The above is a correct statement of balances A & C taken from the Union ledger at close of account for half year:

Considering the short time he has had his warrants Mr Durni has made fair progress in collection of the New P. Rate: though he has lodged but little of the balance of the 2nd instalment outstanding; but Mr Morbett & Mr Hozell have done practically nothing in respect of the collection of Poor Rates.

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect (for orders made on them respectively, as follows):—

and absolutely nothing in that of the 2nd Instalment. They promise to make a good lodgment within a month & the Guardians shoud see that they do so.

The cost of clothes given to a child going to an Industrial School, to which my attention was called by the Local Gov. Board, has been deducted from the Contractor's Bill, which has been paid, and does not appear as a charge against the Rates.

I find that extras are given to male and female inmates of the House employed with Cows, and farm, and various departments of the House, as also by the Medical Officer outside the Infirmary. I must draw attention

to this infringement of the Workhouse rules, which must be discontinued. There can be no objection, if the Dietary of any class is insufficient, for the Guardians, with the sanction of the Local Gov. Board, to adopt an improved dietary.

I have to call the Guardians attention to the number of children represented as Orphans both in the House and out at Nurse, and to the fact that they (the Guardians) have in some instances contributed to this by their illegal action in regard to discharging mothers of illegitimate children without their children for the purpose of going to service, who have then deserted their children, or by not prosecuting mothers for the desertion of their children.

The law is very distinct on this subject, and must be strictly enforced, that no child, except for medical treatment, can be admitted without its parent, and no parent can be discharged without his or her child or children. I must request the Masters to inform me of any future infringement of this regulation, and the Guardians should at once take proceedings to oblige parents of children now in the House under these circumstances to remove them.

The charge of 7 shillings for car hire paid for a car to take a pauper inmate named Ponsset Connolly to Leaghrea is illegal and must be disallowed and

swcharged on Mr. Michael Connolly who ordered the expenditure"
