Letter from The Local Government Board No 28548 dated 17th September pointing out with reference to the Guardians' resolution on the 11th inst that it would not be advisable that the Fever Hospital Nurse's Child should be permitted to reside with her, and on no account should a person living in the Fever Hospital be permitted to mix with the children in the Workhouse School.

Ordered - The Guardians were aware that there were objections to the Fever Hospital Nurse's Child being allowed to reside in the Workhouse. The Nurse's qualifications were however so high that the Guardians were desirous to make this concession in order to secure her services. They recognize the propriety of the Child not being allowed to attend the School whenever there are any cases in the Fever Ward.

Letter from the Local Government Board - No 27856 - dated 17 inst informing the guardians that they had received from their Inspector Dr Rouphan, his half yearly report on the Fort Union the financial condition of which appears to be satisfactory. Dr Rouphan suggests that the subject of providing additional accommodation in the Infirmary should again be considered and the guardians would do well to enquire the Medical Officer as to how it should be provided. Dr Rouphan recommends that stock of clothing should now be taken and also that it would be desirable to have water laid on to the kitchen boilers by a small cistern provided with a ball and cock, and he remarks that the cock in the Infirmary yard opens on a channel that has not a sufficient fall and causes a nuisance which might be removed by the water being conducted to the adjoining yard. With regard to the Schools Dr Rouphan observes that the literary education of the children in general is fairly attended to but that no arrangements whatever have been made to afford them any industrial training and there were not materials for either knitting or sewing in the school-rooms on the day of his inspection. With reference to the state of repair of the Workhouse Buildings Dr Rouphan thinks

that

that the guardians would do well to have all the chimney shafts cemented next summer as the brickwork is gradually decaying. In all other respects than those mentioned Dr Rouphan's report is of a most favorable character. Ordered.
