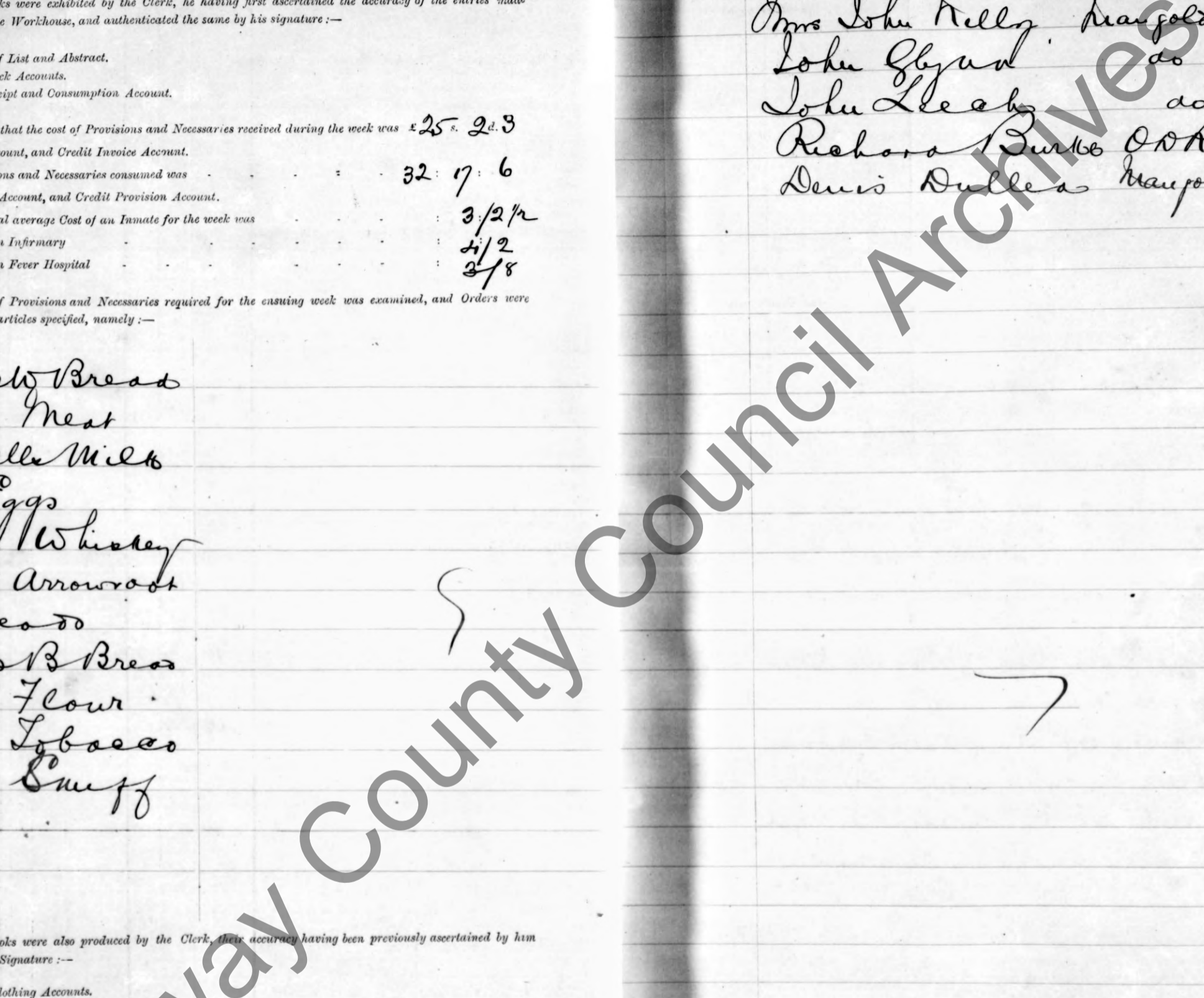

I have been informed by the Clerk of the Union that I have to enter into a fresh Bond owing to the collection of the Sweets Rate - Last year I was subjected to considerable trouble and annoyance, as I had to bring my sureties to Galway to have the Bond witnessed by a Solicitor. Your Board ignored my application for the fee I paid the Collector, as I had been informed afterwards the Local Government Board for Ireland would not allow it. Al together I did not pay my expenses incurred in connection with Bond. Now from the information I have had I will again be compelled to undergo a similar course.

From the present disturbed state of the country - my district of the country in particular I matters have come to such a pass that a man's life who has anything to do with the collection of taxes is endangered. From my knowledge of, and intercourse with the people

I can state that the price of the Seed Supplies last Spring cannot be collected without having recourse to litigation and distress, as the people were impressed with the belief that they were would have to pay for them. It is further my belief that if I shall be compelled to make a distress for non-payment the Stock or goods seized cannot be sold, as I fear no person would be prepared to buy such goods or Chattle.

I therefore respectfully apply to your Board for a remuneration of nine pence in the pound for the collection of Poor's & Seeds Rate. The remuneration allowed me last year did not at all cover my expenses, I did my utmost to collect the Rates without putting people to expenses by going amongst them ~~people~~ in person frequently and coaxing them
