Keane seconded by Mr. Green & Resolved — That the Board of Guardians of this Union express their most emphatic condemnation of the recent rackrent manifests of the Land Commission taking into account the present state of the tenant farmers in the past year of great depression in agriculture & other farming interests. We have no hesitation in pronouncing that the already rackrented & overtaxed farmers of this Union will find it impossible to meet their engagements during the coming year and if the rackrent manifests of Messrs Wrench & Litton be enforced it will entail misery increase of pauperism and discontent in the Country.

The Abstracts of Union accounts for the year ended 29<sup>th</sup> Sep. 1888 were this day signed.

The following are the Auditor observations:— The above is a correct statement of balances D<sup>r</sup> & C<sup>t</sup> taken from the Union Ledger to date. Very little of the new Rate has been collected and the Treasurer complains of the heavy amount by which the account of the Guardians has been overdrawn.

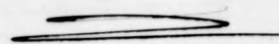

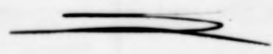
