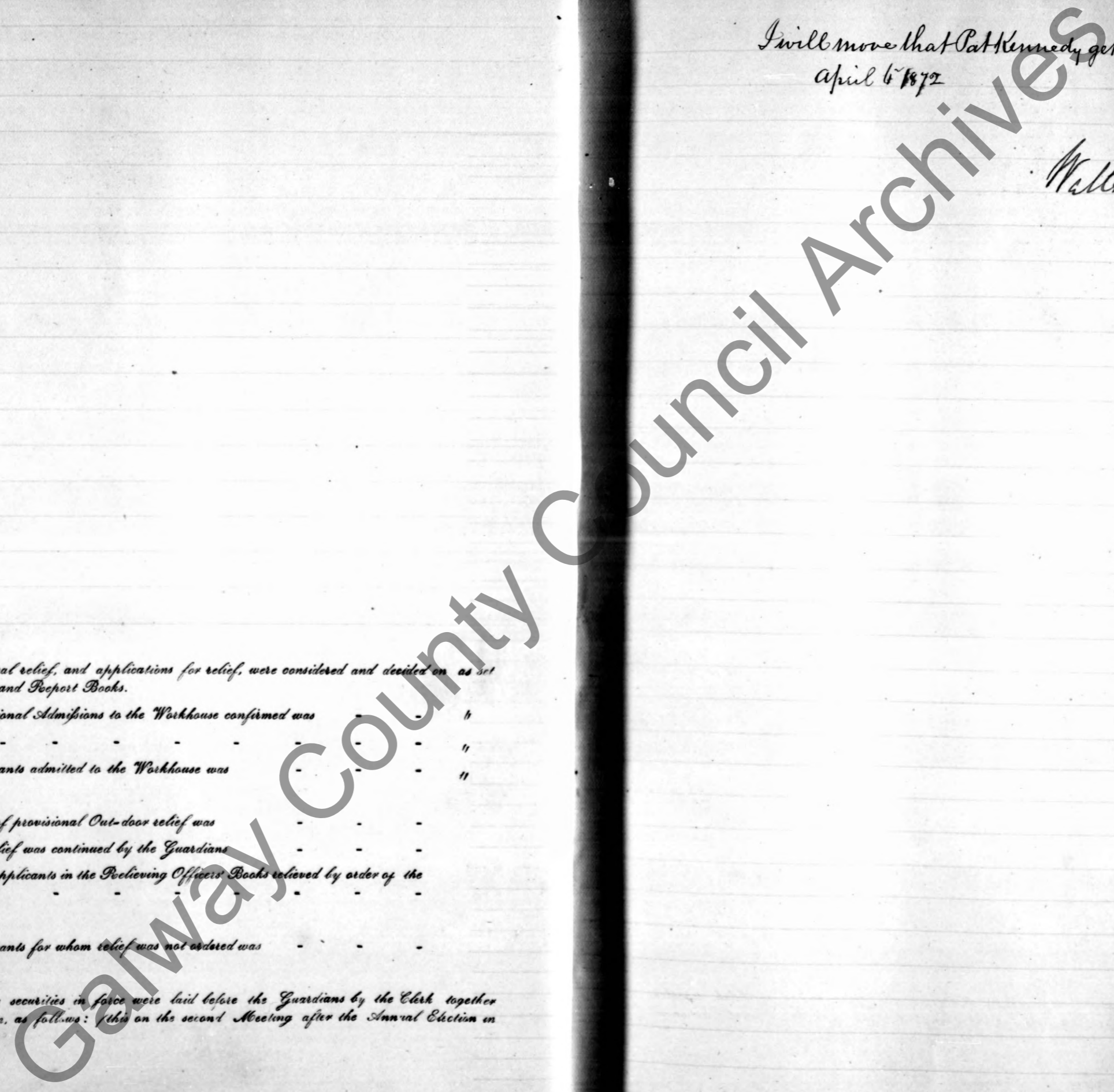
