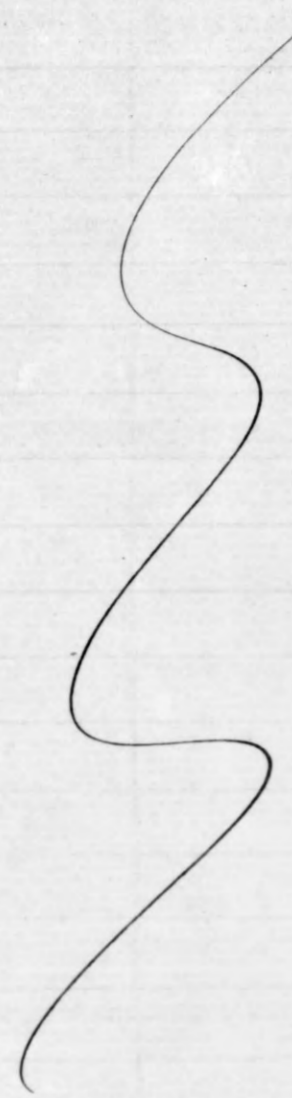

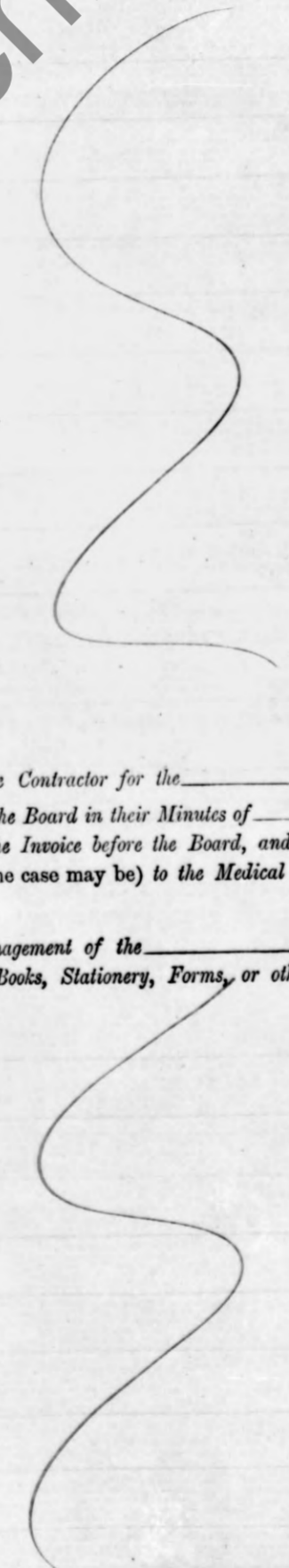

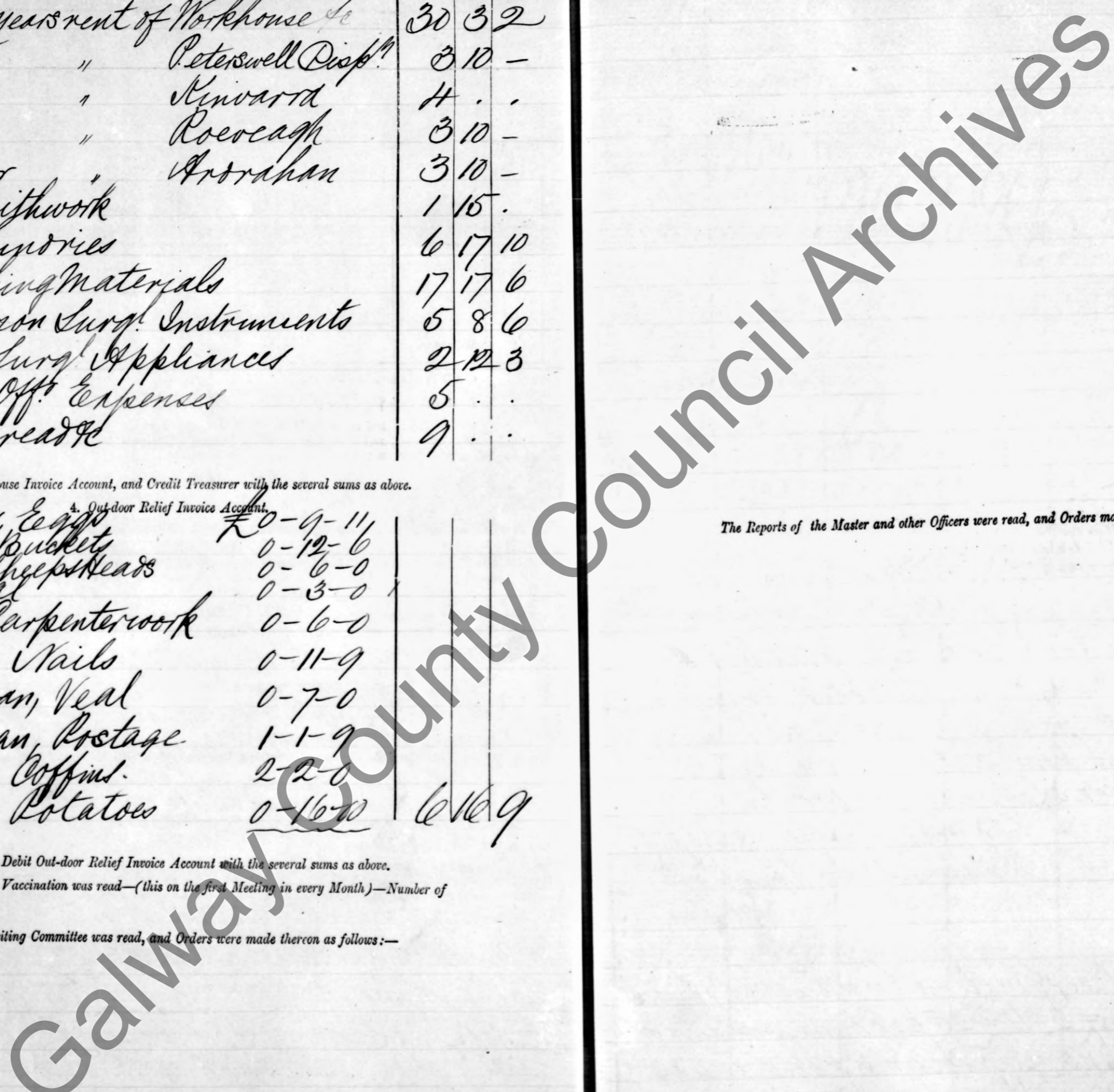

The following Report was read from the Returning Officer for the Union:—

Gentlemen, I have the honor to lay before you a Letter from the Local Govt Board dated the 22nd inst. stating that they think you should take into your consideration the conduct of the Porter of the Workhouse in filling Nomination Papers for the Office of Guardian of the Killynny E. Division and I think it right that I should state the circumstances in connection with this matter.

At about 2.30 P.M. on the 4th inst. the Porter filled and signed for Mr. John Burke, the Guardian for the Killynny E. Division, a nomination paper, purporting to be his nomination for the ensuing year. Mr. Burke forwarded this paper to me through Mr. Hardman, Rate Collector, at about 4 P.M. and the Porter not being aware of this and fearing that Mr. Burke would neglect or forget to have the nomination paper tendered to me before 5 P.M. filled a second paper, enclosed it in an envelope, and sent it to me by a pauper inmate of the Workhouse. On examination of the nomination papers and from my acquaintance with Mr. Burke's and the Porter's handwriting I at once arrived at the conclusion that both were filled and signed by the latter. I accordingly on the 7th inst. interrogated the Porter in presence of the Master of the Workhouse and he at first denied having written the second paper but

but subsequently admitted it. With regard to the first he declined to say that he wrote it but states that he might have, and that it resembled his handwriting. Mr. Burke admitted before your Board on the 11th inst. that this paper was written by the Porter & it will be for you, Gentlemen, to say whether it is possible that the Porter could have any doubt on the matter and whether his conduct was intended to defeat the due execution of the Law & the Regulations.

Some time before the issue of the Notice of Election I cautioned the Porter against interfering in any capacity in the Elections and he cannot therefore plead innocence or inexperience.

It is obvious that the conduct of the Porter, especially with regard to his denials & equivocations with reference of these papers, was calculated to deceive me in the execution of my duty as Returning Officer, and consequently dangerous to the validity of the Poor Law Election in the Parishes of St. Andrew & St. Martin.
