Resolved — That a sum of 30/- be allowed to Patrick Clarke to assist his emigration. Acc't to be charged to Gort Division.

On the application of the Matron the following articles were ordered for the Honol. — 4 3ds Tapestry, 1 Hearth Rug, 1 Table Clove, 12 gds, Detourne, 3 gds Linen, 6 gds for window blinds.

Ordered for the Workhouse 14 Canes for sweeping machine and 2 Steads, 2 prong wagons, 7 lbs Wine for nets, 1 door Spring, 1 small bell, 2 trays, 6 st. white lead 12 gal Turpentine and a Plumber for a dog or two.

Ordered — That the Chapel Windows be repaired as suggested by Mr. Ringwood and that the Sacristy be improved as requested by the Matron.

In consequence of some money having been taken from a woman named Gibbons who died in the Workhouse and who it appears it was ordered —

"That patients admitted to the Infirmary be more carefully searched in future and that no large sums of money be allowed with them."

The Master informed the Board that in order to give the tramps a wash regularly it would be necessary to erect a small wooden shed in the yard back of the Registration Office as the one most convenient and suitable with a Bath in it. The present Bath at the female side can only be used when there are no women "tramps".

"Ordered"

The Guardians agreed not to enforce payment from John Kelly of cost of maintenance of his Father if he is now taken out.

Resolved. That the cost of a passage to Canada be allowed to Bridget Finnegan chargeable to the Poor's Act Large.

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
