 Individual inmates of any class not to be obliged at any time to change to potatoe diet should it not suit them.

The Classification laid down in Art 13 of the Workhouse Rules is followed in the Scale. But there are two subclasses in each of classes 1, 2, and 3. The 1st subclass in each of classes 1 and 2 get respectively 14oz and 13oz Brown Bread for supper when not admitted in time for dinner. If in the House before dinner they get the dinner meal including soup. These two subclasses consist almost entirely of casuals who come in late, shortly before bed hours but in cases of exceptional distress amongst them, milk or tea is to be given for supper by order of the Medical officer. The allowance of bread for dinner to be given to children in all cases when they come in after dinner, with ^{hour} 1/2 pint of milk.
