Letter from Local Gov^{ty} Board dated 18th inst. stating with reference to the Guardians direction to their Solicitor not to take further proceedings against the Collectors, in consequence of the difficulty of getting in the Rates at present, that it appears from the last abstract of Rates that although the time allowed for the collection expired in the month of July last a sum of £475 remains uncollected while there is a balance against the Guardians of £775. Under these circumstances they think the Guardians should require the Collectors to close their accounts at once & take the necessary steps for putting a new Rate in course of Collection without delay.


