With regard to the Board's application for a loan for seed oats & Barley, they have stated that at the time they applied for the loan for potatoes several members of the Board believed there was no necessity for purchasing oats or barley, but since then owing to the number of applications which they have received as well as from their own personal knowledge of the state of the country, having gone very much among the people during the giving out of the seed potatoes they have been convinced of the absolute necessity of supplying oats and Barley, and hence their application to the Local Govt Board for a loan of £1000
