Letter from Local Government Board No 2834, 1 November 1872, stating that Dr Brodie in her periodical Report says he found the Workhouse clean and orderly, the clothing and bedding good and sufficient, the provisions of good quality, and the buildings in a good state of repair. The privies are in the same state as when last reported, the Waggon recommended have not been provided, and the Board request the attention of the Guardians to this matter. - The School is conducted in a satisfactory manner, and the children appear clean and healthy. -

Letter from same No 2475, 1st November 1872, in reference to the patient Anne Fitzsimons, who was conveyed to the Workhouse on the Donkey and Cart, and died in the Fever Hospital about three hours after her admission. - and stating other circumstances connected with the case. - The Local Government Board have to point out that this case exemplifies in a very marked manner the importance of having a vehicle for the removal of sick persons to the Workhouse Hospital, and it seems that the chances of this woman's recovery were lessened owing to the means used for her removal, and time which elapsed before she was removed. The Board have to refer the Guardians to the letters already addressed to them

on

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the subject of providing a suitable conveyance for the removal of fever and other patients, and they trust that the Guardians will not any longer fail to provide a spring van, and either purchase or hire a horse for drawing it. - The Board have at the same time to observe that they do not think that the Guardians are discharging their duties towards the sick poor, so long as they fail to carry out the suggestion contained in this letter. -

It appears to the Board of Guardians that the Local Government Board do not seem to remark on the discrepancy in the views of this case taken by the two Doctors, one stating it to be a case of fever, and ordering removal to the Workhouse as soon as possible without stating any attending danger, while the other considered death to result from "hemorrhage from the lungs." under these circumstances the Guardians do not consider the Act, as throwing any blame on them for the usual mode of conveyance in which the woman was made as comfortable as possible. - The Guardians are in treaty for a spring van. -
