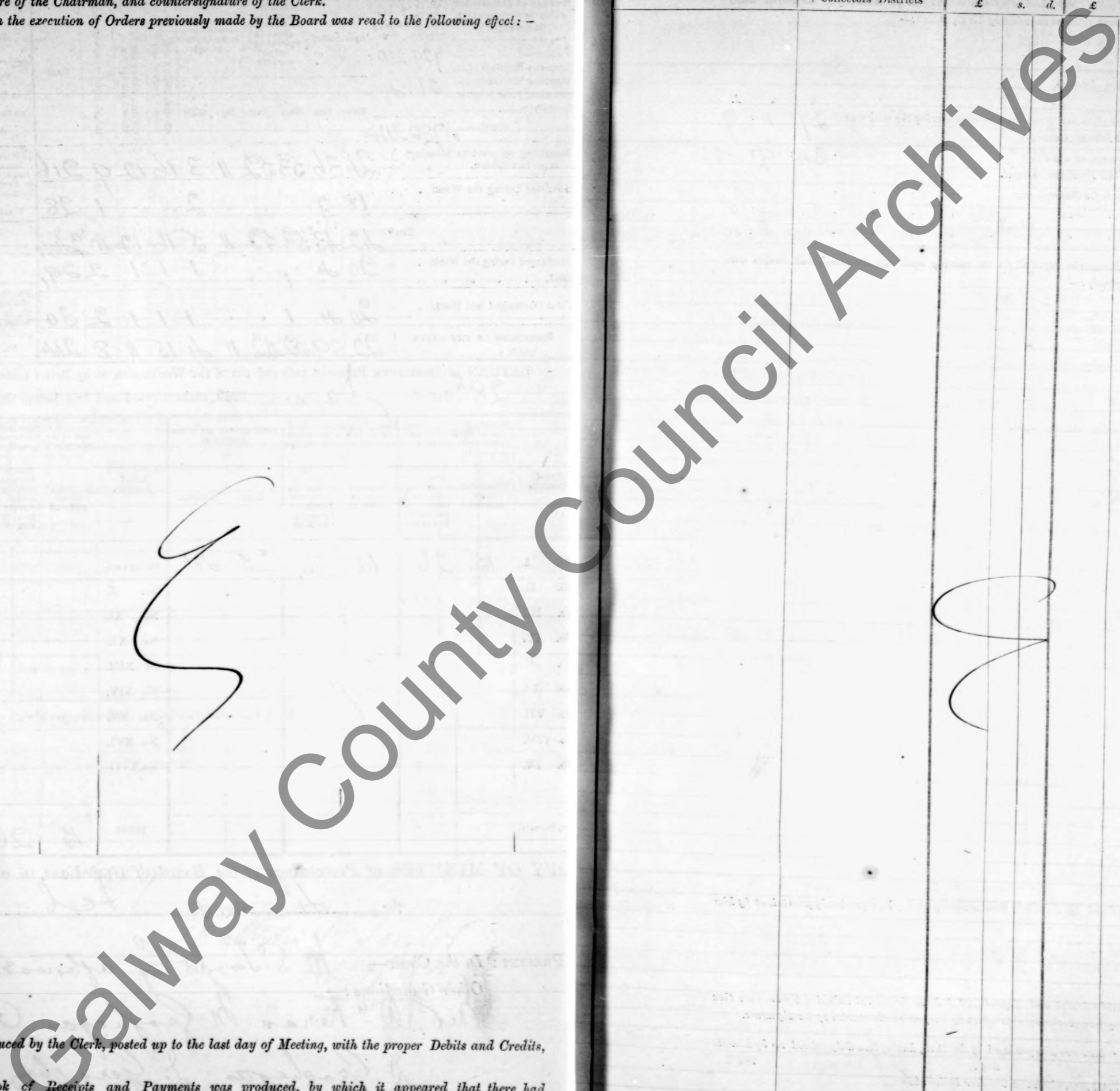

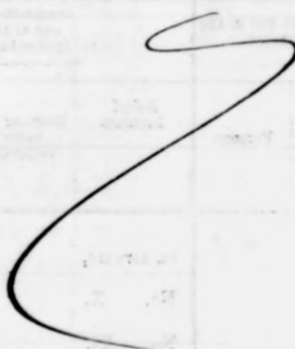

Letter from the Local Government dated 29th March. Stating in reply to the Guardians inquiry of the 11th inst that the Governor of a Prison in which a suspect had been detained will acquaint the Guardians of the man's release if requested by the Guardians to be supplied with that information.

Ordered. The Board are of opinion that if the Governor of the Prison were directed to communicate with the Clerk of the Union in which a Suspect resided, immediately on his discharge, it would be much more simple than if the Guardians ask the different Governors for that information.

The Board adopted a resolution of the Colraine Board of Guardians in favor of the "Poor Removal Bill" now before Parliament.

Mr Conolly gave notice that on this day week he would ask a question of Mr Staffe relative to the case of Mary Casey of Derramore.

Ordered that on this day week Mr Burke P.O. send into this Board a report on the circumstances of each "Suspect" in his district who is at present ^{in custody} on relief with a view to receipt the amount given in accordance with their necessities.
