Both were asked to give assistance in making the bed of a paralyzed man in the infirm ward, and persisted in refusing to do so, they were ordered a punishment by the Board, but still persisting to refuse and inciting insubordination to the other paupers, they were summoned to the Petty

Sessions

and ordered the punishment mentioned in their letter, —
On return from the Jail they were ^{asked} ~~ordered~~ to do the same work by order of the Board, Patrick Comer complied, but William Connors took his discharge in preference to complying to the order of the Board, The Medical officer was consulted as to the fitness of the duties they were asked to perform, and he considered them perfectly competent to do so, —

With regard to their statement of Banet and Donohue, it is perfectly untrue, —

The Guardians also beg to inform the Local Government Board that a spirit of insubordination had broken out in the house, and that these two parties were the ringleaders and cause of the whole disturbance, —

The Board are most anxious to support the Master in enforcing the necessary discipline in the house, —
